

Jet Age Too Much For Argentines

BUENOS AIRES (UPI) — Aerolineas Argentinas reacted like a real good neighbor—and sport—to the news that its wings are apparently going to be clipped by Pan American World Airways in the jet age derby.

Pan Am has announced it plans to begin jet passenger service between the U.S. and South America at the end of April. Previously, Pan Am had indicated its jets would not be on the South American run until late this year, giving Aerolineas Argentinas the inside track.

But the Argentine airline sent out word through its public relations chief, Arquimedes Garcia Diaz, that "we are not in a race with Pan American. In fact, we really are delighted with the news."

Chin still up, Garcia Diaz added: "We congratulate Pan American on opening jet service to South America. Their jet service, and jets in general are revolutionizing the aviation industry and making an important contribution to the progress of the world community."

Of course, the Argentine line could be—and is—fortified by the knowledge that while Pan Am will be first to offer jet flights between North and South America, Aerolineas will pioneer in jet service between South America and Europe.

In this continent, the matter of who's "first" has more than passing importance. The Pan American-Panagra (Pan American Grace) combination has long dominated the Latin air scene, but it's lately been getting some stiff competition from the cutrate service provided by many of the more than 60 airlines that operate south of the Rio Grande.

Most of the Latin - American airlines function in the red, with their governments picking up the tab in return for carrying the nation's banner to foreign lands.

Aerolineas Argentinas is also government-subsidized, but it can—and does—lay claim to vast experience: 31 years in the business, pilots who have flown more than 120 million miles, and so on.

Its jet service to Europe, South Africa and, eventually, New York, will be aboard six British-made Comet Fours, the first of which was commissioned in ceremonies attended by Argentine President Arturo Frondizi.

That's how important the Argentines consider this matter of entering the jet age.

Chicago To Mark Opening

CHICAGO (UPI) — Visitors to Chicago this summer will participate in one of the city's biggest tourist seasons.

Along with the normal amount of activity in museums, parks, sports, concerts, beaches, there will also be the international Trade Fair from July 2 to July 18 to celebrate the long-awaited opening of the St. Lawrence Seaway. Participating in the observances will be Queen Elizabeth II, as monarch of neighboring Canada.

The Festival of the Americas from August 3 to September 7, will include the Pan American Games from August 27 until its conclusion. Called the Olympics of the western hemisphere, the Pan American Games will bring to the U.S. more Latin Americans than any other single event in recent years.

Chicago is preparing not only to accommodate the athletes but to provide the necessary facilities for their competition. Rowing events, which cannot be held on the choppy Lake Michigan, will be moved to the rivers and canals of the Illinois Waterway.

Bone Up On Psychology If Dog Giving You Fits

NEW YORK (UPI)—Bone up on psychology if your dog occasionally wraps you around his furry paw.

So says Robert Bartos, a student of dog psychology and manager of research kennels for a dog food firm.

"Never underestimate the power of a pet, especially if that pet is a dog," said Bartos.

"Some dogs know their masters better than the masters know the dogs. The dogs, therefore, take advantage of the masters' good nature to get away with all sorts of lowdown dog tricks."

A dog that is psychologically in the know, Bartos said, may feign tiredness when he wants to turn his snout up, spurning a walk in the rain or a ride in a convertible.

Or, said the expert, he may head for the dog house when you want to show company how well he obeys commands—even though the dog knows perfectly well what is expected.

"In these cases, praise doesn't work, for the more you praise, the more the dog will try to pull the wool over your eyes."

"Only punishment or some other show of displeasure will make such an ornery fellow respond. A sharp reprimand or one or two hard taps on the back with a newspaper will work wonders. He'll know his master is wise to his bluffing."

For the normally shy dog, however, this approach won't work when you want him to perform.

"A soft voice and a great deal of praise and gentle handling will bring out the best of his shy nature. He may be a people-hater from way back and you've got to convince him that people are nice."

Bartos said the introvert or extrovert type is as common in the dog world as it is in the "people world."

Extrovert dogs, he said, resemble the salesman type. They like nothing better than to be on the go

all day and prefer to be surrounded by people and doggie friends most of their waking hours.

The introvert type is just the

opposite. He feels absolutely miserable with a lot of people or dogs, and prefers to be left alone to contemplate life.

Such a dog, said Bartos, enjoys snoozing much of the time, with an occasional walk — alone — to break the monotony.

Editor Shows Power In Own Kitchen

NEW YORK (UPI)—A Louisiana newspaperman made news with his cooking during the American Press Institute seminar for managing and news editors.

Managing Editor Ernest Gueymard of the Baton Rouge State Times moved into the kitchen during a break from the regular work sessions on the Columbia University campus.

Later, 27 other news executives, all men, were smacking their mouths over "Cheese Balls Beau regard."

Gueymard's recipe for this hot snack: One and one-half cups grated cheese (½ sharp cheddar, ½ mild cheddar); 3 egg whites; 1 level tablespoon flour; dash of Louisiana Tabasco sauce or any other hot sauce; and cracker meal.

Mix flour with cheese and then fold in stiffly beaten egg whites. Spoon out with small spoon, roll in cracker crumbs, and then form ball with palm of hands, but roll lightly.

Keep in refrigerator at least one hour, or as long as desired, to set; then remove from refrigerator about 30 to 45 minutes before needed.

Drop in hot fat (375 degrees), preferably using basket, as for fried potatoes, and leave in fat only a brief period. (Said Gueymard, "I count to 15.") Remove when cheese ball is tan, not brown. If done properly, cheese in middle will be runny and outside golden. When you remove balls from hot fat, place on absorbent paper for a few seconds, then transfer to napkin-covered dish.

Serve with highballs and cocktails.

"P.S.," said Gueymard, "Cheese balls go well with mint juleps, sub."
