

Champ, Ingemar Baffling

GROSSINGER, N.Y. (AP) — In ever two heavyweights approached a championship fight with more divergent methods of training than Floyd Patterson and Ingemar Johansson, it must have been when Max Baer was bewildering boxing experts.

Johansson, the Swedish challenger who'll try to lift the world title from Patterson next Thursday night, winds up the hard work of training here today.

"I finished my roadwork today. I finish my boxing tomorrow," Johansson said Thursday after a 7-round session in the ring.

"After that I just walk and rest and soak up energy."

Patterson, in his Chatham, N.J., camp, plans to keep right on working up to the day before the fight, even though his handlers think he is close to peak form right now.

The champion did no boxing Thursday but ran four miles as usual and later went for a walk with his sparring partners. He plans to box today, Saturday, Sunday and possibly Monday. And he'll continue road work until Wednesday.

Johansson hasn't neglected boxing and road work, but his theory is that once he has achieved top condition, the relaxed approach will bring him up to the fight in better physical and mental condition.

"I feel myself getting stronger and stronger," he explained seriously. "A shadow box before a mirror and always see my good right hand hitting him and knocking him out. It happens again and again. It's very nice."

Ingemar's right hand—good or otherwise—has been the subject of considerable speculation during the training period. He has used it very seldom against his sparring partners. And there was a story going around that he still is troubled by hand injuries incurred in his amateur days. Johansson says that's sheer nonsense.

'100 To Go' Says Haney

LOS ANGELES (AP) — The Milwaukee Braves had just come close to blowing their National League lead in a most embarrassing manner when their little manager popped out of the shower drying himself in a most casual manner.

"Just another game," said Fred Haney quietly. "We've still got about a hundred of them to go." Haney's Braves had beaten the Los Angeles Dodgers 7-6. The Braves took a 7-0 lead, then squandered all but one run of it before Don McMahon (finally) killed them out with two hitless innings of relief.

And, even without allowing a hit, McMahon had his troubled moments. He came on with none

out in the eighth and a man on second base with what might have been the tying run. He eventually stranded that man at third, then let the Dodgers get another runner on second in the ninth before he finally shut them off. The victory kept the Braves a half game ahead of the second-place San Francisco Giants, whom they play tonight.

All this may not have excited Haney the way it did the crowd of 32,278, but in the last inning his bullpen was occupied by No. 1 and No. 2 starters—Warren Spahn and Lew Burdette.

"You gotta put a show on," Haney said. "People get a kick out of seeing them out there warming up."

PORTLAND (AP) — Two startling upsets Thursday drove the defending champions out of the 1959 Oregon Amateur Golf Tournament here.

Bob Atkinson Jr. of Portland bowed in the men's quarter-finals, as did Grace DeMoss of Corvallis in the women's competition.

As semi-final 36-hole matches began today, here was the lineup for the men:

Atkinson began play Thursday as if he were headed for a second straight title when he laced together a series of birdies for a 5 and 4 victory over Walt Cline Jr. of Salem.

But in the day's second match, a quarter-final contest, he slipped appreciably. Atkinson lost the first hole on a bad chip shot and his opponent, Wells, began building a margin.

Wells took the 13th with a birdie. On the 14th, Atkinson failed to get out of a trap in three strokes, conceded the hole and the match was over.

Wells' opponent today, Rosenblatt, had little trouble in beating Matt Hatala of Portland 4 and 3 in Thursday's quarter-finals.

Krieger and Stearns also won handily in the quarter-finals.

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Portland Bevos Swat Slipping Phoenix 9

The Portland Beavers took over undisputed possession of fourth place in the Pacific Coast League behind a three-hit pitching performance by Marty Kutyna Thursday night.

He pitched the Beavers to 2-1 victory over Phoenix, although for a few minutes in the seventh inning the crowd thought the Beavers were going under.

Willie McCovey of Phoenix slammed a long drive to right-center field. Outfielder Russ Snyder dashed to the concrete wall, 408 feet from the plate, plainly got the ball in his glove, then crumpled to the ground, the ball rolling free.

McCovey circled the bases easily while the Beavers ran out to see what had happened to Snyder. It turned out he had banged his head against the wall and was momentarily groggy.

And to the delight of the Portland crowd the umpire ruled Snyder had held the ball long enough to retire McCovey.

So instead of Phoenix having a 2-1 lead it was a 1-1 game and the Beavers promptly got Kutyna the winning margin in the bottom of the seventh as Jim Westlake doubled and scored on another double by Milt Graff.

Portland's first run came in the first inning on a walk, a single by Snyder and a run-scoring single by George Freese.

Portland got only the four hits off young Don Hyman.

Kutyna gave up a run only in the sixth when Hyman tripled and Josa Pagan singled.

Portland now is two games behind third-place San Diego, which split a twin bill with Spokane. San Diego won the opener 8-1 then lost 4-3.

Sacramento meanwhile took a doubleheader from Seattle. The Solons, whacked twice by the last-place Seattle Rainiers in a bargain bill Wednesday night, recovered Thursday night and whacked Seattle twice in another doubleheader, 2-1 in seven innings and 2-1 in 10 innings.

The brace of victories gave the Solons a two-game cushion over the second-place Vancouver Mounties, who had to go 11 innings for the second night in a row to beat Salt Lake City's Bees. This time it was 10-9.
