

Pittsburgh Dumps San Francisco, 5-1; Boston Drops Detroit Into Fifth Place

Vern Law Hogties Sluggers

What's kept Pittsburgh's Pirates so close to the National League lead? The answer is the pitching of Vern Law and Roy Face, a starter-reliever pair who have put away more than half of the Bucs' victories.

Law and Face were the only winners when the Pirates lost seven of their first nine games and plunged to the cellar. Now Law, ace of the starters with an 8-4 record, and Face, the majors' top winner at 11-0, have won 19 between them and the Bucs hold fourth place with a 37-33 record.

Law, 29, a right-hander who's been around since 1950, put away his third in a row Tuesday night, keeping the Pirates within 3 1/2 games of first place with a six-hit, 3-1 victory over San Francisco. That made Law the first NL pitcher to beat every other club this season.

The defeat once again dropped the second place Giants two games behind the league leading Milwaukee Braves, who whipped St. Louis 9-5. Third place Los Angeles stayed a half-game ahead of Pittsburgh by beating Philadelphia 4-3. The Chicago Cubs defeated Cincinnati 3-1.

Bucs, 5 Giants 1

Law missed a second consecutive shutout when a walk and Jackie Brandt's double gave the Giants a fourth-inning run. The big right-hander batted in two of the Bucs' first three runs. Dick Stuart hit his 14th homer and had four of the Pirates' 15 hits.

Sam Jones (8-7) was the loser, giving up 10 hits and three runs in his first start since pitching the Giants into their short stay in first place last Friday night.

Braves 9, Cards 5

Del Crandall drove in four runs for the Braves, breaking a 3-3 tie with a one-on-one homer, his 12th, in the fifth inning against loser Hal Jeffcoat. Wes Covington, who drove in a pair of runs, followed Crandall's shot with his fifth homer. Carl Willey (3-1) was the winner, giving up 10 hits but gaining a complete game in his first start since May 29. Ken Boyer hit a two-run homer for the Cards, who lost starter Alex Kellner when he hurt his elbow pitching in the first inning.

Bums 4, Phils 3

Home runs by Junior Gilliam, Gil Hodges and Don Demeter got the job done for the Dodgers, who had only two other hits off loser Gene Conley (4-4). Danny McDermott (6-6) was the winner. Demeter and Hodges homered in a deciding, three-run fourth, with Hodges' tying Hank Greenberg for 11th place on the all-time major league list at 331. It was his 11th of the season and followed a double by Wally Moon, who now has hit in 16 consecutive games.

Cubs 3, Reds 1

Lee Walls doubled home a run in the first inning, then added an RBI single in a two-run, wrap-up fifth for the Cubs against loser Joe Nuxhall (3-6). Glen Hobbie (7-6) was the winner, giving up eight hits, but blanking the Reds after they scored in the first inning. It was his first complete game in seven starts since May 13—when he shut out Cincinnati.

Thumper Returns To Action

Okay, so one game doesn't end a slump. But give Ted Williams one game in Detroit's Briggs Stadium and the slumper is The Thumper again.

The big guy of Boston's Red Sox has made Briggs Stadium his favorite ballyard since he burst into the American League in 1939.

It was at Briggs that Williams, then The Kid, hit a three-run, two-out homer in the ninth that hauled the AL into an All-Star game victory in 1941. Just two years ago, it was at Briggs that Williams shook a July slump and started a comeback that led to his fifth batting title, at .388.

Now a 40-year-old Williams, back in the lineup after being benched for weak hitting for the first time in his career, says "don't count me out!" following a single and home run in three at-bats Tuesday night as Boston rapped Detroit 10-4.

It was only the fourth time this season that Williams upped his average 13 points to .202, has managed two hits in one game—and it was his first game in Briggs Stadium this year.

That loss, their fifth in seven games, plunked the Tigers to fifth. The New York Yankees took fourth, belting Kansas City again, 10-2, and moving within two games of first place Cleveland. The Indians lost 3-1 to Baltimore while Chicago's second place White Sox moved within one game of the top by defeating Washington 4-1.

BoSox 10, Tigers 4

The Red Sox, jumping from eighth place to sixth, broke loose for five runs on three homers in the last two innings. Williams' third of the year, the 483th of his career, and Frank Malzone's 10th scored two runs in the eighth. Then Jackie Jensen counted three in the ninth with his 14th. All three were off reliever Dave Sisler, the ex-Red Sox right-hander.

Birds 5, Indians 1

Young Milt Pappas (7-3), winning three of his last four decisions, handed the Indians their fourth defeat in six games with a five-hitter. The third place Orioles had 10 hits, beating Gary Bell (6-7) with two runs in the third on a pair of walks and two-out singles by Bob Nieman and Gus Triandos.

ChiSox 4, Nats 1

Early Wynn (10-5) became the AL's top winner with his 259th career victory. He got it with an eight-hit, seven-strikeout job backed up by Sherm Lollar's two-run homer, his eighth, and a pair of two-out hits from Earl Torgeson.

Yankees 10, KC 2

The Yankees, shrugging off Sunday's double defeat by Cleveland, made it seven out of nine with an 18-hit barrage that included three two-run homers—by Mickey Mantle (18), Hank Bauer (4) and Gil McDougald (2). Southpaw Whitey Ford (7-4), who sprained an ankle in his last start, was the winner with a five-hitter.

Pratt, Cupit Spearhead Texan Lead In National College Meet

EUGENE, Ore. (AP) — Bob Pratt and Jack Cupit led a record-breaking Houston University team into match play in the National Collegiate Golf Tournament today.

Both Pratt and Cupit tied the National Collegiate Athletic Assn. record for qualifying play Tuesday as they wound up two days of play on the Eugene Country Club course with 136 strokes each, 6 under par on the par 37-34-71 course.

Pratt had rounds of 66 and 70, Cupit 69 and 67. The record is shared with Don Albert of Purdue, who set it in 1954, and John Pott, of Louisiana State, who equaled it in 1953.

Houston smashed the team record in carrying off the team title a fourth consecutive year. The record was 370 strokes by four players set by Houston last year. Now the mark is 361.

Cupit and Pratt were members of last year's team. The newcomers are Tony Marimon, who shot 73-72-143, and Dick Crawford, who had 72-72-144.

As usual, the Southwest is dominating the tournament. There were 16 players from Southwest schools going into the 64 match play positions, more than any other region. Seventy-six players were eliminated.

The Pacific Northwest was closest, qualifying 14. The host Oregon team had five players in matches, the same as Houston.

Tom Jakobsen, an Oregon sophomore, was runnerup to Cupit and Pratt in medal play with 88-137.

All told, 10 players broke par. At 138 were Ron Royer of Indiana and Leighton Tuttle of Oregon State.

Jack Ellis of Oklahoma State had 139, and Carl Mitchell of Purdue 140. There was a three-way tie at 141 among Ron Preston of Stanford, John Konsek of Purdue and Bob Shelling of Stanford.

Konsek, one of the most confident players here, went to the finals of this tournament last year. Also qualifying were Ward Wetlaufer, Walker Cup player from Hamilton College in New York, who had 144, and another Walker Cupper, Tom Aaron of Florida, who barely got in at 149.

The cutoff point for qualifying was 149.
