GILCHRIST—A farewell dinner honoring the Leslie C. Norlin family was held recently at the Gilchrist Methodist Church. Fifty friends of the Norlins attended the 1 p.m. dinner.

### Reds Lose Nordic Seat

REYKJAVIK, Iceland (AP)—The Communist party dropped one seat in Iceland's Parliament and the Progressives picked up two in final results announced from Sunday's general election.

The Communists, who had tried to make Iceland's dispute with Britain over fishing limits a campaign issue, now hold only seven seats in the 52-member House.

The Progressives wound up with 19 seats. The right-wing Independence party picked up one seat to bring its total to 20.

The Social Democrats, serving as a minority government with Independence party support since the last election in 1956, dropped two seats, leaving them only six.

### Negro General Promotion OK'd

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Senate today approved promotion of Brig. Gen. Benjamin O. Davis Jr., Negro officer in the Air Force, to the temporary rank of major general.

Davis is the first of his race to reach that rank in the armed services. His father was a brigadier general.

Davis now is deputy chief of staff for operations for the U. S. Air Force in Europe with headquarters at Ramstein Air Force Base, Germany.

### DUCHESS ILL

RICHMOND, England (UPI)—The Grand Duchess Zenia of Russia, 84-year-old sister of the last czar, is gravely ill with pneumonia, it was reported Thursday night. The Grand Duchess was staying at nearby Hampton Court Palace.

### Honor Paid War II Dead

ST. LOUIS (AP)—Eighteen Americans aboard a military plane that crashed into a cloud-covered mountain in remote New Guinea 14 years ago came home Monday to a common grave.

At the graveside were 34 relatives of the dead from 13 states. Tears rolled down some cheeks as the remains of their loved ones were buried in three flag-covered caskets.

The grave at Jefferson Barracks National Cemetery was marked with a single tombstone inscribed: "Died May 13, 1945 in air crash in Hidden Valley Dutch New Guinea."

The crash of the C47 killed 21 persons, including seven members of the Women's Army Corps.

Three persons survived the disaster which occurred an hour after the plane left Hollandia, Dutch New Guinea on a navigational training flight.

This was the second funeral service for the victims. In the first, a C47 circled over the area while Catholic, Protestant and Jewish chaplains read the services from the plane.

The only survivor at the graveside was John S. McCollom of Dayton, Ohio. McCollom, 40, an Air Force engineer, said: "I am still thankful in my prayers." His twin brother, Robert, died in the crash.

### Traffic Deaths Up Over 1958

CHICAGO (AP)—The nation's traffic deaths, showing a rise in each of the first five months this year, are five per cent higher than for the first five months of 1958.

Traffic accidents from Jan. 1 to June 1 killed 13,940 and probably accounted for a half million disabling injuries, the National Safety Council reported Monday.

May's death toll of 3,250 was 9 per cent higher than the 3,010 in May 1958. This year's five-month total compared to 13,280 for the corresponding period last year.
