Truck Driver Killed In Blast — ST. MARY, Mont. (AP) — A huge gasoline truck hurled out of control down a mountain highway for a half-mile Sunday, crashing at the edge of this resort town in a spectacular explosion.

The truck's driver, Floyd B. Cole, 28, was killed.

Both trailers of the 36-ton truck, carrying 6,850 gallons of diesel fuel, exploded as it smashed into a row of gasoline pumps.

Deputy Sheriff W. E. Stillwell said the truck's brakes apparently failed.
