

Miss California Entrants Injured In Freeway Crash

SANTA CRUZ (UPI) — Three Miss California contestants and a Washington state beauty queen will go on with the show tonight in the aftermath of a freeway crash here Thursday, which also critically injured an elderly couple.

A car carrying the four girls smashed broadside into the auto of James H. Fieldhouse, 71, Santa Cruz, and his wife, Felice, 69, which pulled across the highway in front of them. The couple were listed as "critical" this morning in Santa Cruz County Hospital. Wearing special makeup, the

three slightly injured beauty contestants will participate tonight in the Miss California pageant here they are:

Miss San Diego: Leona Lucille McCurdy, 19, a dance studio operator who was shaken.

Miss Marysville-Yuba City: Janelle Elizabeth Johnson, 20, coed at Brigham Young University, who suffered face, head and leg bruises.

Miss Sonoma County: Chonne Mae Patton, 18, coed at Santa Rosa Junior College, who suffered bruises and chest injuries.

A visiting beauty queen, Sharon Joyce Vaughn, 20, of Port Orchard, Wash., who was recently crowned Miss Washington, suffered head lacerations. A University of Washington junior, she also will appear in tonight's pageant.

The driver of the girls' car, Matt Ahmed, 30, suffered minor head and face injuries. He was a member of the Santa Cruz Jaycee Hospitality Committee.

Mr. and Mrs. Fieldhouse were thrown from their car by the collision's impact.

The three beauty contestants will receive special makeup tonight from a judge, Bud Westmore, a makeup man at Universal-International Studios.

Long Enters State Court To Seek Hospital Release

COVINGTON, La. (AP) — Gov. Earl Long goes into a Louisiana court today—20 years to the day he took the reins as state chief executive the first time—to try to win freedom from a mental hospital.

Long and his battery of 11 lawyers will plead their case before District Judge Robert D. Jones in what promises to be a jam-packed junior high school auditorium. The school is substituting for Covington's courthouse while a new building goes up.

Missing from the dramatic hearing scene will be Long's wife, Blanche, and Sen. Russell B. Long (D-La.), two of the three persons who signed the governor's original Texas commitment papers May 30.

Mrs. Long remained out of the state—leaving the governor's habeas corpus freedom plea unchanged from her quarter.

In a surprise move, Long filed a suit for separation from his 58-year-old wife. It served to nullify any possible future committal action by Mrs. Long, but attorneys said the suit was in preparation for a full-scale divorce proceeding.

Senator Long in Washington disengaged himself from the sanity proceedings. The senator, a nephew of the governor, said the matter now rested with the court.

Long's chief counsel, Joe Arthur Sims of Hammond, asked Thursday night for the resignation of Jesse H. Banks' son, state hospitals director.

Sims, in a taped radio interview, charged the Long-appointed official assisted in Long's commitment. He said Banks' son kept Long a virtual prisoner and deprived him of counsel.
