Boat Mishap Claims Five

PRINCE RUPERT, B.C. (AP)—Five persons, trapped in the wheelhouse of a fishing boat, drowned Sunday when the vessel capsized, but six others who clung to the overturned craft were rescued.

The 11 were returning from a revival meeting at Port Edward, 11 miles south of here, when the gillnetter Lorna May capsized.

Drowned were Jonathan Derrick, 34, his wife, Rosie, 29, his brother, Herbert, 13, and his two young sons, Benjamin and Arnold. Arthur Derrick, 24, Paul Russell, 22, Eva Russell, 22, Cora Russell, 18, Randy Coode, 2, and an unidentified baby girl were picked up by another fishing vessel.

2 Oregonians Boat Victims

Boating accidents in Washington claimed the lives of four men over the weekend, two of them Oregonians shooting the rapids of the Cowlitz River.

The other two victims were from Seattle and lost their lives in separate accidents. Ray Wheaton, 38, a Boeing Airplane Co. employee, lost his life in Lake Wenatchee when his small boat overturned as he was pulling up anchor. His 14-year-old daughter, Lorraine, was rescued.

Daniel Pempelt, 30, drowned when the 14-footer in which he and his son were fishing on the North Fork of the Snoqualmie capsized. The son, Donald, 19, was unable to swim but clung to branches of a log as his father was swept down the river.

Don Hug, 32, and Robert M. Brown, 42, died Saturday when the rubber life raft in which they were shooting rapids hit a log jam and upset. The two were from Portland. Their companions, Les Malone and Bill Laxton, both of Kelso, made it to shore safely.

Home Located In Poor Spot

KYOTO, Japan (AP)—It's practically raining motorcycles at Shigeo Tanaka's house.

Tanaka's home lies at the bottom of an S-turn on a highway.

Tanaka has asked the highway people to put up a fence.

Germany Plans Elections Despite Russia Warnings

BERLIN (AP)—West Germany pushed ahead today with plans for a presidential election in isolated Berlin despite Soviet warnings such a move will be viewed as a provocative act.

Officials remained alert as Communist East German officials said they would look on the election 110 miles behind the Iron Curtain with "great seriousness." But there was no expectation of any real trouble when the Electoral College meets Wednesday.

The U. S. State Department brushed aside Soviet notes to the Western Big Three protesting the holding of the election in West Berlin. Officials in Washington termed the notes a new effort to meddle in Germany's internal affairs.

The Soviet note to the United States said the Soviet Union considered holding the elections in Berlin "a new attempt to use the current abnormal situation in the city in order to inflame even more the situation in Germany."

State Department press officer Lincoln White said the decision to hold the election in Berlin "merely represents a continuation of a tradition begun with the presidential election in Berlin in July 1954." That election was held in Berlin without Red protest.

Soviet Foreign Minister Andrei Gromyko declared in Moscow that holding the election in Berlin was another example of an effort to create tension.

The Soviet Union and East Germany insist West Berlin is a part of East Germany. The State Department holds that the Red-girdled city is "held in trust by the principal Allied powers as the capital of a reunited Germany."

The 1,638-member Electoral College will choose a successor to 73-year-old President Theodor Heuss, who is ineligible to run for a third five-year term. Chancellor Konrad Adenauer is backing Heinrich Lübke, agriculture minister in his government and a member of his Christian Democratic party. He is opposed to Carlo Schmidt,

Socialist, and Max Becker, free Democrat.

The Western Allies and the Soviets meanwhile continued preparations to resume the foreign ministers' conference on Berlin July 13.

British Foreign Secretary Selwyn Lloyd was expected to contact the U. S., French and West German foreign ministers this week on a British plan to redraft Western proposals on Berlin in an attempt to break the East-West deadlock and pave the way for a summit meeting.

Prime Minister Harold Macmillan was reported convinced that enough had transpired before the foreign ministers' talks recessed in Geneva nine days ago to justify a summit parley.

Gromyko said in Moscow his government prefers an agreed solution of the Berlin question, but he made clear that he had in mind Western agreement to the Soviet demands.

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Law Explained By Job Group

The State Unemployment Compensation Commission said today that because of new, more complex eligibility requirements, Oregon employers often will be called on to verify job facts about former employees claiming unemployment insurance benefits.

Because existing administrative methods will not always provide weeks worked and earnings information needed under newly legislated eligibility requirements, employers sometimes will be asked to furnish it through the mail.

An employer who receives a request for verification of employment, is required to complete it and return it within three working days of the time he receives it, says the commission. Failure to reply will result in the claim being determined on the basis of the claimant's own report. In cases of overpayment, because an employer hasn't furnished information, the amount may be charged to the employer.

Leading to the procedure are new requirements that to be eligible for unemployment insurance benefits a person must have worked at least 20 weeks between April 1, 1958 and March 31, 1959 for employers covered by the unemployment compensation law, and have been paid \$20 or more for each of these weeks. Furthermore, he must have been paid a minimum of \$700 during that year, also with employers covered by the law.

NO EXPLANATION
DOUALA, Cameroons (AP)—Officials could give no explanation today for an attack by an armed band which killed 6 persons and wounded 20 in this United Nations trusteeship territory administered by the French.

Three of the dead and four of the wounded were Europeans. Two of some 30 rioters were killed, two wounded and several captured by police.

5 Children Die In Fire

PRINCE RUPERT, B.C. (AP)—Despite the sacrifice of a neighbor who apparently gave his life trying to rescue them, five children died Saturday when fire consumed a home at an Indian mission.

The dead were listed as William, Brenda, Lorraine and Roberta Morse, aged 14, 10, 7 and 4, respectively; Angeline Arason, 4, and Ralph Young, 38.

Royal Canadian Mounted Police said Robert Morse, father of the children, was away on a fishing boat. They said they didn't know where the mother was.

The fire was on the Skidegate Mission Reserve, 120 miles southwest of here in the Queen Charlotte Islands.

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
