Furniture Mart To Open

Furniture dealers of the Klamath Basin are planning to attend the 1959 Northwest Furniture Market that begins in Seattle at 8 a.m. Sunday, July 12, and continues through Wednesday, July 15.

More than a 6,000 furniture buyers, distributors and manufacturers will gather in Seattle and will be shown more than 300 lines by more than 100 exhibitors on both floors of the Seattle Civic Auditorium and the adjacent National Guard Armory.

Highlighting Market Week will be the First Annual Furniture Merit Award dinner and dance to be held Monday evening, July 13, in the Spanish Ballroom of the Olympic Hotel, Seattle.

The Northwest Furniture Retailers Association will honor one manufacturer and one manufacturer's representative who, in the opinion of the judges, have shown an interest in the retailers' problems in evidence of a sincere desire to be helpful.

The importance of the Seattle market is reflected in the requests from large Eastern and Southern furniture manufacturers who want to show their samples here for the first time, according to Frank B. Deuster, executive secretary of the Northwest Furniture Manufacturers Association.

While the furniture market is open to furniture dealers only, new creations will be introduced to the public immediately at the close of the market at all furniture and department stores.

Italy Prince Misses Death SAN DIEGO, Calif. (AP) — Italian Prince Victor Emmanuel, 22, who had a close call with death in a skin-diving mishap, was recovering today in sick bay aboard the submarine tender Nerues.

The prince, son of exiled King Umberto II, said he felt fine when he emerged from a Navy decompression chamber aboard the Nerues Monday. He was to be held in sick bay another 24 hours for observation.

He was in the chamber 18 hours for treatment of air embolism, or bubble, which entered his blood stream when he surfaced without first exhaling compressed air while skin-diving off San Diego Sunday.

Lt. Robinson Kirkpatrick, a Navy doctor, said death could have come in minutes if an air bubble had reached the heart.

AF Explains Orb Fizzle INGLEWOOD, Calif. (AP)—Why didn't the Discoverer IV rocket fired Thursday from the West Coast go into orbit? Not enough speed, says the Air Force.

To hurl a capsule-bearing satellite into a course around the earth's poles, as planned, the vehicle would have had to reach 18,000 miles an hour.

A Ballistic Missile Division spokesman declined to say whether the first or the second stage was to blame for the insufficient velocity.

The first was an intermediate-range, Douglas-built Thor missile; the second, all of which was designed to enter orbit, was made by Lockheed.

Discoverer IV, carrying a 300-pound capsule that was to have been ejected over the Pacific, was launched from Vandenberg Air Force Base, 170 miles north of this Los Angeles suburb. The instruments in the capsule were secret.
