

Highball Sign Given Warbler

NEW HAVEN (AP) — "I feel free as a bird," Ed McCarthy, the warbling railroad conductor said today. He started to whistle like one.

McCarthy, silenced by railroad brass earlier this month, got the go-ahead Tuesday from George Alpert, president of the New Haven Railroad.

McCarthy planned to mark the lifting of the injunction by entertaining passengers along the aisles of the Bankers' Special, which runs between New Haven and New York.

The conductor's whistling repertoire—warbles, trills, chirps and other bird-like noises—kept many a New York commuter happy in the past 15 years. It pacified babies, wakened sleepers, gave even the card players something to smile about.

Then came the injunction. Too many complaints, said McCarthy's supervisor.

But the railroad did not reckon on the letter-writers. They wrote Alpert that McCarthy's cheery warbling was needed in the drab world of commuting. One suggested a promotion for the conductor.

The clearance came from Alpert, who earlier had noted that "a little whistling does no harm."

"The word was passed on down to me through the ranks," said McCarthy. "I plan to start whistling again."

KF Soldier Given Award

Capt. Thomas H. Wilson of Klamath Falls was one of two officers of the Army's First Cavalry division to receive a top award recently for outstanding leadership given officers of the First Army stationed in the Far East.

The awards, called the I. D. White Awards for Outstanding Leadership on the Company Level, were presented by General White, for whom the awards are named.

Captain Wilson was judged the First Army's outstanding company commander during the first quarter of this year. He commands a mortar battery. He competed against officers stationed in the entire Pacific Area. He is stationed in Korea.

Captain Wilson is the husband of the former Patricia McCroskey, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. W. H. McCroskey of this city. One of their sons, Richard, 8, attends Sacred Heart Academy. Other Wilson children are Robert, 2, and Russell, 5 months.

Captain Wilson entered the Massachusetts National Guard in 1939, and the regular Army in September, 1940. He started as a private in an anti-aircraft group, and received a commission as an infantry officer in March, 1945 at Fort Benning, Georgia.

He served for two years as an infantry board test officer at Fort Benning and spent the years from 1933, 1936 with the Seventh Cavalry Regiment in Japan. He has been in Korea eight months.

Local Woman Cultivates Odd Plant

Mrs. Harry Tear, 3444 Cheyenne Avenue, is cultivating an orchid that looks like a lily, but which is really a cactus.

The plant, whose glossy tentacles give it the appearance of a huge Fourth of July starburst after four years of growing, is not an orchid at all. It is an orchid cactus. It is native to the tropics, not the desert.

When Mrs. Tear got the plant from Dorothy Nolen, another orchid cactus fancier from Klamath Falls, it was only a slip that when planted took root quickly in a sandy loam mixture of soil.

It gathered its strength for a couple of years. On its third birthday it bloomed a little. This June it is covered with waxy red blossoms, some of them six or seven inches across. And about 50 or 60 buds are waiting to bloom.

Mrs. Tear keeps the rare plant in a hanging planter in her "garden room," near a window where it gets plenty of light. Growing the plant was easy, she said, although it is not adaptable to outdoors in Klamath County. It grows well in porous soil. It gobble up fertilizer and water. Its roots like lots of room.

Other species of the plant produce pink blossoms.

Sheriff Le Nard Johnson called off the land search for Jesse M. Drury III of Holladay, Utah, a Salt Lake City suburb. Drury failed to return Monday from an excursion down the Colorado River.

Johnson planned dredging operations in the river below a point where search parties found a dirt trail carved in. He said the youth apparently fell from the trail, hit two ledges and then tumbled into the river.

Politico Asks To Save Home

SPOKANE, Wash. (AP)—Wall Heiner, who has been active in local politics and was an unsuccessful candidate for Democratic nomination to Congress last year, placed an advertisement in Tuesday's Chronicle.

It read: "Naomi, I'm truly sorry I forced you to make so many sacrifices. Please give me a chance to make amends. I'll forget politics and do anything I can to keep our family together. Anyone could get a divorce—not anyone can save a marriage. I plead for another chance. Wall." Heiner said his wife filed for divorce, left their home last week and he hasn't seen her since. They have been married eight years and have two children.

South Koreans Issue Appeal

SEOUL, South Korea (AP)—A group of South Koreans appealed to the American Red Cross today to intervene in the dispute over Japanese plans to repatriate destitute Koreans to Communist North Korea. The appeal was presented to U.S. Ambassador Walter Dowling.

Japan and North Korea agreed on the repatriation in principle last week, and negotiators for the two governments are now working on a detailed agreement. South Korea claims the repatriates are being sent to Communist slavery.

Bank Statement Call Issued

WASHINGTON (AP)—The comptroller of the currency today issued a call for a statement on the condition of all national banks at the close of business Wednesday, June 10.

The Federal Reserve Board also called for condition statements from member banks and the Federal Deposit Insurance Corp. asked similar reports from insured banks, both for the same date.

Reds Calculate Meteor's Speed

PRAGUE, Czechoslovakia, (AP)—The exact speed of a meteor entering the atmosphere of the earth was calculated by simultaneous photography for the first time in history, the official Czechoslovak news agency CTK reported today.

Czechoslovak scientists photographed a big, brilliant celestial body on April 7 from two different stations before it came down in Bohemia. Its speed was calculated at 20.9 kilometers (about 12.9 miles) per second, the report said.

License Renewal Reminder Given

The Oregon Department of Motor Vehicles, in the interest of vacationers whose budgets are limited, issued a stern warning today that auto registrations due to expire in June should be renewed before the end of the month.

Newest KF-Reno Air Plea Handed To CAB Officials

Klamath Falls latest appeal for service to Reno was presented to the Civil Aeronautics Board in Washington today.

The written "Petition for Reconsideration" is a natural aftermath of a CAB ruling May 26 that authorized service to Boise, and permitted West Coast Airlines to take over United Air Lines' service here.

But the ruling rejected once again the Reno run.

It has been 12 years since the Reno-Klamath Falls air service dream first was conceived.

Chamber of Commerce Manager E. Frank Tucker based his petition on the May ruling and said the CAB was not fully apprised of the Reno run's possibilities because the board's examiner "did not make a complete analysis on this route."

"Otherwise," Tucker's appeal said, "he would have found that a profit very definitely could be obtained, rather than his contention that a subsidy requirement would be needed."

Tucker said vital data "was overlooked when the decision was being formulated." These included the growth and potential of Klamath Falls, the expansion of Kingsley Field's Air Force installation, and the present difficulties involved in getting between Klamath Falls and Reno by air now.

The metropolitan area of Klamath Falls, Tucker said, now is estimated at 36,421. Included are 5,000 persons involved with Kingsley Field in one way or another who were not here last January 1.

Military travel needs between Kingsley Field and Stead Air Force Base in Reno are steadily increasing, the petition noted. It added that efforts are being made to curtail flights by Military Air Transport Service, which competes

with commercial aviation in many ways.

As for the time now required to fly between Klamath Falls and Reno, the petition said it amounted to six hours. This not only doubles the mileage involved but doubles the fare.

For these reasons, and a few others, Tucker asked the CAB to reverse its negative ruling on the Reno route and asked "that your board review the entire record of this route instead of the incomplete consideration given you as recommendation by the examiner."
