No Shortage Of Doctors In This Kansas Family

GARNETT, Kan. —The telephone rings in an upstairs bedroom of the roomy old house. It's 2 a.m.

Dr. Bob Stevens answers sleepily. "Yes, Yes, she's here. It's for you, Mildred." He hands the receiver to his wife.

She, too, is a doctor. Dr. Mildred Stevens listens, assessing the situation. Emergency. She dresses hurriedly.

"I'll take the car with the chains. Bob, it snowed again, and I'm afraid it's slick." Within minutes, she grabs her 22-pound medical bag, climbs in one of their two cars and drives off.

If Dr. Bob should get a summons while she's away, he'll call one of the neighborhood babysitters prepared for just such a contingency. The Stevenses are also parents of a growing family. Laura, 8, Victor, 7, Rhonda, 5, Jane, 3, and James, 2.

With feminine pride, Mildred recalls that she practiced medicine "through all five pregnancies, right up to labor. My patients needed me."

Naturally, she gets more obstetrical cases than her husband, but Bob has plenty to do. Together, they account for 40 to 60 patients a day. But as busy as they are, the doctors manage to find time for their youngsters.

"We usually have a long, pleasant breakfast period with the children," Mildred says. "And we're all at home at noon together for about an hour; and of course, again at night."

During the day a housekeeper watches the children too young to attend school while the doctors are away at the office, a historic structure built in 1858 as a frontier hotel and stage-coach stop.

"For all I know, Kit Carson might have slept here," Dr. Bob jokes.

They have had the century-old place reinforced and converted. There is a waiting room for 12 to 15 patients who are dispatched to either office by an attendant.

The old kitchen serves as a laboratory. And if Mildred or Bob is puzzled by a case, their offices are handy. Either can step across the hall, like doctors do in the movies, and say, "Doctor, I'd like to have your view on this."

In fact, the Stevens romance reads just like a Hollywood scenario. Both are 36, native Kansans and 1947 graduates, with honors, of the University of Kansas School of Medicine. They met in their pre-med days on the campus at Lawrence.

They were married in April 1947 and got their medical degrees in June. The following year they lived at Kansas City, Kan., near the K. U. Medical Center where Bob interned. Mildred interned at St. Margaret's Hospital in Kansas City, Kansas.

Deciding to practice at Garnett, an eastern Kansas community of 3,000 people, they moved here in 1948. Bob put in military service from 1951 to 1952 while Mildred minded the office.

There's no field like medicine, they agree. But Mildred confides that she would like more time to herself, "an hour or two extra in the morning, and an extra couple of hours in the afternoon," so she could sew.
