City Council Ponders Bids

A number of bids were opened by the city council at its regular Monday meeting in city hall. In addition to awarding the contract for construction of a new terminal building to the Brosterhouse Construction Company of Klamath Falls, the council awarded a sewer bid to the Riverside Construction Company, Portland, for a bid of \$10,901.50.

The bid was for a sewer crossing at the Link River bridge and changes to the Link River pumping station. The only other bidder was M. J. Buits of Eugene at \$14,484.60.

City needs on gasoline and oil were opened with Tidewater Associated Company being awarded the bid on all but the stove oil and furnace oil which went to Dunn's Heating Company.

Baliger Motors was low bidder on an automobile for the police department. Their bid was \$995 in addition to a trade-in allowance on an old model. The other bid was from Dugan and Mest for a net price of \$1,081.66.

In addition to the bid openings, the council approved a petition from residents of Leroy Street, asking that the street be paved from Pacific Terrace to Newcastle.

The city attorney was instructed to draw up a resolution asking for the preparation of temporary plans for the improvement. The Venture Club was granted approval to hold its annual Kiddie Parade on Saturday, June 27, at 11 a.m. The parade will form at Wright Field and proceed down Esplanade to Main and Main to Third Street where it will disband.

Mass Killer Doom Slated

LINCOLN, Neb. (AP)—Charles Starkweather, 29-year-old confessed slayer of 11 persons, is scheduled to die in the electric chair at the state penitentiary Thursday.

His execution will come shortly after midnight tonight—unless it is again stayed for more court action.

The fifth death date for the red-haired killer was set Tuesday by the State Supreme Court after formal notice that the U.S. Supreme Court had declined to review the case was received.

Guy Starkweather, father of Charles, said he would file in District Court in Lincoln today for a writ of coram nobis, alleging illegal detention, and asking a stay of execution.

Charles has contended he was not properly represented in his trial by two court-appointed attorneys. He was angered at the trial because the attorneys entered a plea of insanity in his behalf.

He was convicted of killing Robert Jensen, Bennet, Neb., school boy. Jensen was one of 10 victims of Starkweather in Nebraska and Wyoming during a four-day rampage in January 1958. A month before Starkweather had killed a filling station attendant in a holdup.

said Eugene F. Slaughter of Southeast Oklahoma State College. "They can't pass on to their students what they don't know themselves."

Slaughter is here to expound his theories at the annual Conference on Teacher Education and Professional Standards. Delegates are trying to work out a practical program of teacher education.

"Some of our colleges and universities insist that a student spend half his time on professional education courses, and others permit it," Slaughter said in an interview. "This is completely out of balance. Such institutions think it is enough to know how to teach, whether or not you know anything about what to teach."

The normal requirement for a college degree is 120 semester hours of work spread over four years. Slaughter said students going into teaching should take five-year courses of 150 semester hours.

"They should have 40 hours of liberal or general education, 40 hours of professional education courses, and 40 hours in a major field of study," he said. "That would leave them 30 hours of study in depth in their major field or related courses."

Slaughter said the National Council of Teachers of English, of which he is a member, believes every high school English teacher should have an absolute minimum of 24 semester hours of college work in English. Far too many, he said, have had 15 hours or less.

The picture isn't all dark, he said. "The public is gradually waking up to the fact that good teaching is important, and some of our universities and colleges are doing a fine job—such schools as Stanford, Goucher College, Ohio State University, the University of Illinois and the University of Wisconsin."

"But we still have a long way to go."

Rededication Rites Held

Thirty seven years have passed since a marker was placed near Fremont Bridge to commemorate Eulalona Village.

This village was composed of hundreds of persons camped on both sides of the river to take advantage of the salmon run. Many early explorers visited the site and made note of it in their letters and diaries.

As the years passed a more permanent location for the marker became desirable, and so as its 37th birthday celebration a rededication program was held in Moore Park by the members and friends of Eulalona Chapter, Daughters of the American Revolution Sunday, June 21.

The new location was obtained for the chapter by its regent, Mrs. A. O. Roenicke, who approached the Klamath County Court for assistance in relocation. A Moore Park site was provided and necessary funds approved for the move.

The program for the service included the welcome by Mrs. Charles Martin, past regent, Eulalona Marker Committee; acknowledgements and introductions by Mrs. Roenicke; the Eulalona story by Mrs. L. H. Stone, Centennial committee member and dedication by Mrs. Roenicke and Mrs. Raymond L. Hall, chaplain.

The marker, on the slope of a hill with the Klamath Lake nearby, is a reminder of the Indian village that once stood there.

Steel Talk Showdown Near; Strike Scheduled July 1

NEW YORK (AP)—Steel negotiators entered the big buy-and-sell period today. They have talked without accomplishing anything for seven weeks. Now is the time to do business if a July 1 strike is to be avoided.

The steel talks are in a stalemate. Neither side has made any concessions. But with the strike date rapidly approaching, the Steelworkers Union and industry were beginning to do a bit of quiet horse trading.

R. Conrad Cooper, executive vice president of U.S. Steel Corp., a top bargainer for the industry, said steel companies have received no reasonable union offer worth considering.

President David J. McDonald of the Steelworkers Union said the industry has made no money offers.

Both carefully guarded their comments, under a common secrecy ban. It seemed reasonable that at this stage of the game both had begun trading settlement offers.

Cooper, although reluctant to talk about it, said steel mills will have to start banking turnarounds within a few days anticipating a July 1 strike. Present contracts expire June 30.

There was speculation that, barring any settlement, the union might agree to extend the current agreements. This was considered a bare possibility, but McDonald declined to comment on it.

Second-quarter steel profits statements are due in late July and there has been speculation that the union may delay a strike in a gesture of public consideration and await the new industry profits results.

First-quarter profits approached a record. Second-quarter statements are expected to be even better. The industry, however, has said it can do nothing that would cause inflation. In this, steelmakers have been encouraged by President Eisenhower.

The union announced that it has summoned its 171-man wage-policy committee for a session here Thursday. The group could ratify any proposed settlement or okay plans to tie up the steel industry in a strike shutdown.
