

Terms Listed On Allotments

Farmers on land on which no wheat was seeded for grain in any of the years 1957, 1958 and 1959 and for which a 1959 wheat acreage allotment was not established, may apply for a 1960 wheat acreage allotment according to Earl Wilson, chairman of the Klamath Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation County Committee. The owner or operator of such a farm must apply in writing to the Klamath ASC County Committee by July 1. Wilson stated, otherwise, a 1960 wheat acreage allotment will not be established for the farm.

Wilson further explained that 1959 wheat acreage on a farm which did not have a 1959 wheat acreage allotment does not qualify as wheat history acreage for the purpose of establishing acreage allotments. A 1960 old farm wheat acreage allotment will not be established for a farm without wheat history in 1957 and 1958, and on which wheat was planted for grain in 1959 without a 1959 wheat acreage allotment unless an application is filed by July 1, 1959. Blank application forms are available at the ASC county office for use in filing requests for allotments.

Dr. Hausman labeled the hanging death of Nathan Lerner, 64, and shooting deaths of Alfrida Thomas, 31, and Harry C. Martin, 77, as suicides.

Any Western city would be proud of a beautiful, air-conditioned old folks' home on the outskirts of Berlin. But one aged inmate caught a Western newsman alone and whispered, "It's good to be here—but the young ones outside. Just think of them."

A Czechoslovak army officer on a visit to East Berlin stood looking at a photograph of goosestepping soldiers of the new East German army.

The goosestep has been a symbol of German military aggression in Europe for three generations. The officer walked off shaking his head.

When a Western newsman tried to talk to the officer, he froze and turned away.

Green-uniformed police are as

much in evidence as Hitler's storm troopers once were. The color of the uniform is different, but they still patrol in pairs, never alone.

Most of the policemen are in their late teens. Their entire lives have been dominated by dictatorship and war. Slogans come naturally to them. They are jack-booted and armed and they know who runs their country.

Soviet troops keep scrupulously out of the way. In East Berlin, Soviet troops and their families live on the outskirts of the city.

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They are rarely seen in town. "But we know they are here," a retired civil servant said. "Those who would rebel remember Hungary. If they are realists, they know there cannot be any hope at all."
