

Yakima Clammers Up One

While the first-half champion Salem Senators stretched their strapping seven Wednesday night, the Yakima Bears clawed their way up from the bottom rung of the Northwest League ladder.

The Senators picked up four runs in the opening innings and raced to a 5-2 victory over Tri-City. The Bears crawled out of the NWL cellar for the first time in nearly a month with a 6-3 and 3-0 doubleheader sweep from Lewiston. Ron Herbel threw a five-hitter as Eugene edged Wenatchee 4-3.

It's getting to be almost a ho-hum routine with Salem, unbeaten in its last seven. Two runs came in the first on consecutive doubles by Bob Folkert, Carl Hutzler and Joe Wilson. Singles by Benny Gonzales and pitcher Bailey Brem drove in two more in the second. One of the six hits given up by Brem was Bob Ruck's homer over the left field fence in the seventh.

The Bears bettered themselves by pushing across five runs in the second inning of the opener and then taking the second behind Cliff Adams' three-hit shutout. A three-run homer by Daryl Robertson aided in the big fifth. Lewiston rallied with three in the ninth on Ron Wilkins' pinch-hit homer. The Bears one run in the nightcap on a triple by Daryl Robertson and added a pair in the fifth with the aid of three Bronc bobbles.

Herbel held the Chiefs hitless until the sixth when Gerry Mason singled. Mike Yarenychuk powered him home with a homer and two more hits made it a three-run inning. But the Emeralds already had their margin with a pair in the fourth and fifth. In the fourth it was a double by Mel Krause, walk, two stolen bases and infield out that did the damage. The next inning, singles by Carl Boles and Dick Powlow, error and sacrifice fly brought in the runs.

KC Recalls Howie Reed

PORTLAND (AP)—The Kansas City Athletics, stuttering in seventh place, Wednesday recalled pitcher Howie Reed, a standout on the mound staff of the Portland Beavers.

Reed, who had a 7-4 record with the Beavers, left at once to join the American League team. "I hate to see him go," said Tommy Heath, field and general manager of the Beavers, currently knotted with Spokane for fourth place in the Pacific Coast League.

However, Heath added: "I firmly believe that he has the stuff to win in the big leagues."

With Portland this year, Reed appeared in 13 games, had a 2.92 earned run average, fanned 60 and issued 41 walks.

Heath said the A's had promised to send a pitching replacement, but added he didn't know who it would be.

Speculation in newspapers here said that either Johnny Kucks, traded to the A's recently by the New York Yankees, or Ray Herbel might be sent to the Beavers.

The game was in the ninth, the score was 0-0, and the home team, Portland, was at bat with the bases loaded when up stepped George Freese. In a twinkling Portland had won the Pacific Coast League game, 1-0, over Salt Lake City.

Freese rapped a single through second base in the victory blow Wednesday night, sending Milt Graff home.

This was the climax to a fine pitcher's duel. Duane Pillette was the winner. He gave up only three hits, all scattered singles. Eddie Hanlon yielded five in defeat. Two of those came in the ninth.

The winning single put Freese back in hitting form after a lay-off. He had been benched since being hit on the hand by a pitched ball last Friday.

The same teams meet tonight in the last of a four-game series. Portland won two of the first three.

The San Diego Padres, who have been moving along quietly and confidently, appear to be making their big move to grab first place in the Pacific Coast League pennant battle.

The Pads whitewashed the Seattle Rainiers 2-0 Wednesday night and climbed to within two and a half games of the league-leading Sacramento Solons, who blew a 4-1 decision to the Spokane Indians.

San Diego, although only in third place, is only one percentage point behind the faltering Vancouver Mounties, who dropped

another game to the seventh-place Phoenix Giants, 5-4.

The Portland Beavers shaded the Salt Lake City Bees 1-0 in the other league game.

The San Diego-Seattle game was a tense battle of southpaws, with Dick Stigman dealing for the Pads and Claude Osteen going for the Rainiers. Stigman fanned nine and walked three. Osteen, who was lifted for a pinchhitter in the eighth, gave up six hits and three walks while fanning six.

Both of San Diego's runs came across in the seventh inning. Bill Renna's single, a walk, Gene Lee's single and Rod Graber's bases-loaded single did the damage.

The Solons nicked Spokane's Chris Nicolosi for nine hits, but the league leaders managed to dent the scorebook only in the sixth on a walk, an outfield fly and Mike Krsnich's single. A crowd of 9,329, a new PCL record for Spokane, watched the Indians clinch the victory with two runs in the second on a pair of singles, a sacrifice, a sacrifice fly and a two-base error.

The Mounties, down 5-2 going into the last of the ninth inning, picked up two runs on Jim Dyck's four-bagger but they couldn't put across the tying or winning runs. Billy Wilson slammed out his 16th home run of the season for Phoenix with a mate aboard in the second inning.

The Wilson, North Carolina, Pirates lost their Cigar, Outfielder Morris Cigar of San Pedro, California, was optioned to Grand Forks, Nebraska.

Three Shoots Await KF Archery Fans

At a potluck meeting held June 18, the Klamath Archers were told that there would be three shoots held within the next few weeks. There will be a field and broadhead shoot at New Pine Creek June 28 put on by the Fandango Archers.

The Savage Archers of Ashland are also having a shoot Sunday, June 28. Registration starts at 8 a.m. All free style shooters will be penalized 10 per cent of their total score and they will shoot in the same division as the instinctive shooters. The field course is located on the Ashland mine road. Directional markers will be placed, starting at the underpass just north of Ashland. This is a new range.

On July 3 there will be a classified tournament shoot held at Fall River which will help members qualify for the National Tournament being held the last of July. Archers may form work parties and work four hours for their entrance fee or pay \$10 if they do not wish to work.

Gerald Munjar, the secretary of Klamath Archers, may be contacted for applications for living quarters during the National Tournament. It is necessary to enclose \$5 with each application. If members wish they may have Munjar send the application to Bend or they may fill out their own application.
