Work is to start at once on construction of a 5700 square foot one-story building for Klamath Theaters, Inc., just beyond (SE) of the Tower Theater on So. 6th St., for lease to Maury's Foreign Cars (which is owned by Maury Clark and Arthur Rickhell), the local Volkswagen retail outlet.

Morrison & Howard were architects for the structure and estimated the cost at \$37,795. Award was made to the low bidder, Brosterhaus Construction Co., 1541 Elm St., whose bid was \$37,585. Other bidders were Vik Construction Co., Eugene, \$37,896; Duncan Construction Co., Klamath Falls, \$39,333; Kerr Construction Co., Klamath Falls, \$39,407; Angelo Doversi, \$41,332.40; A. C. Johnson & Son, Eureka, \$43,854.

Morrison & Howard, architects, 203-05 Williams Bldg., are working on preliminary plans for the Lucile O'Neill School to be built on a 20-acre site bounded by Eberlein and Avalon. Initial planning is for an invitation for basic bids on 12 standard classrooms with an alternate calling for construction of four more classrooms. It will be a Klamath Falls elementary school named for Mrs. V. E. O'Neill, longtime KUH's English teacher and for seven years a member of the State Board of Education.

Brosterhaus Construction Co. is building an automotive sales office for Baisiger Motor interests on So. 6th St. directly across from the Town & Country shopping center. Morrison & Howard are architects.

Fifty high school mathematics teachers from 14 Western states have started a six-week math fellowship program at Stanford University, sponsored by the General Electric Company's educational and charitable fund. Fred G. Hess, Henley High School teacher, and Glenn Chamberlin, KUH's math instructor, are among a total of six invited from Oregon. In 1958, Calvin P. Bart, of KUH's, participated in this one of seven expenses-paid programs in math and in chemistry and physics offered by the company nationally. Purpose is an attempt to bring secondary school teachers up to date in their fields and to stimulate student interest in mathematics through increased teacher enthusiasm and new knowledge.

Charles Fraley is remodeling Buy Low Food Center, 1338 Oregon Ave., for the owner, Harold Clark. Walter Pappas, Pine Grove, architect, is the new front and proposed warehouse addition will add approximately 1000 square feet of ground area to the market.

Howard R. Perrin's office, 1121 Main St., is drawing plans and specifications for rebuilding the building, owned by Maguire Estate, at 8th and Main and occupied until the May fire by Payless Drug Store which hopes to move back to that location as soon as possible. The building will cover approximately 10,700 square feet of ground area. Pinniger & Watkins have demolition contract for remains of former building.

The decision of the Allstate Insurance Companies to expand into the international market by establishment of a Swiss subsidiary has been announced by President Judson B. Branch. The news was relayed by J. R. Banks, Salem, to Fred Lawrence, Klamath Falls last week. The subsidiary, a holding company, will be known as Allstate Insurance International. It, in turn, will form a subsidiary, Allstadt Versicherungs, A.G., which will be the operating company in Switzerland effective Aug. 1. The move is the reverse of the usual situation of European insurance companies expanding into American markets. Allstate, wholly owned subsidiary of Sears, Roebuck & Co., is the largest American stock insurer. The companies' domestic operations are supervised through 30 regional offices. The Oregon-Southern Idaho region is administered from Salem.

Portland had a special Centennial Home Tour on Saturday, from 11 a.m. to 5 p.m., sponsored by the Women's Architectural League of Oregon. Proceeds go to the University of Oregon school of architecture scholarship funds. Among the homes toured was that of Glenn Stanton, Portland architect, 2611 NE Mason St.

Bud Brown, Western Oil & Burner Co., Klamath Falls, was elected a director of the Oil Heat Institute of Oregon at the recent annual convention at Salem. On the program of the meeting was a description of a new thermo catalytic oil burner which uses less oil and is less expensive. Al Loucks, former Salem mayor who operates Home Oil Co., Salem, is new president. Leonard Gassner, executive secretary of OHI, gave a report entitled "The Crusade," which recounted successful promotions of the past year.

Trowbridge & Flynn Electric Co., Medford, bid \$3,160 for cable, plus \$400 for poles, a total of \$3,560.

Renewal Set For Licenses

Licensed school bus drivers have been urged by the Oregon Department of Motor Vehicles to renew their licenses now for the fall school term.

Licenses of more than 2,500 of these drivers who were licensed during the initial year of the program expire on July 1. Applications for renewal are available from any driver license examiner or county school superintendent. They may be filed with examiners or mailed to the Department of Motor Vehicles in Salem.

Physical examination forms are available from the same sources. Physicals are required every three years for drivers 18-34 years of age; every two years for drivers 35-44 and annually for drivers 45 and over. A person 45 or over need not have a physical for renewal this year if his license was issued on or after March 1, 1959.

Edward M. Syring, manager of the department's drivers license division, indicated that temporary school bus driver permits for emergency drivers would be discontinued next school year. He said that if a licensed school bus driver and his substitute are not available, a driver with a chauffeur's license may be used at the discretion of the school administrator or school bus contractor.
