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New York Newspapers Report That Nikita Adopted Tough View

NEW YORK (AP) — Two New York newspapers report that Soviet Premier Nikita S. Khrushchev, in his interview with former New York Gov. Averell Harriman, adopted a very tough line in discussing the Berlin crisis.

The New York Times, in a Washington dispatch by Harry Schwartz, quotes an "informed source" as saying: "Khrushchev was very rough in his talks with Harriman."

"Khrushchev indicated he is determined to get us out of Berlin and apparently thinks he can do so because he judges that the world balance of power has shifted in his favor."

The New York Herald Tribune, in a copyrighted Washington story by Joseph Alsop, said of the interviews, held a week ago Tuesday at Khrushchev's office and country villa: "The crude threats that

the Soviet leader indulged in, the brutal tone and unprintable language that he employed are considered to mark a new phase in the world situation."

"The fact that Khrushchev was really speaking, not to former Gov. Harriman, but through him to President Eisenhower, was made abundantly clear."

"At one point, when the Soviet leader was emphasizing his readiness to use military force to get his way at Berlin, he told Harriman: 'You must tell your President what I have said.'"

"Harriman replied that he was traveling as a private person, with

no right to receive messages for the President."

"Well then," said Khrushchev, "I will tell him."

The Herald Tribune said Harriman did send an account of the interviews through the Moscow embassy to Washington, but requested that "this account be held closely for the time being."

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
