Henry Kaiser Steps Down

OAKLAND, Calif. (AP)—Henry J. Kaiser Sr. is stepping down from four of the high posts he holds in his complex company organization. He announced Monday he was giving up the posts of board chairman and president of the four major operating concerns in his industrial empire. The 77-year-old executive will continue as board chairman of the controlling firm, Kaiser Industries Corp., and in an active management role in the new post of founder-chairman of Kaiser Steel, Kaiser Aluminum, Willys Motors, and Permanente Cement. Edgar F. Kaiser, his son, becomes board chairman of the four companies, while continuing as president of Kaiser Industries Corp. J. L. Ashby becomes new president of Kaiser Steel, S. A. Girard of Willys Motors, W. A. Marsh of Permanente Cement, and D. A. Rhoades of Kaiser Aluminum.



Woman Says Sis Survived Plane Crash

WICHITA, Kan. (AP)—Mrs. Juanita I. Reeves of Olathe, Kan., asked aid of Wichita police Sunday in checking out the chance that her sister, missing and thought dead six years, may be living in Arkansas.

Sgt. David Laird said Mrs. Reeves reported her sister, Mrs. Wanda L. Wilcox, was believed killed in the crash of a small plane in Rogue River country in Oregon, May 18, 1953. Mrs. Reeves said her sister was estranged from her husband then, and using the name Wilson, Laird said. Oregon authorities said the plane's wreckage was never found. Also on the flight from Gold Beach to Grants Pass were Mrs. Terry Hanna and Howard T. Shafer of Grants Pass, the pilot, and Harold Shafer, his brother, of McMinnville. Mrs. Reeves said an uncle, C. J. Reeves, 57, of nearby Viola, Kan., reported seeing Mrs. Wilcox and her husband Bill in an Arkansas town called Cherry Hill three months ago, and again three weeks ago. She said the uncle reported they live a mile and a half north of that town. Wichita police suggested Mrs. Reeves go to Arkansas to check out the story.

Legal Booze Due Shortly

OKLAHOMA CITY, Okla. (AP)—Legal liquor is about two months away for Oklahomans. The Oklahoma House of Representatives passed a liquor control bill Monday and sent it to Gov. J. Howard Edmondson for his signature. The governor said he planned to sign it today. The bill sets up a 5-man liquor control board authorized to provide the machinery for the sale of liquor by the bottle through package stores by Sept. 1. Legislators have been haggling over the control bill since April 7 when the people adopted a constitutional amendment repealing prohibition by an 80-000-vote margin. The control bill provides a tax of \$2.40 per gallon, bans public drinking and prohibits advertising liquor prices.

Beavin hasn't made up his mind definitely, but he is feeling our sentiment over the state and is lining up support. "Just in case." Marvin Cross has been named assistant to fill in whenever the need arises. Maude Heaton, for three years an auxiliary clerk, will become the first clerk.

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
