

### Homage Paid To Barrymore

HOLLYWOOD JAP—The theatrical world pays final homage today to Ethel Barrymore.

Requiem Mass will be recited for the great actress in the Church of the Good Shepherd, Beverly Hills.

Miss Barrymore, 79, died of a heart ailment Thursday. She will be buried in Calvary Cemetery beside her brothers, John and Lionel.

Pallbearers will be Joseph Cotten, Orrin Kelly, Neil S. McCarthy, Herbert Bayard Swope Jr., Charles Brackett, Phil Dunne and Dr. Clyde Barton.

About 300 mourners attended recitation of the Rosary for Miss Barrymore Sunday night in the Church of the Good Shepherd.

Among representatives of the movie colony were Spencer Tracy, Ina Claire, Blanche Ring, Kelly and Cotten.

Miss Barrymore's three children Samuel Barrymore Colt, John Drew Colt and Ethel Barrymore Colt Miglietta, and the children of John Barrymore, John Jr. and Dolores Bedell, were present.

The other daughter of John Barrymore, actress Diana Barrymore, had planned to fly here for the funeral but could not because of burns suffered when a pot of boiling fat fell on her leg while she was cooking in her New York apartment.

Movie fans clustered in knots outside the church as the actress' casket was carried 30 feet past banks of floral wreaths into the sanctuary for the Rosary service.

### Cuba's Gay Gambling Belt Looks Like Ghost Town

HAVANA (AP)—The gambling belt that started out a few years ago to become the Las Vegas of the Caribbean is taking on the air instead of one of Nevada's ghost towns.

With few tourists, the luxury casinos that were thriving a year ago in a cascade of dollars are playing today to lots of empty seats. The outlook is grim, gambling operators say.

They are hanging on in hopes the start of the next tourist season will bring back the well heeled traveler. The tourist period is best between Dec. 1 and April 1.

The National Tourist Commission, with Prime Minister Fidel Castro's support, is running a promotion campaign. But casino operators claim the government hasn't done much to help them.

They would like to have slot machines. The one-armed bandits—termed "undesirable" by the government—were the first to go when Castro allowed the casinos to reopen in February.

Operators say slot machines are important because of their appeal to women. The revolution killed the last tourist season and sent the casinos reeling. They were closed for nearly two months after Dictator Fulgencio Batista fled on Jan. 1. Of nine Havana casinos permitted to reopen, seven accepted. Two have closed because of no business in the last month—the Deauville and Sans Souci. The five remaining of a multi-million dollar investment are: Habana Hilton, Riviera, Tropicana, Capri and Hotel Nacional.

Less enthusiastic operators are wondering if the tourists ever will come back in large numbers.

Although Castro himself often has cited the importance of tourism to the country, operators contend some government orders frighten the tourist away.

They cite the airport frisking of visitors—an order only recently lifted—for illegal Cuban pesos. Some arrests were made and the adverse publicity didn't help the casino or hotel business.

Although barred by an army of soldiers from the hotels, soldiers carrying long arms and submachine guns can be seen around the streets.

The government undertook a cleanup drive that hit at the city's usually unprohibited night life. Scores of houses of prostitution, suburban "shows" and other nocturnal features that made Ha-

vana the wicked lady of the Americas were shuttered.

FORT WORTH, Tex. (AP)—A child burned to death Sunday while a babysitter rescued his brother and two sisters from the second floor bedrooms of an apartment house.

The parents, Mr. and Mrs. Stephen Creed, both work nights. Valerie Pool, the babysitter, rescued Kathy, 6, a polio victim who uses crutches, Gail, 5, and Ricky, 3. She said she thought Stephen, 8, was with the group.

The boy's body was found wedged between a wall and his bed, only a few feet from the back door of the house.

### Youths Held For Shooting

DALTON, Ga. (AP)—Four white youths were held in jail today in connection with the fatal shooting of an 11-year-old Negro boy.

Sheriff Donald McArthur said warrants charging murder would be taken out against Kermit Pritchett Jr., 18; Herschell Elkins, 18; Billy Joe Flaten, 17; and Leroy Gentry, 23, all of Dalton.

The Negro, Tommy Dwight, was shot to death June 13 while he was at a fish fry at the home of his uncle, McArthur said.

The sheriff said the white youths admitted firing at the Negroes, but they said they were only trying to scare them and did not know anyone had been hit until the next morning.

### Heart Urged To Avoid UF

NEW YORK (AP)—Dr. Paul Dudley White has advised the American Heart Assn. not to merge its independent fund drive with United Fund or Community Chest drives.

White is the Boston heart specialist who attended President Eisenhower when he suffered a heart attack in 1955. He is a founder and past president of the American Heart Assn.

Heart disease, he said Sunday in a statement, is "too serious a problem to hide in a segment of a united fund."

Submerging the problems of heart disease in local Community Chests or United Funds, he added, "would seriously delay our effective progress in the treatment and control of this dangerous threat to our lives and health."

White said that while federated funds serve a useful purpose, they were never intended "to enter the fields of extensive and intensive scientific research or the training of research workers."
