Cleric Admits Faking Wreck

PASADENA, Calif. (UPI) - Ronald T. Field, 27, former Methodist minister, admitted Tuesday that he wrecked his car near Pittsburgh, Pa., May 27 to make it appear he had died. Field, reported missing since the accident, was found at the home of an uncle, Walter Field, who told newsmen Field was out. Police said they would not take any action against him unless Pittsburgh authorities request it.

Field's discovery followed a statement to Pittsburgh police by a University of Pittsburgh coed that Field set up the accident. She said he asked her to join him later in California. Charges of desertion and failure to support their two small daughters were filed in Pittsburgh by Field's wife, Jean. Pennsylvania officials said extradition proceedings on the charges would be started if any incitement were obtained.

Hike Noted In Monoxide

LOS ANGELES (UPI) - A steady rise in the concentration of lethal carbon monoxide in the Los Angeles atmosphere has been recorded since 1955, smog authorities say. The report was made Tuesday at the 52nd Air Pollution Control Assn. Conference by the Los Angeles County Air Pollution Control District. It showed the area had an average carbon monoxide count of 5 1/2 parts per million parts of air in late 1955, compared to the present average of the gas 8 1/2 parts.

About 2,000 of these work in the open hearth department in the South Side plant.

DUNSMUIR - Among June graduates from the Dunsmuir area was Hanna, a prickly-eared German shepherd raised by Margaret Callick of Dunsmuir as a Crag View 4-H Club project. The announcement was made by William Ruddiman Jr., farm adviser at Yreka. The pup was graduated with honors at commencement exercises at Guide Dog for the Blind Training School in San Rafael recently. Witnesses were Miss Callick and Arch J. Richardson, the dog's new master, a blind man from Denver. Miss Callick, daughter of the Wilson Callicks, Dunsmuir, received Hanna from the Guide Dogs for the Blind kennels at San Rafael when the puppy was 3 months old. Hanna came from specially selected German Shepherd breeding stock, and was selected by tests administered by the guide dog school staff. Miss Callick cared for and trained Hanna for nine months as one of her 4-H projects.

Forest Fire Battle Rages

STEWARTS POINT (Sonoma County) (UPI) - Two forest fires raged out of control today in a rugged redwood area nine miles east of this Sonoma County community. Some campers from Berkeley were brought here from a YMCA camp in the path of the fires, and some 300 men with 11 pump trucks were on the fire lines. State Forest Ranger Jack Kessler called the situation "critical." He said the fires had burned through 2,000 acres of redwood forest, logging slash and grazing land. One fire broke out Tuesday afternoon in a logging area. During the night, it jumped a road and creek, touching off the second blaze. Kessler said the flames were being driven by winds of 18 to 20 knots. He said there were no communities in the paths of the fires, but that a few ranch homes were endangered.

Earth Turned For New Dam

YREKA - "Another milestone in the progress of Yreka," was marked last week when Yreka's Mayor J. E. (Jim) Cummings, turned the first symbolic shovel of earth to indicate the start of the long-awaited Greenhorn Dam project, which will assure the Yreka residents a plentiful supply of water for years to come. Following the water bond election last year for \$550,000 to construct the much-needed dam, it was not until April 2 of this year that it was advertised for bids, and on April 16, 1959, a resolution was passed by the city council to sell the bonds, in order that construction could begin.

Elderly Woman Perishes In Fire

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI) - An aged San Francisco woman was burned to death and 20 other persons were treated for gas inhalation Tuesday in an apartment house blaze. Mrs. Neva Hotchett, a pensioner who lived on the second floor, was the victim. The fire apparently started in a waste container. Her body was burned beyond recognition. Twenty-four persons were evacuated from the building, most of them treated for effects of poisonous sulphur dioxide gas from a refrigerator that spread through the building.
