Escorted to the altar by her father, the bride was lovely in a chapel length gown of peau de soie made with long tapered sleeves and scoop neckline studded with rhinestones. Clusters of rhinestones were placed at intervals in the wide ribbon drape around the center of the full skirt. A pearl tiara held her fingertip veil and she carried a lavender-throated white orchid and lily of the valley on a prayer book.
