

Cleveland Sweeps Yankee Twinbill; Milwaukee Wallops San Francisco

Aaron Bat Produces 3 Homers

All's well again with the Milwaukee Braves. Henry Aaron is hitting again.

For a full week Aaron's bat was still as his average dropped from .408 to .389. The Braves went right down with him, losing first place to San Francisco after holding the lead for more than a month.

Aaron got only a single Saturday as the Braves defeated the Giants to regain first place. But it was different Sunday. Hammering Hank blasted three home runs, each with a man on base, and the Braves pummeled the Giants 13-3 to open up a game and a half lead.

Braves 13, Giants 3
The three home runs raised Aaron's batting average to .391, boosted his home run output to 19 and his runs batted in total to 61. Del Crandall and Johnny Logan also homered to make it easy for Warren Spahn to register his ninth victory against eight losses.

Johnny Antonelli, victim of a five-run burst in the first inning, was charged with his fourth defeat. He has won 10.

Pittsburgh's third place Pirates split with St. Louis, winning 10-8 after the Cardinals had taken the opener 5-1. Cincinnati walloped the Los Angeles Dodgers 7-3 and the Chicago Cubs shut out the Philadelphia Phillies 4-0 behind Johnny Buzhardt's one-hit pitching.

Cincy 17, Bums 3
Don Newcombe put on quite a show in Los Angeles. The big Cincinnati right-hander, traded by the Dodgers last June, registered his eighth victory and seventh in succession. He got four hits in four times at bat, driving in four runs and scoring three.

Cards 5-8, Bucs 1-10
Catcher Danny Kravitz had 5-for-5, including three doubles, in the second game for the Pirates. Twelve doubles were hit, seven by the Cards. Three Red Bird homers, by Bill White, Hal Smith and Alex Grammas, helped Larry Jackson gain his sixth victory in the opener. Stan Musial walloped a double, the 632nd of his career, for a National League record. He had been tied with Hall of Famer Honus Wagner.

Cubs 4, Phillies 0
A third inning single by catcher Carl Sawatski was the only hit off Buzhardt. The 22-year-old right-hander allowed only one other batter to reach base, on a walk. Sammy Taylor's two-run homer, off loser Ruben Gomez, provided Buzhardt with more runs than he needed.

Ford Closes Long Drought
MONTREAL (AP) — The long drought has ended for 36-year-old Doug Ford.

The free-swinging veteran from Paradise, Fla., was beginning to think that perhaps he'd never win another golf tournament. All through the pro circuit this year, he has been near, but never quite at the top.

But Sunday he came from behind a one-stroke deficit to capture the Canadian Open with a 72-hole total of 276, and haul down top prize of \$3,500.

Ford shot a final round of 2 under par 70 to finish the tournament 12 strokes under regulation figures. He was two strokes to the good of three runners-up at the end.

One of them was Dow Finsterwald of Tequesta, Fla., who shared the third-round lead at 205 Saturday with Bruce Crampton of Sydney, Australia.

But Finsterwald blew to a 3-over-par 8 on the second hole. He finished with 73 for a 278 total.

Tied with him for second place and collecting \$1,866 each were Art Wall Jr., of Pocono Manor, Pa., who lost his chance for top money when he hooked into the rough and bogied the 17th, and Bo Winger of Odessa, Tex., who shot a 68 on the last round.

Crampton, 23-year-old blond Australian who became a gallery favorite after taking the lead on the second round, fell apart completely. He soared to a 75, three over par, and was left in a tie for fifth at 280.

U.S. Open champion Billy Casper had a 66 on the final round but finished well back at 283.

Klamath Falls American Legion baserunners got plenty of exercise as they swarmed over Grants Pass 24-4 in a one game legion league stand in Gem Stadium Sunday afternoon.

Originally slated for a pair of games, the first, a seven inning test which counts in league play, and a non-counting five inning second, the series was brought to a close at the end of the first game.

Grants Pass coach Rex Ingram, highly disgruntled over his team's performance in the landslide loss refused to field the team for the second game. A good crowd of Sunday baseball fans gave vent to their disapproval of his decision but he remained adamant.

The victory is the third straight in league action for coach Hi Hatfield's local legion nine against no defeats.

Klamath Falls pitcher Blake Griggs spaced eight Grants Pass hits, walked only two men and struck out nine in gaining credit for the win.

Between himself and his teammates Grants Pass pitchers were attacked for 19 hits, including three triples and a double. They were also issued eight walks while only four struck out. Starter Bill Cole was charged with the loss although three other hurlers got into the act before the slaughter was over. Also serving on the mound were Larry Janssen, Jeri Patterson and Ken Parker.

The KF batsmen were led by pitcher Griggs and centerfielder Don Willey. Each accounted for a three-bagger and three singles while driving home four runs apiece. Catcher Dave Saks, who rapped three for three, exploded the third triple and collected one RBI.

Other Klamath players to get more than one hit—second baseman Smiley Herrera who had two singles in three trips, Yunc, a single and a double, and third baseman Estin Kiger who rapped two for three.

Indians Stretch Margin

The Cleveland Indians owned their biggest lead in the American League since May 26 today and they owe it to the determination and the strong right arms of pitchers Cal McLish and Jim Grant.

It was McLish and Grant who slowed up the on-rushing New York Yankees Sunday by pitching the Indians to a doubleheader sweep, 4-2 and 5-4 in 14 innings. The victories boosted the Indians' first place margin to two games over Chicago and shoved the defending champion Yanks back into the second division.

The largest crowd of the major league season — 68,680 Yankee Stadium spectators — sat through seven hours and 14 minutes and saw McLish and Grant go all the way although giving up 25 hits between them.

McLish registered his seventh victory despite allowing 11 hits in the opener. He left 13 Yankees stranded. Grant hurled all 14 innings in the nightcap, winning his fifth as he yielded 14 hits. He left 12 Yankees stranded.

Billy Pierce pitched the White Sox into second place, with a 3-2 triumph over Boston that dropped the Red Sox into the American League cellar, two percentage points behind Washington. The Senators climbed up to seventh by thrashing Detroit 4-3 and 7-5. The double defeat lowered the Tigers into a third place tie with Baltimore, which bowed to Kansas City 7-0.

Indians 4-5, NY 2-4
Rocky Colavito and Vic Power shared the hitting honors for the Indians. Each hit two homers, one in each game. Colavito's first game homer, with a man on base in the third inning, proved to be the winning blow. Power's second homer came in the 14th inning of the nightcap and snapped a 4-4 tie. The blow came off Jim Coates, third Yankee pitcher, who had given up a run in the 13th only to have the Yankees get it back in their half of the inning.

The double defeat dropped the Yankees into fifth place, 3½ games off the pace. A sweep would have boosted the Yankees, who had won five straight and 17 of their last 23, into first place by half a game.

Chicago 3, Boston 2
Pierce won his eighth game with a six-hitter against the Red Sox. He got one of Chicago's seven hits and drove in what proved to be the winning run with a force play in the fourth.

Boston had the tying run on second with one out in the ninth but the veteran southpaw disposed of the next two batters without further damage. Home runs by Harry Simpson and Sammy Esposito accounted for Chicago's first two runs.

Nats 4-7, Tigers 3-5
Washington's double win was its first of the season. The Senators overcame a 3-0 deficit in the opener, then scored the winning run in the ninth when Detroit pitcher Barney Schultz let Harmon Killebrew's two-out groundout with the bases full go through his legs.

A home run by rookie Bob Allison, his 18th, featured Washington's six-run blast in the fourth inning of the nightcap. Roy Sievers also homered for Washington, the 200th of his career.

KC 7, Baltimore 0
Veteran Ned Garver not only pitched a three-hit shutout for Kansas City, but hit a home run, double and single as the A's rapped loser Arnie Portocarrero and Billy Hoelt for 16 hits.

CHATHAM, N.J. (AP) — While Ingemar Johansson played golf and swam with his fiancée at a plush mountain resort, heavyweight champion Floyd Patterson sweated out 4½ pounds in the oven heat of an old-fashioned training camp.

Tue contrast between the training methods of the unbeaten challenger from Sweden and the champion never was more pronounced than it was Sunday.

Johansson finished his boxing Saturday at Grossinger, N.Y., sparring six rounds without throwing his right hand more than six or seven times. He will do no more ring work until the fight Thursday night at Yankee Stadium.

Patterson cut his work to two rounds at Ehsan's camp where about 1,000 spectators crowded inside and around the tiny gymnasium. Trainer Dan Florio said Floyd weighed 184½ pounds when he started. After the workout, the champ said he weighed 180.

In many ways the scene at Chatham reminded you of the old days at Pompton Lakes, N.J. when Joe Louis' camp drew loads of Sunday visitors at a fee. There was one important difference. No admission is charged at Patterson's camp. Some body spread a rumor that there was free beer.

The champ had planned to box three or four rounds. Instead he went only two, one each with Bill Tate of Chicago and Lou Jones of Rockford, Ill. He concentrated on defense but had to be called off by his trainer while battering Tate against the ropes. He also threw a fast flurry at Jones.

Rocky Marciano, the retired undefeated champ, was at ringside. "This is the fastest heavyweight I ever saw," said Marciano, who said he weighed 220 pounds. "I wouldn't like to compare him with Johansson. I only saw Johansson two rounds Saturday."

Newsmen crowded around him. Someone said, "Are you nervous with the fight close at hand?" The handsome Swede answered quickly and clearly, "Why should I be? I am a professional."
