#### UNCLAIMED PROPERTY BILL

SACRAMENTO (UPI) — The Senate voted what amounts to final passage of a bill by Assemblyman Allen Miller (D-San Fernando) to allow the state to acquire unclaimed property held in banks and trust funds. Miller said he felt the bill would net millions of dollars to the state.

SACRAMENTO (UPI) — Both houses approved a resolution asking Congress to pass a law for a minimum wage for farm workers in every state in the union. The Senate earlier this session killed a bill to guarantee farm workers in California at least 90 cents an hour on the grounds other states would be in a better competitive advantage if California were the only state with a 90-cent minimum.

### Split In Supreme Court Evidenced Again By Ruling

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The conservative-liberal split in the Supreme Court was evidenced again today in a ruling that sanctioned secret judicial inquiries by states.

A five-man majority upheld a criminal contempt judgment against two Brooklyn private detectives. The two balked at answering questions in a special investigation of "ambulance chasing" and other questionable practices among lawyers of the Kings County bar in New York.

Dissenting Justice Hugo L. Black accused the majority of retreating from their highest duty, "that of maintaining unimpaired rights and liberties guaranteed by the . . . Bill of Rights."

Black was joined by Chief Jus-

dani and Howard Bluestein, said their constitutional rights were impaired because their lawyers were barred from the hearing, conducted by State Justice George A. Arkwright.

Justice John M. Harlan, who often speaks for the Supreme Court's conservative wing, said to strike down the state proceedings would limit state power far beyond anything required in earlier "right to counsel" rulings.
