Ticket Sale Now Open

PORTLAND — Sale of season tickets to the Portland Symphony Orchestra series is now open to the public, with option of subscribers to the 1958-59 series to renew seat locations which expired Wednesday, July 1.

Both the regular 12 concert subscription series and the new six concert Oriental series may be purchased on the season ticket basis, with payment made in four installments, according to Henry M. Norton, manager.

Piero Bellugi, new conductor, made his state debut this week in the symphony Centennial tour which took the orchestra to six Oregon cities and won acclaim for both the dynamic new maestro and the orchestra itself.

Guest artists include Leon Fleisher, pianist; Michael Rabin, violinist; Rostropovich, cellist; Rudolf Firkušny, pianist; Gina Bachauer, pianist; Franco Ferrari, violinist; Gary Graffman, pianist and Larimar Crowson, pianist.

In addition, three orchestral programs are scheduled, including the festive opening night on October 26, marking Bellugi's Portland debut, and a joint performance with the Portland Symphony Choir on February 15, presenting Verdi's powerful "Te Deum."

COFFEE LIFE SAVER

NEWARK, N.J. (UPI)—Authorities today said a coffee break saved the lives of 15 men. The men had just left an old wharf at Port Newark Tuesday when a 65-ton pile driver came crashing down. Two of the workers were injured as they scrambled to escape the pile driver. It crashed through the wharf into the water.

Snark Shot Said Success

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. (AP)—A Snark intercontinental guided missile shot 1,000 miles over the Atlantic today, then turned around and came back to the cape, the Air Force said, terminating the round-trip flight highly successful.

The sleek, 69-foot rocket dropped smoothly onto the cape landing strip 4½ hours after it was launched. Special skids and a parachute that popped from the tail eased the missile's landing.

This particular missile successfully made the trip on two previous launches this year. On each recovery, crewmen prepared it for a repeat performance.

Earlier rockets dropped dummy warheads on target near Ascension Island, 5,000 miles away. These rockets were not designed for recovery as is the Snark.

The Snark, which cruises at a comparatively slow 600 miles an hour, can zig-zag and dodge in flight to elude enemy defenses. The missile has an inertial guidance system which steers it and checks its accuracy by the stars.

FLOODS HIT ITALY

BOLZANO, Italy (UPI)—Torrential rains swept this area Monday, triggering landslides, washing away bridges, and taking the lives of at least two Italian Alpine soldiers. The Brenner Pass highway between Italy and Austria was closed by landslides and residents of several mountain villages were forced to flee their homes until flooded streams returned to their banks.

Safety Group Issues Plea

SALEM—Thousands of Oregonians and out-of-state guests are expected on the state's highways over the Fourth of July.

This means that all the safe-driving skills available to motorists will have to be brought into play to keep the weekend free of a tragic record of accidents, injuries and deaths.

The Oregon Traffic Safety Commission said that last year Oregon recorded 399 traffic accidents during the 78 hour holiday period. These accidents resulted in 127 injuries and one death. This year, the holiday extends over 54 hours.

The commission had a special word of caution for motorists who may be pulling boats or house trailers this weekend: check occasionally to see if you may be stacking-up traffic behind you. If a long line of traffic is forming, the commission suggests you pull off the road and let faster moving traffic pass.

Soft Drink Firm Burglary Probed

Klamath Falls police officers are investigating an attempted burglary at the Coca Cola Bottling Company plant, 105 North Spring Street, that occurred Wednesday night.

Police said nothing was missing. Thieves broke the dial on a safe in an unsuccessful bid for entry.

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Satch Dines At Bistro

ROME (UPI) — "Ambassador Satch" had cocktails with the ambassador Wednesday night and then went out on the town, growling his way through a Roman nightspot until almost three this morning.

For a man who was stricken just 10 days ago with what doctors described as virus pneumonia, jazz-king Louis (Satchmo) Armstrong showed a constitution as solid as any high note on his golden trumpet.

It was after midnight when he arrived at Bricktop's, a nightspot on Rome's glittering Via Veneto, from a cocktail party at the villa of U.S. Ambassador James D. Zellerbach.

It was just 10 minutes before three in the morning when he climbed out of the basement club, after having run through two veils and kept up a gravel-voiced exchange with his wife, his doctor, nurse and valet and a handful of local belles.

It was less than a week ago that Armstrong suffered what doctors called the second "crisis" of an attack of virus pneumonia in a hospital in the hilltown of Spoleto about two hours drive from Rome. He was first reported stricken June 23.

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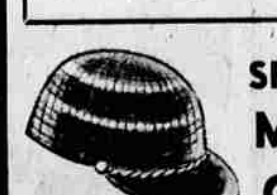


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
