

Oscar Winner Hit By Wife

SANTA MONICA, Calif. (AP)—Actor Ernest Borgnine, who won a 1958 Oscar for portraying a lovable butcher, is a wife beater, says his estranged wife.

And Mexican actress Katy Jurado is a home wrecker, adds Rhoda K. Borgnine.

Mrs. Borgnine, 34, heavy set and matronly looking, made the accusations Friday in asking Superior Court to set aside the interlocutory divorce decree granted her last Aug. 29.

Borgnine, 42, denied the accusations, and said he hopes to marry Miss Jurado. He denied she had anything to do with the breakup of his marriage.

In her 26-page affidavit, Mrs. Borgnine charged:

Borgnine coerced her to file for divorce while she was highly nervous and under the influence of tranquilizers.

"He said he would say his sex life was unsatisfactory," the affidavit added, "and that I refused to have more children."

"He didn't realize I had an answer to all his allegations. He didn't know a woman never forgets getting beat up—lips swollen, eye blackened, black and blue marks so that the dress for the Academy Awards back in 1956 had to be changed in style so the marks didn't show."

The Borgnines were married in 1949 and have a 6-year-old daughter.

Many Youths To Partake In Annual Junior Rodeo

MONTAGUE — Approximately 200 youngsters from 8 to 18 years of age, and about as many head of rodeo stock, are expected to participate in the eighth annual Shasta Valley Community Club Junior Rodeo Sunday, June 21, at the Montague Rodeo Grounds. The show will be accompanied with the traditional barbecue.

Still considered the "biggest little" rodeo of Northern California, many of the local entries will be boys and girls who have "grown up" with the rodeo.

One of the highlights of this year's show will be Redding television's "Sheriff Bill" Winters, who plans to be on hand for the Junior Queen Coronation Ball on Saturday night, June 20, and to assist in the coronation ceremonies slated for midnight.

Sheriff Bill will also be one of the many riders to appear in the opening parade to start at 11:15 a.m., Sunday.

The parade will feature floats by 4-H clubs, riding groups, family riding groups, drill teams, to which will be added many local entries and floats. The parade will march through Main Street to the rodeo grounds, where at 11:30 a.m. the barbecue will be served. Rodeo events will start at 1:30 p.m. with the grand entry, and from then on the youngsters will be on their own, participating in such events as bronc and bull riding, team roping, the down calf roping, team saddle steer riding, breakaway calf roping, loose-rope calf riding (two events, one for 8 to 12-year-olds, and a second for 13 to 14-year-olds); a calf scramble, and two barrel-race events, one for contestants 8 to 13 years old and a second, which requires an entry fee, for youngsters from 14 to 18 years.

The all-around cowgirl or cowboy will be awarded a specially designed sterling silver trophy buckle. Second place all-around contestant will receive a hand-made hackamore and reins. Besides the \$125 prize money with entry fees added, there will be trophy buckles for all first place winners, and purses and ribbons for each event. There will also be three Levi and three Lee awards given for special prizes.

Betty Cooley, in charge of registration of contestants, has already received many entries for the bull and bronc riding contest. Other entries have been coming in thick and fast from several points such as Red Bluff, Anderson, Los Molinos, Modesto and Redding, while others have been coming in from various points of Oregon.
