Two Klamath Falls Senior Girl Scouts are attending the world-wide Girl Scout Roundup in Colorado Springs.

They are Karen Ralston and Faye Brannon. Both are 17 and will be seniors this year at Henley High School. Both will be available, when they return, for talks to organizations interested in Girl Scouting.

Miss Ralston is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Civill Ralston. Miss Brannon's parents are Mr. and Mrs. Gray Brannon, all from the Henley area.

The girls are among 8,000 delegates from countries throughout the world attending the convocation held every three years.

During their two-week stay the girls will live with patrols. Each patrol will cook, keep house and learn camping skills together. Crafts emphasizing the theme "Home Frontiers" will be exhibited from all over the world.

The girls were driven to Portland by Mrs. Ralston. They merged with other delegates from the Northwest and the entire group entrained to Colorado Springs.

The trip was financed from proceeds of a "home show" sponsored annually by the Girl Scouts and various local home and building supply merchants and from proceeds of a recent Girl Scout rummage sale.

The girls will leave Colorado Springs July 16.

Navy Opens Officer Slate To University Graduates

Navy Recruiter James L. Chesley, ship serviceman of the Klamath Falls Recruiting Station, announced the Navy's Officer Programs are open to selected college and university graduates.

Applications are being accepted from qualified young men for enrollment in the Navy's Officer Candidate School (OCS) Newport, Rhode Island. The mission of this school is to provide a reserve of qualified officers upon which to call in case of war or national emergency.

Upon completion of 16 weeks of intensive training, these men will be commissioned ensign, (in some cases lieutenant, junior grade), in the U.S. Naval Reserve.

Among the programs open, for which candidates are being sought, are Line (general assignment), Line (aerological duties), Line (air intelligence), Restricted Line, Engineers (Bureau of Ships), Restricted Line, Ordnance Engineering Officers (Bureau of Ordnance), Restricted Line, (Aeronautical Engineering duty), Restricted Line, (Naval Security Group), Restricted Line, (Naval Intelligence), Restricted Line, (Special duty specializing in Law).

Staff Corps: Supply Corps, Civil Engineer Corps, Medical Service Corps Officer, (general); Medical

Staff Corps Officer (bacteriologist), (entomologist), (physiologist), (clinical psychologist), (experimental psychologist) and (industrial hygienist).

Young men with the prerequisite college education, who wish to earn a commission in the U.S. Naval Reserve, should get full particulars from the nearest Navy Recruiting Station. Applications for OCS may be made nine months prior to receipt of a baccalaureate degree. In order to insure active duty shortly after graduation and thus avoid possible call by selective service, it is advisable to make application as soon as possible.
