

LA Continues On Hot Streak; Tribe Wins Pair, Holds Lead

Yes sir, the Dodgers are still in the National League—almost atop it in fact—and it looks like no one is going to knock the Indians out of first place in the American League as long as Tito Francona is around.

It's been 29 years since the Dodgers and Indians were World Series rivals and you could have had your own odds back in April if you thought they would be this year. And yet, here is virtually the halfway point of the campaign and the Dodgers are the hottest team in the NL while the Indians stubbornly cling to first place in the AL.

The Dodgers ran their winning streak to seven games, longest of the year in the NL with a 9-4 victory over the Pittsburgh Pirates Sunday while the Indians retained their one-game margin by beating the Boston Red Sox, 5-4 and 1-0.

Don Demeter, Gil Hodges and Charlie Neal supplied the home run power for the Dodgers enabling Danny McDevitt to win his seventh game. Francona, Cleveland's "Mr. Clutch," delivered a game-winning single in the seventh inning of the Tribe's opener and then Herb Score's two-hitter led a homer by Jim Baxes completed the doubleheader sweep.

The Milwaukee Braves held their one-game NL margin as Juan Pizarro beat the Chicago Cubs, 2-1; Johnny Antonelli won his 11th game when he pitched the San Francisco Giants to a 6-0 win over the Philadelphia Phillies; and the St. Louis Cardinals downed the Cincinnati Reds, 9-7 and 11-8 in other NL games.

The Chicago White Sox delighted

ed a Sunday crowd of 42,121 with 9-2 and 4-2 victories over the New York Yankees; the Detroit Tigers defeated the Baltimore Orioles, 7-2, and the Washington Senators climbed out of the cellar with a 7-3 decision over the Kansas City Athletics.

The Dodgers routed Bob Friend with a five-run burst in the fourth inning and went on to score their ninth victory in 10 games and their 12th in 15.

Francona singled after a double by Woodie Held to snap a 4-4 tie and enable Cleveland relief pitcher Jim Perry to win his second decision. Baxes' homer in the seventh inning of the nightcap

spoiled a fine pitching performance by Ted Wills and gave Score his eighth triumph.

Pizarro, yielded five hits and struck out six for the Braves. Eddie Mathews hit his 23rd homer.

Giants 6, Phils 0
Antonelli pitched a seven-hitter and was backed by a brilliant San Francisco defense. Orlando Cepeda paced the 10-hit Giant offense with a homer, double and single.

Lindy McDaniel relieved in both games for the Cardinals who scored seven unearned runs in the first inning of the opener and then clubbed out 15 hits in the nightcap.

Sherman Lollar, Earl Battey, Bubba Phillips and Hal Smith hit homers and Early Wynn won his 11th game of the season and 260th of his career for the White Sox in the first game with New York. Lollar also hit a three-run homer in the first inning of the second game to kayo Don Larsen and provide the big blow in Dick Donovan's fifth win of the season.

Wind, Garden Given Credit
CHICAGO (AP) — Ken Venturi made one of the oddest parlayes in golf pay off for victory in the \$37,000 Chicago Open.

He credited his garden in Daly City, Calif., a suburb of San Francisco, and the wind at Glenageary Country Club with helping bring him the \$9,000 first award Sunday.

In repeating for the tournament's crown, Venturi drilled shots through the gusty wind for a closing 66 and a 7-under-par total of 273. He made up five shots on Johnny Pott of Shreveport, the leader through the first three rounds, who closed with a 72 and 274 for runner-up swag of \$4,000.

Venturi, who inserted the Los Angeles Open* triumph between his 1958 Chicago Open and this one for his only victories in a year is a perfectionist.

"I had 25 putts on the last round in beating out Pott," said the 28-year-old erstwhile auto salesman. "It was the greatest putting day I've ever had."

"During the last year I've been growing various types of grass used on greens and studying them. That garden helped me a lot in learning the various grains of the grass and their effect on putts."
