

Fact Printing Slated Today

ST. LOUIS, Mo. (AP) — The board of education went about its business of budget cutting Wednesday night while a reporter whose presence touched off a mass walkout the night before sat in the spectators gallery.

Several board members objected Tuesday night when Edward A. Higgins, a reporter for the then strike-beset St. Louis Post-Dispatch, took his place at the press table.

Higgins said Oscar A. Ehrhardt, a board member and president of the St. Louis Labor Council, called him a "scab reporter." Ehrhardt walked out, followed by four other members. Four remained—enough for a quorum—and no meeting was held.

Wednesday night, Higgins was asked by Board President H. Lee Bruns to sit in the spectators gallery, Higgins obliged. The meeting continued.

The board, pressed for funds, voted 10-1 to cut \$1,214,000 from its operating budget.

Higgins jolted down the details. They'll appear in his newspaper today. The "stereotypers' strike" that closed the afternoon Post-Dispatch and the rival, morning Globe-Democrat ended a few hours after the board meeting broke up.

3 Skin Divers Investigate Lake

BLACK HAWK, Colo. (AP) — Three Texas skin divers are trying to find the bottom of Missouri Lake, linked with the legends about this town since its mining boom a century ago.

Equipped to dive 50 feet, they've not touched bottom—which legend says doesn't exist in Missouri Lake.

However, they found the remains of a horse and ore wagon that plunged into the lake 80 years ago. They've also picked up part of a makeshift submarine that sank as it was launched on the lake in 1908.

The trio, all from Dallas, are Pat O'Donnell, 27, Rick Seals, 30, and Jack Wayne, 21.

As one officer drove up to get him, another appeared in another squad car with the other boy, taken into custody as he stood sucking his thumb at a street corner.

They rang the first bell where the front door was open. "The minute I heard the bell I knew what it was all about," said their mother, Helen, 21. "They've done it before."

Health-Labor Bill Veto Predicted By GOP Head

WASHINGTON (AP)—The possibility that President Eisenhower might veto a \$4,056,746,581 health-labor money bill that pierces his budget ceiling was raised today by Sen. Everett M. Dirksen (R-Ill.).

Dirksen, the Senate Republican leader, said in an interview he thinks Eisenhower is so determined to balance the budget he may well take the unusual course of rejecting the major money measure.

No chief executive has vetoed a major appropriations bill since 1948, when Congress overrode former President Truman's rejection of a labor-federal security money measure.

In view of this record, Sen. John O. Pastore (D-R.I.), one of the bill's sponsors, said he doubts there will be any veto. But he added he would not be surprised if Eisenhower elects to freeze some of the funds and not spend them.

Guided by Democratic Leader Lyndon B. Johnson of Texas, the Senate passed the bill by a lopsided 83-10 vote Wednesday. Previously it had throttled, 70-26, a move by Dirksen to send it back to committee with instructions to

She sought no alimony. He is to pay child support. She was granted custody of their two daughters, Susan, 18, and Cynthia, 16. The other child is Harry Michael, 22.

cut the money total down to the \$485,214,500 for the Labor Department, \$14,250,000 for the National Labor Relations Board; \$1,357,000 for the National Mediation Board; \$4,949,000 for the Federal Mediation and Conciliation Service and some smaller items.

The bill's increase over Eisenhower's budget figure wiped out all of the cuts the Senate has made under presidential requests in nine other money bills.

Funds in another bill to operate the White House and related executive agencies brought on a partisan wrangle, but the Senate voted 79-2 to appropriate the full \$13,568,500 its appropriations committee had recommended.

The only dissenters were Sens. Paul H. Douglas (D-Ill.) and William Proxmire (D-Wis.).

The Senate rejected by standing vote Proxmire's effort to cut out \$85,281 for five White House assistants. Proxmire contended their only work is to lobby in Congress for Eisenhower's program.

Douglas proposed no cuts but raised questions about the airplanes, limousines and a motorized golf cart at the President's disposal.

"Since the President and his agents have determined to make spending the theme of their 1960 campaign issue," Douglas said, "it is not unfair to ask the Presi-

dent to practice what he preaches and to work a little harder to set his own house in order."

Dirksen called the whole debate "an amazing political exploration" attacking the President.

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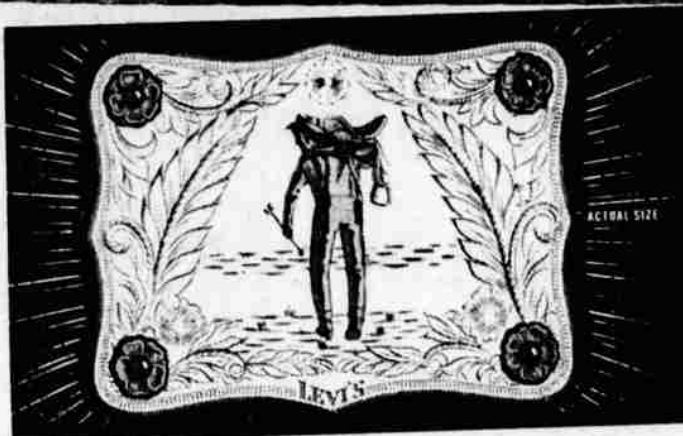
