

Majors Select All-Stars

NEW YORK (AP)—Hank Aaron, Milwaukee's slugging outfielder, set a baseball precedent Saturday when he became the first player ever to be chosen unanimously for the major league All-Star game.

Commissioner Ford Frick made the announcement in releasing the opening lineups—as picked by the players themselves—for the attraction at Forbes Field in Pittsburgh July 7.

The same teams, with the addition of three players to each, will also meet in the second 1959 All-Star game Monday, Aug. 3, at Los Angeles.

Aaron, receiving a maximum 208 votes, was one of three members of the champion Braves named for the National League team. The others were third baseman Ed Mathews and catcher Del Crandall.

By contrast, the world champion New York Yankees, who have dominated teams in the past, placed only one man on the American League team. He is Bill Skowron, first baseman.

Even Mickey Mantle was shut out to the second team as the Cleveland Indians and Chicago White Sox, who have been battling for first place, each put two men on the AL starting team.

In the early days of the All-Star game the players picked the teams. Later the job was turned over to the fans. When this was found impractical, the voting was returned to the players last year.

No pitchers were chosen. This will be left to the rival managers—Casey Stengel of the Yankees and Fred Haney of the Braves.

Aaron is one of three repeaters on the NL team. The others are outfielder Willie Mays of the San Francisco Giants and Ernie Banks, shortstop of the Chicago Cubs.

Orlando Cepeda, the Giants' 1958 Rookie of the Year in the National League, made the team for the first time at first base. Also named were Johnny Temple, Cincinnati second baseman, and Wally Moon, Los Angeles left fielder.

Repeaters in the American League were catcher Gus Triandos of Baltimore, second baseman Nellie Fox and shortstop Luis Aparicio, both of the Chicago White Sox, and the Yankees' Skowron.

Rocky Colavito, Cleveland's spectacular long-ball hitter, edged Detroit's league-leading batsman, Harvey Kuenn, for the right field spot. Colavito is a newcomer to the All-Star team along with the third base selection, Harmon Killebrew of the Washington Senators.

Completing the team were center fielder Al Kaline of Detroit, who beat out Mantle; and left fielder Minnie Minoso of Cleveland.

Derby Choice Snares Win

INGLEWOOD, Calif. (AP)—Bagdad, the lone bright star in an otherwise lackluster field of seven 3-year-old colts, swept to an easy victory in the \$112,000 Hollywood Derby Saturday.

Made the favorite at odds of about 1 to 5, the Kentucky colt breezed in by 10 or more lengths with jockey Willie Shoemaker enjoying the ride.

Worshiper from the Llangollen Farm was second and King O'Turf from King Bros. Stable third in the 19th running of the mile and one-quarter derby.

The time was 1:39 3-5. Bagdad is owned by oilman Howard Keck of Los Angeles. While this was his first stakes triumph, the dark brown son of Double Jay raced a powerful second to Sword Dancer in the Belmont Stakes two weeks ago in New York.

Bagdad paid \$2.40, \$2.40 and \$2.30. High weight of the derby was 114 pounds, with Bagdad carrying the load. The others shouldered 110. The victory was worth a net \$65,900.

PR Boss Selected By Board

George A. Price Jr., a resident of the Klamath Basin from 1945 to 1954, was named Friday as the new director of the Klamath Falls Park and Recreation Department.

Price, 28, whose appointment takes effect July 15, fills the position recently vacated by Bob Bonney who left Klamath Falls for a like-post in El Cerrito.

Price is currently attending summer school at the University of Oregon, while serving as assistant recreation director of the Willamalane Park and Recreation District. He now makes his home in Springfield.

After serving in the Navy for four years, gaining quite a reputation as a boxer, Price returned to Merrill where he married the former Eleanor Hunnicutt. The Prices have one daughter.

During the time prior to his departure from Klamath Falls in 1954 Price became widely known throughout the Klamath Falls area as a better than average light-weight fighter. He appeared on several fight cards locally during this period.

A bachelor of science graduate in 1953 from the University of Oregon, Price is now working toward his master's degree.

The appointment of Price to the position was made by the board over a number of applications received, according to city manager Gerald Vergeer.

World Salutes Johannson As Promoter Plans Rematch

NEW YORK (AP)—The whole wide world climbed on the Ingemar Johannson bandwagon Saturday while Promoter Bill Rosensohn, a \$40,000 loser, planned a million-dollar-plus rematch in September.

The 26-year-old Swede looked ahead to a rosy future, strewn with dollar bills, after stopping Floyd Patterson with his "thunder and lightning" right hand in 2:04 of the third round Friday night at Yankee Stadium. The mystery right he hid in training now rules the heavyweight division.

Rosensohn, haggard and worn, said he would take a vacation before getting down to serious work on the rematch. As he holds an iron clad contract for the fight, he can afford to wait. The boy promoter, who lost 20 pounds, during his ordeal, said he will not start talking date, or site until July 20.

"I have the contract, calling for a rematch in 90 days," he said. "The site is to be in the United States with the city to be determined by me. Johannson's entire purse will be held in escrow until the rematch under terms of the contract."

Rosensohn revealed a gross gate of \$470,712 and explained that the \$100 tops made this amount possible. He admitted that many of the \$100 customers did not show up. As the promoter got half of the net gate of \$203,569 (half of \$407,129) and his expenses ran to about \$245,000, he lost a little over \$40,000.

"I will be in complete charge of everything next time," said Rosensohn, who did not share in the theater-TV-radio-movie money this time.

WIMBLEDON, England (AP)—Top-seeded Alex Olmedo of Peru and his U.S. Davis Cup teammate, Barry MacKay, paced a phalanx of men's favorites into the quarter-finals Saturday while upsets rocked women's ranks in the All-England Tennis Championships.

Christine Truman, the 18-year-old British amazon who was favored for Althea Gibson's vacated title, went down before the steady stroking of tiny Yola Ramirez of Mexico 6-3, 6-2. The main American hope, Mrs. Beverly Baker Fleitz of Long Beach, Calif., lost to Edda Buding, a German political refugee, 8-6, 2-6, 7-5.

Olmedo crushed Torben Ulrich of Denmark 6-3, 6-3, 6-2. MacKay, a 23-year-old from Dayton, Ohio, smashed past left-handed Billy Knight of Britain 6-2, 8-6, 10-8.

Age and a Frenchman overtook 45-year-old Gardner Mulloy, Uncle Sam's lone other male contender. The Miami, Fla., veteran lost to Jean-Claude Molinari 6-1, 6-2, 7-9, 6-2.

The United States suffered another reversal when its doubles team of Olmedo and MacKay lost to a lightly regarded South African tandem, Gordon Forbes and Abe Segal, 6-4, 10-8, 2-6, 1-6, 6-1.

Three Australian Davis Cup members — Neale Fraser, Roy Emerson and Rod Laver — also advanced to the quarter-finals along with Luis Ayala of Chile and Bobby Wilson of Britain.

Surprise elimination of Miss Truman and Mrs. Fleitz threw the women's division into a wide open scramble, with two representatives left to guard the title. Uncle Sam has not lost since 1937.

They are Darlene Hard, from Montebello, Calif., and Sally Moore, a 19-year-old from Bakersfield, Calif.
