

Ontarian Conquers D. Soran

PORTLAND (AP)—Lynn Yturri of Ontario, usually among the leaders in the tournaments he enters, again was a front runner as semi-final play began today in the Oregon Junior Golf Tournament here.

Yturri vaulted into the semi-finals of the junior boys division with an easy 6 and 5 triumph Wednesday over Dennis Soran of Klamath Falls.

Of the nine entrants from Klamath Falls, only four emerged with victories. Those gaining wins were Steve Good, Mike Soran, Britt Tucker and Linda Pernel. Those suffering defeats to drop from further play, aside from Soran, were Judy Angstead, Bobby Graham, Bobby Tucker and Tommy Good.

Today Yturri was paired with John Hedlund of Oswego, a 6 and 4 victor over Dick Wagner of Portland.

In the other junior match today were Chuck Allen of Roseburg and Pete Geertsen of Eugene.

Allen Wednesday dumped Bob Wolson of Portland 3 and 2, while Geertsen turned in a whopping 9 and 7 victory over John Snyder of Lebanon.

Louise Suggs Eyes Repeat

PITTSBURGH (AP)—Louise Suggs would like nothing better than to match her 72-hole total of 285 two years ago at Churchill Valley Country Club—scene of today's first round of the Women's National Open Golf Championship.

Miss Suggs, two-time winner of the Women's Open and three-time runnerup, posted the 285 with a blistering 2-under par 68 on the final round to win the Ladies Professional Golf title in 1957.

Both figures have withstood the challenge of visits of the women professionals at Churchill over the past three years.

Miss Mickey Wright, who beat out Miss Suggs by five strokes with a 290 for the title last year, will be shooting for an unprecedented repeat championship.

Not even the late Babe Didrikson Zaharias, who won three of these championships, was able to come through on successive years.

Betsy Rawls, the only other three-time winner, also will be seeking the title again with three other past champions Betty Jameson, Fay Crocker and Kathy Cornelius.

Scanlon Wins From Italian

CHICAGO (UPI)—Italy's Mario Vecchiato had no apologies for defeat today, but he said that Bobby Scanlon beat "only half a fighter" in racking up a 10 round decision Wednesday night.

It was the first loss after 18 straight wins for the Udine, Italy, battler, making his American debut, and he didn't quibble with the official's scoreboards, each holding him two points below his conqueror, who won his 33rd match in 37 pro fights.

"It was just a matter of climate and water and different styles," Vecchiato said through an interpreter.

Scanlon, the world's seventh-ranked lightweight, complimented the Italian as a "good fighter," though he never was hurt, he said that Vecchiato was "a strong boy."

Disaster Hits SW Golfers

EUGENE, Ore. (AP)—Disaster struck the Southwest and Houston's proud national collegiate team champions Wednesday. Only one of the region's 16 qualifiers survived the quarter-finals of the NCAA golf tournament today.

He is Dick Crawford of Houston, who won two matches Wednesday. Now he finds himself faced with John Konsek of Purdue who went to the finals of the NCAA tournament last year.

Four other Houston players went down to defeat. And this a day after Houston won the team title and cut nine strokes from the record in doing it in this tournament which the Southwest has dominated in recent years.

Bob Pratt, one of two Houston players who tied the record for low score in qualifying play, dropped out in the first round of matches, bowing to Dick Siderow of Duke on the 19th hole.

Siderow himself fell before Delmar Beman of Maryland in the second round 1 up. Beman is the brother of Dean Beman, who recently won the British Amateur Championship.

Joel Goldstrand of Houston fell before Jack Luceti of San Jose State in the second round 4 and 2. Jack Cupit of Houston, who shared medalist honors with Pratt went out in the second round. The luck of the draw threw him against teammate Crawford, who won 4 and 2.

Still another Houston player also fell in the second round, Tony Marinton, who yielded to Konsek 3 and 4.

Purdue, which finished second in team competition, sent three players into the quarter-finals. Besides the confident Konsek they are Gene Francis and Harley Drake. No other school has so many.

Also in the running are the two Walker Cuppers, Ward Wettlaufer of Hamilton College in New York and Tom Aaron of Florida.

All players in the age group, regardless of playing ability, or lack of it, are allowed to play at least a part of every game in which their team engages. It is already paying off.

Boys who at first showed no aptitude at the game are now beginning to hit and play far above their early showing. Their confidence was not shaken by being told they could never develop into players. They were told to keep on trying—and learning.

Zanni stated that a boy told he could not play, would do more harm than anything that could happen. He wants the boys to try to win, but he wants all of them to be given a chance to develop natural ability. One that is entirely devoid of ability, he believes, will soon find a game more suited to his talents and drop ball for the more fascinating hobby.
