

Ninth Frame Homer Beats Portlanders

Grob got into trouble in the second inning when Bob DiPietro put Portland in front 1-0 with a homer over the left field wall.

The Indians tied the score in the fourth inning. Chuck Essegian doubled and scored on a triple by Fran Howard.

Grob gave up five hits and Gorman eight.
