Tax Extension May Finance Highways

WASHINGTON (AP)—A simple tax extension bill mushroomed today into a possible vehicle for financing interstate highways, wiping out a passenger travel tax and revising other levies.

The need for meeting a July 1 deadline complicated the Senate's problem as it headed into a marathon session to consider proposed amendments to the revenue measure.

The bill as passed by the House June 8 would extend for another year the present rates on various excise and corporate income taxes. Unless it becomes law by July 1, these would drop to pre-Korean war levels, and government revenues would decline an estimated three billion dollars a year.

The proposal to divert other revenues into the highway trust fund, to assure continued road building, was a last-minute addition to the list of amendments to be considered.

It was put forth by Sen. Albert Gore (D-Tenn.) as President Eisenhower cautioned that unless Congress acts, new lack of funds will force an almost complete halt in new interstate road building projects within the next two years.

To keep the program going, Eisenhower has been urging a 1 1/2 percent increase in the federal gasoline tax, now three cents. He said Wednesday that other alternatives being considered "would be unacceptable to me."

Gore nevertheless proposed to divert to the special highway trust fund 960 million dollars a year of highway user taxes on automobiles, trucks, buses, auto and truck parts and lubricating oil. These funds now go into the treasury's general fund. Eisenhower contends they are needed there to help meet other government costs.

But the President would find it difficult to veto the tax extension bill if the diversion amendment were included, because of the loss of other taxes.

Renewing his plea for the gasoline tax boost, Eisenhower said that without additional money in the highway fund, 10 states will have to stop letting new contracts by the end of the summer. Fifteen others will be affected by the end of the year, and 11 others will suspend new work by July 1960.

The tax extension bill was approved only Wednesday by the Senate Finance Committee. To the House bill, it added provisions to end this year a 10 per cent tax on passenger tickets, and to wipe out next year a similar levy on telephone and telegraph messages.

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Prisoner Dies From Wounds

SPRINGFIELD, Mo. (AP)—One of the 53 prisoners injured when guards broke up an inmate rebellion at the U. S. Medical Center Tuesday is dead.

Warden Russell O. Settle disclosed the number of injured Wednesday night when he announced the death of Richard Smith. The 34-year-old Salt Lake City man suffered a skull fracture when guards stormed the hospital wing held by prisoners.

One of the five guards held hostage for 16 hours, Robert B. Rosenbahl, is hospitalized with severe cuts. His condition is fair. Seven inmates still are being treated.

Settle said the prisoners caused about \$10,000 damage. Smith was sentenced from Salt Lake City in February 1953 for violating federal motor vehicle theft laws and making threats to kill or harm the President.

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Conference Set On Alcohol Sale

OKLAHOMA CITY (AP)—Oklahoma has a new liquor law today and the new Alcoholic Beverage Control Board was to meet with Gov. J. Howard Edmondson to discuss means of setting up the machinery for legal sales.

The governor signed the liquor control bill Tuesday. The bill specifies that legal sales should start no later than Sept. 1. The law provides for package sales only.
