# Klamath Kub Bats Stop Dunsmuir, 4-1

The Klamath Kubbs crashed into the Northern California baseball league win column with an impressive 4-1 victory over the Dunsmuir Merchants in Gem Stadium Sunday afternoon.

Their big 12 hit win over the league's "winningest" pitcher, Ron Curtis, not only boosted the Kubbs out of the basement but it scrambled the league race to the point that all six clubs are either in first or second place.

Kub pitcher Bob Lawery's seven-hit conquest of the Merchants gives the improving league record a 1-2 Nor-Cal league record.

Boostered by the addition of catcher Bob Kelly and second sacker Butch Dollar to their lineup, the Kubbs hit safely in every inning but the second. Kelly singled in the fourth to score Floyd Linderman and give the Kubbs a 1-0 bulge, while Dollars, who rapped two-for-four, blasted a sharp single in the seventh that scored third baseman Rube Johnson and Linderman to make it 4-0 of the Kubbs.

Lawery, a smooth-working left-hander, fanned 10 and was robbed of a shutout in the top of the eighth, when teammate Dollar bobbled a grounder with two away, allowing Larry Pratt, Dunsmuir first baseman who had doubled, to score the Merchants' only marker.

Leading the free-swinging Kubbs were right fielder Mike Dolan and third sacker Johnson, each of whom poked three clean singles in five trips to the plate. Linderman, who scored the first and last Kub runs, added two in three charged times at bat, one the longest hit of the game, a double, and the other a single.

The only Klamath Falls stickers who failed to collect a hit were first baseman Dean Dunson and Lawery; Dunson, however, was credited with a sacrifice.

Topping the Merchant batters was catcher Marvin Cartwright who collected three singles in four trips and was the recipient of an intentional base on balls. His free trip to first came in the top of the fifth when the Dunsmuir line threatened seriously.

Leading off the inning, Curtis singled but was forced at second when shortstop Peder Anderson reached first on a fielder's choice. Another fielder's choice on second baseman Gary Hisey caught Anderson between second and third. Hisey reached third on a wild-pitch and center fielder Jess Fidler walked. With first and third filled Lawery passed Cartwright to get at Pratt who struckout to retire the side.

The only other Dunsmuir hits were collected by Anderson, Pratt, and left fielder Lou Aytote.

The losing chucker, Curtis, was relieved with two away in the eighth after giving up a pair of singles which brought the potential dynamite Johnson to the plate. His relief, Ray Smith, handled Johnson on a slow roller.

Fourteen Dunsmuir base-runners died on the bases while the Kubbs stranded 10.

The next league action slated for manager Irv Whit's Kubbs is scheduled at Scott Valley on June 21, but an extra game is planned during this week with Merrill of the Klamath Independent League. Game time and site for the Merrill-Kubbs clash will be announced later.

Infielder Butch Kimpton and pitchers Wayne Hironska and Ed Vegley are expected to join the Kubbs before the week is out.
