

Salem '9' 3-Time Winner

Salem all but ran away with the first half Northwest League championship on a three-game sweep over the weekend, beating Wenatchee Saturday in a single game and then sweeping by the Chiefs 7-3 and 3-2 in a doubleheader Sunday.

The last-place Yakima Bears drew a crowd of 2,000 for Father's Day and responded by defeating Tri-City 2-0 and 9-3. Lewiston and Eugene split in the third NWL double bill, the Braves winning the opener 9-2 and the Emeralds taking the nightcap 5-2 on Bob Bolin's three hits.

The Senators ran their win string to five with the weekend sweep. Don Schaefer was tagged for a two-run homer by Jerry Mason in the first inning of the opener, but he won by holding the Chiefs to six hits. The winners got all the runs they needed in the same inning as Carl Hutzler hit a two-run single and Joe Wilson a two-run double. Bob Folkert added a homer in the fourth.

In the nightcap, Salem scored all its runs in the fourth on five hits and two walks. Doubles by Danny Holden and Hank Bivens were key blows. A crowd of 1,630 watched.

George Player allowed Tri-City only two hits in the opener—both in the first inning. He helped his cause in the fifth with a double and scored on an error. Pete Gonzaga was the hero in the second game. He smashed a home run in a pinch-hit role—his second homer and third hit in four such appearances—and drove in the runs that broke up a tie. The Braves had taken off with four runs in the first on one error and five hits, led off by Harry Dunlop's double.

Lewiston pushed six runs across in the fourth inning of the opener, two driven in with pitcher Bob Sutton's single and two others by Chuck Stacy's double. In the nightcap, Bolin threw his three-hitter at the Braves. The only runs off the 6-foot-5 right-hander came on Dick McDonald's homer in the second. Singles by Bolin, Mel Krause and Joe Moran, combined with two errors, gave the Emeralds more than enough margin with four in the fourth. Krause added a homer in the sixth.

Hedlund Wins Jaycee Meet

PRINEVILLE, Ore. (AP)—John Hedlund of Oswego Sunday won the Oregon Jaycee Golf Tournament by a two-stroke margin over Lynn Yturri of Ontario, the defending champion.

Hedlund was four strokes over par with a 69 Sunday but had a Saturday round of 66 for a winning total of 135.

Yturri shot a 71 in his first round. He fired a 66 Sunday and wound up with a 137.

Chuck Allen of Roseburg was third with 75-65-140, and Kermit Kelling of Beaverton took fourth with 70-73-143.

Those four top finishers now will represent Oregon in the National Jaycee tournament.

Portland Bevos Split Bill, Mounties Topple Senators

The Vancouver Mounties took advantage of the first day of summer to make the Pacific Coast League pennant race just a little bit hotter. Second place Vancouver picked up a full game by downing the league-leading Sacramento Solons 7-3.

Spokane kept up its sizzling pace by taking its fourth victory over Phoenix, a 6-1 win that halted the Indians into fourth place in the standings.

In other games, Portland lost to San Diego 4-3 but won the second game 5-3 while Salt Lake City swept two from Seattle, 8-3 and 3-1.

Sacramento gave righthander Carl Greene a one-run lead in the first inning but the Mounties erased the advantage with two runs in the third, one of which was a 370-foot homer by Barry Shettrone. Vancouver scored another tally in the fifth and piled on three runs in the sixth to rout both Greene and reliever Jerry Nelson.

The last two Solon runs came on homers by Clay Dalrymple in the sixth and eighth innings.

Spokane's victory over Phoenix gave the Indians their seventh win in eight home starts. Chuck Essegian, Steve Bilko and Al Norris shared hitting honors as the Indians got a run in the first, three more in the fourth and single tallies in the fifth and sixth.

Essegian and Bilko each got doubles and Norris whacked out his seventh home run of the season.

The Giants scored in the second and threatened in the seventh and ninth innings but double plays and a hit-robbing catch by Essegian killed the rallies.

Jim Greengrass blasted a three-run homer in the eighth inning, but Portland was unable to overcome San Diego's first game lead. The Pads had scored three in the

first and picked up what proved to be the clincher in the sixth.

Portland saw a two-run lead gained on Dave Melton's homer melt in the second game as the Padres scored two runs of their own and then went into the lead on a homer by Rudy Regalado.

The Reavers went ahead to stay in the fourth when Jack Littrell singled in one run and Len Neal, another, Littrell provided the ice with another RBI in the fifth.

The Bees made it warm for former teammate Don Urquhart as they blasted 16 hits off the Seattle pitcher. R. C. Stevens provided the stinger with three RBIs in four trips to the plate. Salt Lake took a 1-0 lead when Carlos Hernandez tripled and came home on a sacrifice fly. They added a pair of runs in the fourth, another pair in the seventh and padded their win with three more in the ninth.

Bernier broke the second game open when he lined out a double to bring in two runs in the sixth. Seattle got an unearned run in its half of the sixth when winning pitcher Ed Baiza walked two men and second baseman Jim Baumer was charged with an error for a wild throw.

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Oregon's brilliant mile runners, freshman Dyrrol Burleson and senior Jim Grelle, joined by former University of Oregon runner Bill Dellinger, will meet Russian trackmen in a duel meet at Philadelphia July 18-19.

The first two finishers in each event at the national AAU meet at Boulder, Colo., over the weekend were named for that meet and the three Oregon men thus qualified.

Burleson, in his first public test against Grelle, the NCAA mile champion, cracked the AAU 1500 meter record with a time of 3:47.5. Grelle trailed by nine-tenths of a second.

Dellinger, now with the Air Force, won the 5000 meters in 14:47.6.

Three years ago another Oregon pair finished 1-2 in the AAU mile. Then it was Jim Bailey who was first and Dellinger was second.

This year's trio of Burleson, Grelle and Dellinger, in addition to being named for the meet with Russia, also were picked for the Pan American Games at Chicago beginning Aug. 28.

Burleson and Grelle are expected to be seen at home in the Oregon AAU meet at Eugene July 4.

Top Trio To Enter Pan-Ams

BOULDER, Colo. (AP)—The Stars and Stripes will be carried into international track and field competition this summer by a balanced array of veteran champions and bright young newcomers.

The athletes who finished 1-2-3 in the National AAU Championships during the weekend will represent the United States in the Pan-American Games at Chicago beginning Aug. 28.

The top two finishers meet a Russian dual team in Philadelphia July 18-19. Other leading performers were picked on squads to tour Germany and Scandinavia. Three of the brilliant youngsters are sprinter Ray Norton, San Jose State senior; miler Dyrrol Burleson, Oregon's freshman sensation, and Tom Murphy, the New York Athletic Club's 800-meter runner.

But one of the best in the AAU, Charlie Tidwell, Kansas University junior, failed to make the traveling teams because his specialty—200 meters hurdles—is not an international event.

Tidwell raced to an AAU and American record in winning the race in 22.6 seconds. That erased Harrison Dillard's AAU record of 23.3 and Tidwell's American mark of 22.7.

Norton, winner of the 100 and 200 meter dashes, was voted the outstanding athlete at the two-day meet.

Burleson smashed the AAU 1500 meters record with a 3 minute 47.5 seconds clocking over the course, 120 yards short of a mile.

Frank Potts, University of Colorado coach who will guide the U. S. team against Russia, called Burleson "the finest young miler in the United States—capable of running a four-minute mile."

Murphy a grad student at Manhattan College, won the 800 meters in 1:47.9, just three-tenths of a second off the AAU record set in 1953 by Arnie Sowell of Pittsburgh.

Pete Newell Undecided

BERKELEY, Calif. (AP)—

Whether basketball coach Pete Newell will remain at California or accept a University of Washington offer may be decided Monday.

Then again, the decision "may not come until the middle of the week," Newell said.

"There was no term of contract or specific salary discussed. They just said they would like to see me come up," added the coach of the national champion Golden Bears, who have also won the Pacific Coast Conference title three years straight.

Paul T. (Bud) Hastings, executive director of the Associated Students, University of California, declared he thought "all problems could be straightened out" to keep Newell at UC.

Newell hasn't said what the problems are. "They are more or less private things I need to have straightened out. No use discussing the thing publicly since I think everything can be straightened out," he commented.

"There are a few questions in Pete's mind concerning the athletic policy," Hastings said, without elaborating. He added that he was calling a meeting Monday with Newell and athletic director Greg Engelhardt to discuss overall athletic policy. "I think things can be straightened out."

Southwest Favored To Produce Champ

EUGENE, Ore. (AP)—The East gained stature Sunday but the Southwest still was the favorite today to produce the champions at the 62nd annual National Collegiate Golf Tournament here.

Houston was the particular favorite, having won the team title the last three years and carried off the individual championship the last two.

Only one Houston player was in the annual East-West best ball contest which opened the tournament Sunday with the East winning 7-4-1.

He was Jacky Cupit, who scored an eagle on the 478-yard par 3 ninth hole as he and Bernie Magnusson of Stanford tied the favored duo of Tom Aaron of Florida and John Konsek of Purdue.

Konsek went to the finals in this tournament last year. Aaron is a Walker Cupper.

Cupit and Magnusson had a 35-31-69 on the par 37-41 Eugene Country Club course. Aaron and Konsek had 36-34-70.

Another Walker Cupper also is entered. He is Ward Wetlaufer of Hamilton College. He and Warren Sommers of Syracuse teamed for 33-33-66 in deadlocking with Jack Ellis of Oklahoma State and John Farquhar of Texas Tech.

The best round of the day was a 65, produced by two Eastern teams. Mike Phillips of Yale and George Goring of Princeton achieved it along with Gene Francis of Purdue and Frank Beard of Florida.

Bob Meiring of New Mexico won the long driving title, averaging 261 yards in three swats.

Charles Reeder of Princeton, however, had the longest single drive. He hit 270 yards on the fly. Meiring's best was 270.

The 150 entrants go 18 holes today and 18 Tuesday with the low 64 players then going into match play the rest of the week. The team title will go to the college with the lowest total for four players in the qualifying round.

Last year's champion, Phil Rodgers of Houston, is not back. Houston has several threats, including Bob Pratt, who went to the semi-finals before losing to Konsek last year.
