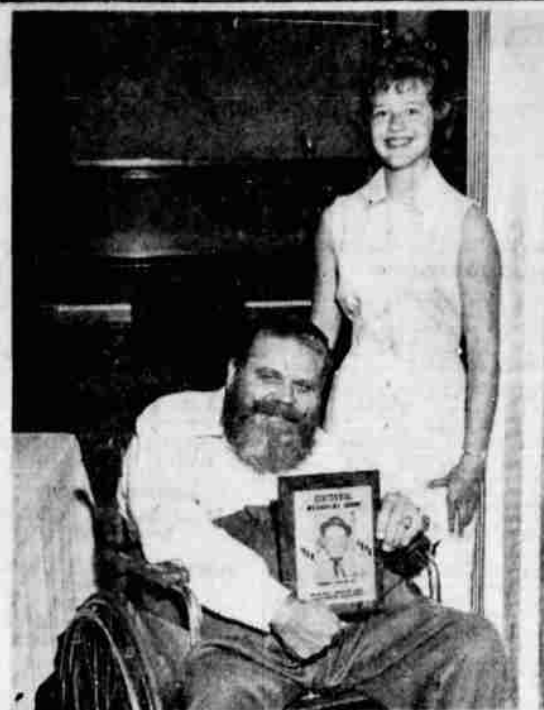

Vetoes Of Two Farm Bills May Set Stage For Fight

WASHINGTON (AP)—Vetoes of two farm bills may well have set the stage for bitter struggles over farm issues next year, both in Congress and in the presidential election campaign.

President Eisenhower rejected Thursday bills affecting wheat and tobacco, saying they failed to meet needs of growers in expanding markets and in curbing costly surplus production.

Under the bills, he said in effect, an already bad situation would have been made worse in-

stead of better. Eisenhower's action — which had been recommended by Secretary of Agriculture Ezra Taft Benson — apparently killed all prospects of legislation for these two crops this year.

Wheat is in serious trouble because of surpluses and past failure of the present program to control production. Tobacco is losing foreign markets because its rigid support system keeps prices going up. The tobacco bill would have stopped the increase, but would not have lowered the prices.

Democratic leaders in Congress sharply criticized the President's action. Disagreeing with his conclusions, they prepared to carry to the voters their contentions that the rejected measures would have reduced wheat production and cut the cost of farm programs to taxpayers.

Secretary Benson apparently had no hope of further action on wheat and tobacco at this session. He left Thursday night for a 10-day farm trade trip to Switzerland, West Germany and Denmark.

Backers of the bills virtually abandoned any hope of overriding the vetoes. Most of them talked in terms of trying again next year, but then on a new broad approach to the problems of farm income and supply stabilization.

The House Agriculture Committee will open such long-range hearings Monday.

The vetoed bill would have reduced allotments 25 per cent but would have raised support to 90 per cent of parity.

Parity is a standard for measuring farm prices declared by law to be fair to farmers in relation to prices charged them.

Return Due Wool Farmers

LAKEVIEW — Approximately \$33,065.60 will be returned in the near future to about 75 local operators who took part in the farm flock wool pool shipment made from Lakeview Wednesday, June 24.

The pool was under the direction of George Manning, chairman of the committee for the Lake County Farm Bureau. Purchase was made by the Blue Mountain Hide, Wool and Fur Company of Portland. Two railroad cars and a large truck were needed for the shipment.

The figures, which are approximate at this time, show 60,572 pounds of white wool at 48¢ cents for a total of \$29,301.71; 124 pounds of black wool at 32¢ cents, \$39.68; 102 pounds black wool at 30¢ cents, \$30.60; 6,399 pounds of white at 49¢ cents, \$3,135.51; 3,427 pounds of tags at 20¢ cents, \$685.40; 138 pounds of lambs wool at 45¢ cents, \$62.10; 85 pounds of caracul at 25¢ cents, \$21.25.

Even with an approximate seven-cent advantage the total was far ahead of last year's \$18,000.

Graduate Of Oregon Tech Leads Collegiate Riders

Gary Gregg who was graduated this year from Oregon Technical Institute is riding into the National Intercollegiate Rodeo with a season's total of 525 points in saddle bronc riding.

He has 29 more points than his closest competitor for the national title. And if his luck holds up, he will be the world's best collegiate rodeo bronc rider when the Fourth of July weekend is ended.

Gregg, 27, a firm believer in a cowboy's luck, says he is losing

to the ride. Meanwhile, he is taking a fierce beating. Broncs are tougher to ride when saddled. The rider must get the seat of his pants aimed just right or he gets spanked hard. Gregg has bruises a foot in diameter on his thighs from a recent ride.

The legs, he says, take a beating. Sometimes an ankle hangs up momentarily in the stirrup when a cowboy is bucked off or is transferred to the pickup horse. It can be painful. More injuries occur that way than when riders hit the dust.

Gregg has been riding for three years. It all began when he left his birthplace in Bend in 1947 to go to Dayville where his father was logging. Gregg and his two younger brothers began to ride with Jackie Wright, a top bronc man. One of the brothers quit riding, but the other and Wright regularly make the professional rodeo circuit.

Gregg entered lots of semi-professional and professional shows and began to win regularly about two years ago. He entered OTI two years ago, studied diesel technology, and rode both years in the college circuit as a member of the OTI rodeo team.

Last year, Gregg said he had more luck with bareback broncs, and he polished off fourth place in the nation at the National Intercollegiate show in Colorado. But he soured this year on bareback riding, worked fine with saddle broncs, and licked everybody in the Pacific Coast collegiate region.

Gregg says he is worried about competition from the Northwest and states like Montana, Wyoming, North and South Dakota. That is bronc riding country. Southerners, who annually swell the collegiate circuit's roster prefer mostly to ride bulls.

sleep just thinking about it. A bad break on any of the two official rides he will make at the rodeo could knock him out of contention.

Besides the regal title, a fancy, finely scroled championship saddle is at stake. No purses are involved.

You can get the breaks, good or bad, by the horse you draw to ride, by how tall you sit in the saddle or by the way you hold your mouth. And in the thundering seconds after the chute is flung open, there is a long list of finicky little things a rider has to attend to besides trying to stay aboard a bucking bronc.

Unless his spurred boots are pointed forward above the point of the horse's shoulder blade on the first leap out of the chute, the cowboy is disqualified.

Then for 10 seconds he must rake the horse's flank in a rocking motion from front to back. The spurs are too dull to injure the animal, but they get him riled. The more horse hair the spurs collect, the higher the cowboy's score.

The rider is spurring perfectly when he kicks his heels higher than the cantle of the saddle. He has to watch his posture and a lot of other things that add drama

He plans to stay with horses—both saddle and bareback broncs—in the coming rodeo, if he is allowed to enter both events. Collegiate rules are strict. They are tailored after the big-time Rodeo Cowboys Association standards. Judges and all officials, incidental-

ly, are RCA men. With him, riding is more a sport and a business than an adventure. It takes years to get to the top and there are so many things to learn that even oldtimers are learning things. So keen is competition, too, that

most of the men who ride into the money study rodeo stock exhaustively. Gregg says he will have an advantage against out-of-state riders because he is familiar with all the horses that Harley Tucker of Joseph, rodeo stock contractor, will provide for the show.

He has ridden most of them. Gregg says he is going to Dayville as soon as the rodeo is over. He will get a job as a diesel technician somewhere, he says, preferably around John Day. In his spare time he plans to ride the professional circuit.
