

Rain Cloud Threat Troubles Rosensohn

NEW YORK (AP)—Another threat of rain and a ticket-rubbed today hung over the once-postponed Floyd Patterson-Ingram Johansson heavyweight title fight—probably the most harassed heavyweight promotion ever.

The fighters and promoter Bill Rosensohn peered anxiously at the glooming sky, wondering whether the 15-round show would be able to go on tonight at 9:30 p.m. (EST) at Yankee Stadium.

East Side Garners Top Spot

East Side Electric took clear cut command of the top spot on the Babe Ruth League ladder by virtue of a 9-4 win over Chilquin and the Crater Lake Machinery.

Cats climbed a rung by dumping Fluhrers 13-1 in Gem Stadium Thursday night.

The East Siders made best use of seven hits while hurler Jay Paxton got credit for the win with a 5-hit mound performance. Paxton's mates played errorless ball behind him while the young chucker tossed four strikeouts and issued only three free passes.

Charged with the loss for Chilquin was Ed Case, who, like Paxton went the full five innings. Case passed three and fanned three.

Case stymied the league's leading hitter, East Side's Bill Kennitz but allowed leftfielder Grover Dahn a pair of singles in two trips and was tagged by catcher Dave Stippich for a triple.

The East Side nine picked up single markers in each of the first and second stanzas then notched two in the third to take a 4-0 lead. In the last of the third, however, Chilquin made a new ball game of it when they collected four tallies off a pair of walks, singles by shortstop John Wright and Case, and a booming triple by first-sacker Al DeBortoli.

The tie lasted until the top of the fifth inning when the Electricians wired live runs off a pair of free passes, two errors, two wild pitches and singles by Dahn and Bill Crane.

The Cats and the Bakers had a tight duel going for the first three stanzas, the Cats scratching a pair of runs in the first, the Bakers grabbing one in the bottom of the second.

In the fourth frame the Machineists erupted for four runs off three walks, two errors, a single by John Gray and a double by winning pitcher Ronnie Yunc.

They wound up their attack, sending losing pitcher Dennis Rose to the showers. Rose walked four men and gave up two singles in the fifth before turning the job over to Dennis Cox.

Cat leftfielder Randy Adams collected two for two and centerfielder Ron Simpson poled another double for the winners.

Centerfielder Gary Patzke and catcher Hank Herrera each rapped a pair of singles in three trips for the losers.

It was virtually the same forecast that was made Thursday and came true. Rain pelted the field at the stadium, forcing Rosensohn to announce the postponement at 1:05 p.m.

Ironically, the rain stopped in the evening. At the scheduled fight time, it was cool but a heavy mist shrouded the tops of the skyscrapers. The \$100 "deluxe, red carpet" customers, however, would have been ankle deep in mud.

Another bad break like that may delay the long-awaited scrap until Monday. Rosensohn and Irving Kahn, president of TelePrompster which is running the closed circuit telecast to theaters, said that if the weather was bad today and the forecast was not optimistic for Saturday, they might put it over until Monday.

The ticket hassle may come to a showdown today. Rosensohn refused to make refunds Thursday after the postponement was announced despite an order to do so by Gen. Melvin Krulwich, chairman of the State Athletic Commission.

Krulwich said the commission "rules required the promoter to make refunds on demand. Rosensohn said his lawyer's interpretation of the rules indicated no refund was mandatory.

"I don't want to hurt any people but I've got to protect the promotion," said the weary Rosensohn.

The commission rule is vague, but it has been observed by other promoters in the past. Krulwich said he would take it up with a lawyer.

If another postponement is required, however, Rosensohn said the return policy would be reviewed. He said that he is making refunds for hardship cases.

That would have to include Swedes and out-of-towners who have booked transportation today.

As for the fighters, they took the delay calmly enough. After all this was just one of many incidents that have plagued the promotion. There have been law suits, a threat by Patterson's manager to take the fight out of New York, and probably anything else you can name.

PR Program Draws Crowd

"Our summer basketball program has evidently aroused a lot of interest," noted Dean White, who heads up the Klamath Falls Park and Recreation Department's summer cage activity.

Champ Rated Edge After Fight Delay

NEW YORK (UPI)—The big question in the Ingemar Johansson-Floyd Patterson title fight today is whether the one day's postponement hurt either man's chances and the consen-

sus seemed to be that it gave the champion a slight edge.

"He's used to sweating out these things," said Jack Dempsey, who lost his title in the rain at Philadelphia. "It could be very wearing on Johansson, who hasn't boxed since last Saturday."

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Ingo showed up first, comfortable in slacks and a check sports shirt and acted as casual as if he was going to the beach. In tow came his mama, papa, brother Rolf, fiancée Birgit Lundgren, assorted Swedish friends and Rolf's fiancée, Anette Johansson.

The weigh in was held in the ritzy Century Room of the Commodore Hotel in an atmosphere reminiscent of the mob scene from Aida which was little less than a pickpocket's dream. To get some privacy for the medical examination, the doctors commandeered the adjoining kitchen and in this crockery clinic the Swede was led for the usual mumbo jumbo. Newspapermen complained at being barred while waiters, cheis, busboys and porters had ready access to the premises.

"What can we do," asked one commissioner plaintively. "It's their kitchen!"

Ingo came out still smilingly at ease and Patterson was summoned into the smoky sanctum of soup spoons and stethoscopes. The champion was wrapped in a white terry cloth robe and his attitude plainly announced, "I'm tired of being called a cheese champion."

Nobody could tell how all the women on hand crowded into the joint past a double police guard but, when it came time to strip down to the all-together and step onto the scales, a voice announced:
