

Koufax Red Hot

Yankees, San Francisco, Los Angeles Notch Wins

The way things have been going, Sandy Koufax doesn't care how he wins, just so he wins. Monday night, he did it with a spectacular strikeout performance that just missed the National League record.

It was the last day of May before the 23-year-old lefty gained his first victory. He put away his fourth in a row striking out 15 as he pitched Los Angeles to a 6-2 victory over Philadelphia.

That's a major league record for a night game, bettering the old mark of 14 held by Johnny Vander Meer, Sam Jones, Bob Feller and Bob Turley. It was only one shy of Dizzy Dean's National League record, set back in 1933 with the St. Louis Cardinals.

and but two short of the major league record set by Feller in 1938 with Cleveland.

Loser Jim Owens and reliever Humberto Robinson collected eight strikeouts between them, setting a modern NL record for two clubs and matching the modern major league record with a total of 24. The old NL record of 23 had been tied for the fourth time just last May 31 — when Koufax and reliever Danny McDevitt fanned 14 Cardinals.

The Dodgers moved past Pittsburgh into third place with the victory, three games behind first place Milwaukee. The Pirates were beaten 4-1 by San Francisco in the only other game scheduled as the second place Giants trimmed the Braves' lead to a single game again.

The New York Yankees rapped Kansas City 11-6 in the only American League game scheduled.

Dodgers 6, Phils 2

Although setting the one-game strikeout high in the majors this season, Koufax gave up 10 hits, one Harry Anderson's eighth home run, and didn't have a working lead until the Dodgers scored three in the fifth against Owens, now 4-5. Gil Hodges, who counted a first-inning run with a sacrifice fly, singled home a pair in the fifth.

Koufax's previous one-game high for strikeouts was 14. That came in his first complete game in the majors, a two-hit shutout against Cincinnati in 1955. The Brooklyn-born bonus kid, who has fanned

64 in 61 innings this season, had two strikes on each of the first two men he faced in the ninth, Joe Koppe and Richie Ashburn, but both fled out. The final out came when Dave Philley singled and was nailed trying for a double.

The Giants made it with a four-run seventh inning that gave Ed Fisher, a knuckleballing right hander, a victory in his major league debut. Fisher, 22 up from Phoenix with a 10-4 record, gave

Yankees 11, KC 6

Mickey Mantle and Bill Skowron are beginning to look like Mickey Mantle and Bill Skowron again for the New York's defending World Champion Yankees. But who would ever recognize Bob Turley?

The big right-hander, last year's top pitcher in the majors and the American League's top winner with a 21-7 record, failed to last again Monday night, almost blow-

ing a five-run lead as Mantle and Skowron powered the Yankees to an 11-6 victory at Kansas City.

Mantle drove in six runs with his 16th and 17th homers and a triple. Skowron belted home a pair with his 14th homer. But it was Bobby Shantz, the stubby southpaw, who kept the A's from keeping pace, gaining a 2-2 record with five innings of two-hit, shutout relief.

Turley, who has won but six while losing seven, matching his losses of last season, gave up five consecutive hits and four runs as the A's cut the Yankees' lead to 7-6 in the fifth inning before Shantz hurried in.

That was the only game scheduled in the AL and put the fifth-place champs within three games of

first and within a half game of Baltimore and Detroit, tied for third.

Mantle and Skowron drove in five of the first seven Yankee runs. The Mick, who led AL home run hitters in three of the past four seasons, now is within seven of major league leader Harmon Killebrew of Washington (24) after his first two-homer game of the year.

He got his first with the bases empty in the first inning off loser Ray Herbert (4-7). Then, after Skowron's blast in the fourth inning, Mantle chased the A's right-hander with a two-run triple as the Yankees scored four in the fifth. His other home run, with one on, was a shot over the fence in deep right-center off ex-Yan-

kee right-hander Tom Sturdivant in the seventh inning.

That gave Mantle four home runs and 11 RBI in the last seven games, his best spurt of the season.

Skowron has done even better. The Moose has hammered four home runs and driven in eight in the last four games for 32 RBI, one shy of AL leader Killebrew. Mantle has 44 RBI, tying Washington's Jim Lemon for fifth place. Houston University Star Leads Southwestern Golfers In NCGT

EUGENE, Ore. (AP) — The Southwest is out in front in the National Collegiate Golf Tournament today, an almost perennial condition.

Bob Pratt of Houston University led the way in the opening round Monday with a 34-32-66, 5 under the par 37-34-71 for the Eugene Country Club course. That shot his team well in front of the pack.

Houston has won the team title three consecutive years and the Southwest has captured it eight times in the last decade.

The individual title also has gone to a Houston player the last two years.

Pratt, who is from Renton, Wash., got to the semi-finals last year. He could well go all the way this year. He went over par on only two holes Monday, and

overcame that with six birdies and an eagle.

The eagle came on the 478-yard par-5 ninth hole, where he sank a 75-foot chip shot.

This tournament is likely to go to the player who consistently beats the par five holes. Pratt did just that on three of the four par five holes. Pratt needed just 22 putts on his round, overcoming a double bogey 6 on the eleventh hole.

East Side, MLJ Split BR Lead

Number 13 proved a popular one in some Babe Ruth circles Monday night as the two tied-for-top teams, East Side Electric and M. L. Johnson, each tallied that many runs in stopping Henley Sporting Goods and Fluhrer's Bakery on Conger Field.

The East Siders rapped the Fluhrer's nine 13-6 while M. L. Johnson dealt the Henley Sporting Goods squad a 13-1 whipping.

East Side and Fluhrer's broke about even until 10 Baker errors began to take their toll.

Winning hurler, Kent Hunsaker allowed six hits, walked 10 and struckout 12 over the distance while the loser, Gary Patzke, gave up eight hits, walked 12 and fanned 7.

Three East Siders shared the hitting limelight, Hunsaker rapping a home run, triple and a single; first baseman Bill Kennitzer collected a triple and a pair of doubles while Dave Stippich, third base, also smashed a triple.

Doug Puckett, center field, and Bill Murray, third base, were the big Fluhrer hitters. Puckett was credited with a single and a double while Murray bashed a triple.

In the MLJ-Henley contest, the Hemleyites broke into the score column first collecting their lone run in the bottom of the first frame off centerfielder Mike Tacchini's homer. The Insurance nine roared back for four in the third, one in the fifth and four each in the six and seventh cantos to put the game way out of reach.

The winner, Sherm Allen, gave up four hits, walked one and fanned 10 in his seven innings, while the loser, John Crumrine, who was relieved in the seventh, also struckout 10, walked three, but gave up eight hits.

Kent Franklin, MLJ first sacker rapped a double and single to lead his mates at the plate.

Houston, however, is not the entire Southwest. Oklahoma State is in second place in the team competition, 6 strokes behind Houston's 278. An Oklahoma State player, Jack Ellis, shot 35-33-68 to deadlock for runner-up to Pratt. Sharing the spot with Ellis is Tom Jakobsen of the host University of Oregon. He had 34-34-68.

Fifteen players bettered par. At 69 were Bob Snelling of Stanford, Jack Cupit of Houston and Bob Zimmerman of Duke. Another 9 were tied at 70.

Another 18-hole round today is to cut the field to 64 players for match play competition the rest of the week. Since there were 82 who scored 74 or better on the first round, it is likely to take a 148 to be sure of qualifying.

NEW YORK (UPI)—They were saying it couldn't be done long before the doctors gave up smoking so this corner has to go for the 4 to 1 price today and pick Ingemar Johansson to make smorgasbord of Floyd Patterson inside 10 rounds at Yankee Stadium on Thursday night.

Call the men in the white coats, if you will. And point out that Ingo hasn't as much as smashed an egg with his siege gun right hand in training.

But you don't have to go back to David and Goliath, or even as far as Eddie Arcaro, to prove that the favorite isn't always in the picture and every underdog has his day.

SEES "SOMEDING" They chuckled at another foreign bloke named Max Schmeling a few years back when he was being readied as a sacrifice to young Joe Louis. One cartoonist depicted "Herr Mox" as a man going to the electric chair and, when the fight was delayed by rain, showed Schmeling as a man reprieved.

"I see someding," Schmeling said stoically.

Louis had won 37 in a row, 23 by knockout. Schmeling was 5 to 1 to become numbers 28 and 24 respectively. But he had indeed seen "someding." To the consternation of the chalk players, young Joe was flattened in the 12th heat.

So much for odds and favoritism. Which brings us to the matter of firepower. There are pugilists who can "take you out" with one punch and there are those who have to belabor an opponent as if they were beating a rug before the target goes horizontal. Floyd Patterson is one of the latter. He does not have the one-shot opiate of a Dempsey or a Marciano.

BEHIND WHEN . . . BOOM The "Rock" was blowing the title to old Jersey Joe Walcott the night he went after the heavy-

weight hat. Then he launched one from right field, clipped old Joe on the kisser and, while he hit him a few more shots on the way down, Jersey on that ope holla had been launched all the way back to his native South Jersey.

Louis was to feel that fire power too. Of the fight against Marciano in which Hoe reached the end of the road, Louis recalled:

"It was like a guy beatin' you with a lead pipe. No matter where he hit me, it raised welts."

Marciano's tactics consisted merely of swinging both hands until there was nothing left standing but the referee. When he finally beat down the other man's arms and got a shot at the chin you could go collect all your wagers.
