Solons Face Deadline Date

WASHINGTON (AP) — Congress heads into its annual end-of-June scramble this week to pass as many as possible of its big money bills before the new fiscal year begins July 1.

The House already has acted on most of the annual appropriations bills, but many still lie ahead for the Senate. Compromises of Senate and House versions also must be worked out.

Even after other money matters are straightened out, Congress still faces political battles over such major issues as the foreign aid program, an anti-racketeering labor bill, civil rights legislation and possibly some action on federal aid to education.

Threats of presidential vetoes already have forced Democratic whittling of spending programs in such fields as housing and airports—a situation which brought criticism of Democratic leaders.

Traffic Toll Passes 200

Two men were killed in separate automobile accidents over the weekend, pushing the Associated Press traffic fatality toll past the 200 mark for 1959.

A third woman died Saturday of injuries suffered when she fell and hit her head while pushing a car in her driveway Wednesday.

A new convertible overturned and slammed into a ditch near Oakridge Sunday, killing John King Snyder, 19, of Oakridge. Peter Henry Heidrich, 20, Oakridge, was injured critically in the crash, and taken to Sacred Heart Hospital in Eugene.

Boleslavs Pudis, 40, of 2925 S.E. 33th Ave., Portland, died Saturday of injuries after he was hit as he stepped out of his car onto the Banfield Freeway. Police said his car was involved in a two-car collision, and that Pudis was hit as he got out of his car to investigate the crash.

Mrs. Herman Muller, 65, of Dallas, was fatally injured Wednesday when she tried to start a car which was having mechanical trouble. The car started with a jerk, throwing Mrs. Muller to the ground. She hit her head on the car, and never regained consciousness.

PORTLAND (AP) — The chief of the U.S. Forest Service said Friday night he is opposed to turning large areas of public forests into single-use wilderness areas.

Guards March For Governor

FT. LEWIS, Wash. (AP)—Oregon and Washington national guardsmen launched the second week of their annual two weeks' summer training Monday.

proposals of some enthusiasts would set aside large blocks of national forests for the wilderness, which would limit them to recreational use.

McArdle told those attending the Citizens Conference on Pacific Northwest Forest Resources at Reed College here that the forests of the Northwest are not large enough to meet all the demands on them on a single-use basis.

He urged management that would not only meet recreational needs, but the needs of the timber industry, grazing and others.

"The Forest Service," he said, "is for a certain amount of wilderness and intends to preserve and protect its wilderness areas whether or not proposed legislation is passed."

"But there is a question of balance," he said, adding a warning to the timber industry:

"The national forests can't absorb all the pressure for more timber, although we have doubled the cut and tripled the volume sold since 1950."

"We must not overcut the nation's forests. Allowable cut is a ceiling, not a floor, and we will continue to practice sustained yield."

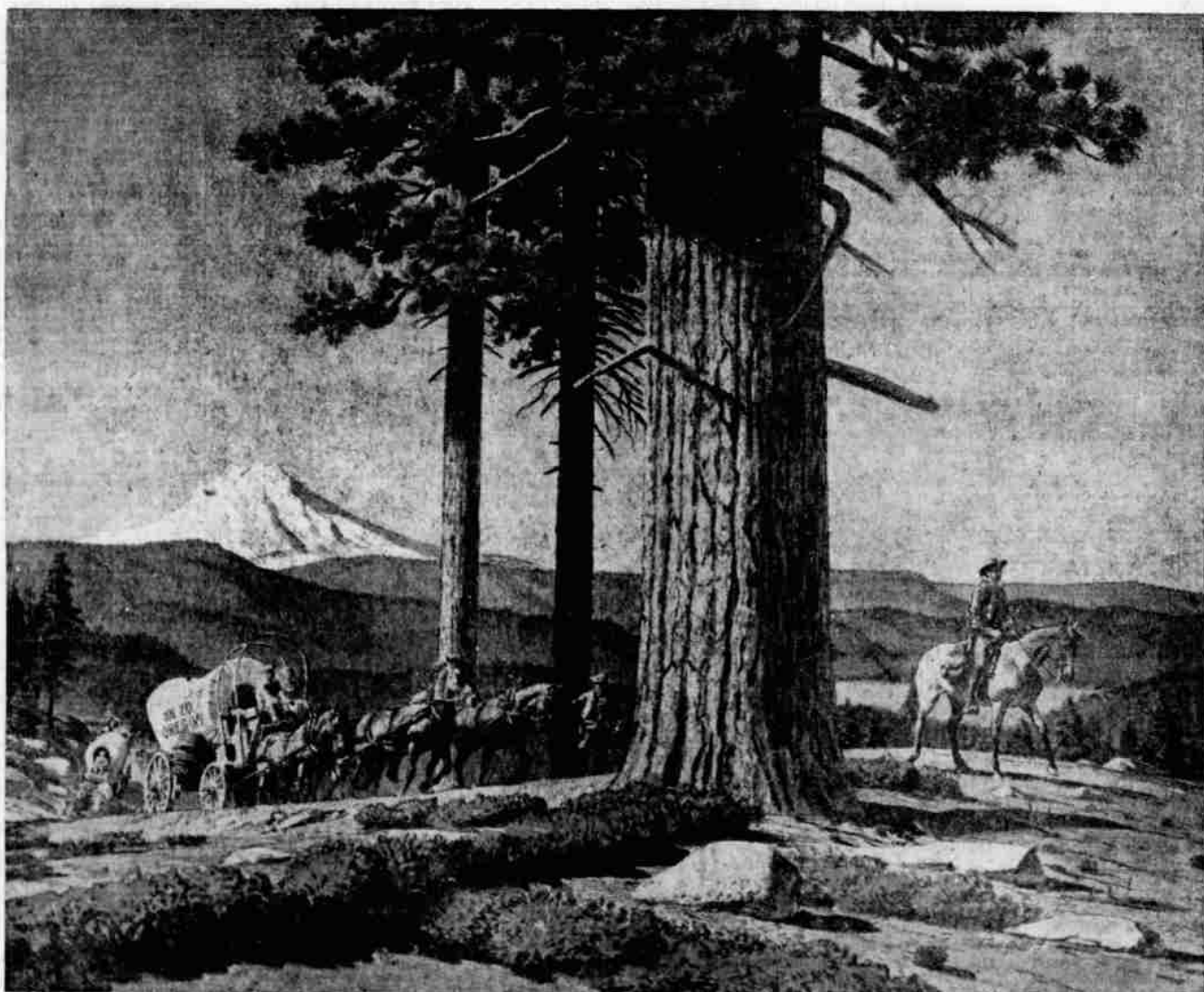
