

Brazilian Classic Winner

WIMBLEDON, England (AP)—Maria Bueno of Brazil broke the United States' 21-year hold on the women's singles title by beating Darlene Hard for the Wimbledon championships Saturday 6-4, 6-3.

Miss Bueno, 19, daughter of a Sao Paulo veterinarian, completed a South American sweep of these coveted singles titles. Alex Olmedo of Peru won the men's crown Friday, beating Rod Laver of Australia in the finals.

A South American never had won either of the titles before.

Miss Bueno started shaky, losing her service on the first game, but she recovered her poise quickly.

Hitting her ground shots deep and sharply placed, the Brazilian girl discouraged Miss Hard's net-rushing tactics from the beginning. At times the usually daring Californian elected to stay in back court and try to outstay her rival.

Miss Hard from Montebello, Calif., is a student at Pomona junior college. This marked the second time she had gone to the Wimbledon final only to lose. In 1957 she was beaten by Althea Gibson, winner of the crown the last two years. Miss Gibson took a brief leave from competition this year and attended the tournament as spectator and writer.

Miss Hard was seeded fourth in the tournament and Miss Bueno sixth. But the Brazilian girl had been made a favorite in the final because of her impressive semifinal victory over another American, Sally Moore of Bakersfield, Calif.

'Old Ezzard' TKO Victor

CINCINNATI (AP)—Ezzard Charles, on the basis of what he showed here Friday night in his seventh-round technical knockout of a lumbering 261-pound policeman, has a long way to go to approach the form he showed as a heavyweight champion.

After the second round, Charles, who started slowly, pounded Dave Ashley, a cop in nearby Lockland, steadily around his big, fat stomach and finally wore him down. The 1950-51 champion, however, did not show any speed, any punch or the fine reflexes he once had.

In fact, when the 6-foot-6 Ashley rushed him, he seemed confused and spread his legs and lunged into clinches.

Charles, 37, said after the scheduled 10-rounder, he did not believe he had warmed up enough before entering the ring and that was the reason he started so slowly.

In fact, the 34-year-old policeman had the better of the first two rounds. Then the former champion began to step around on the balls of his feet and take charge.

Len Matthews Nabs Decision

ATLANTIC CITY, N.J. (AP)—Lightweight Lenny Matthews joined the thousands of other holiday visitors for a relaxing Fourth of July holiday at this seashore resort Saturday with happy thoughts of an August television fight date in Madison Square Garden.

This came about after the unranked Philadelphia took a 10-round decision from Johnny Gonzales of Oakland, Calif., Friday night and showed he is more than just a fighter in the "promising" stage.

At least, promoter Teddy Brenner of the Garden thought so when he told Matthews' manager, Tony Graziano, that he would try to line up Art Scanzoni or Paulie Aronstad for an Aug. 21 date in New York.

A 5-3-2 decision by Referee Joe Morrison gave Matthews the victory. The referee is the sole judge under New Jersey rules.

Gonzales was an #5 underdog despite his No. 4 ranking by Ring magazine.

Matthews weighed 134½ to Gonzales 136½.

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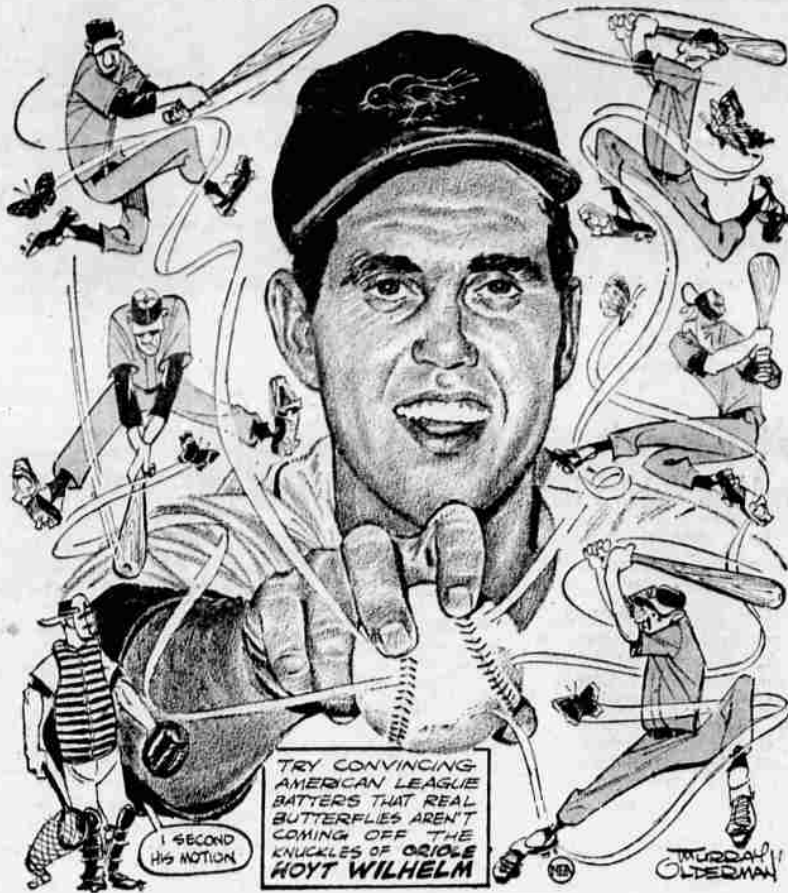

Winless George Witt lost his sixth, although he had a four-hit shutout until Mathews tagged him in the sixth.

Giants 4, Cubs 0

Antonelli, headed for Tuesday's all-star game, became the leading winner among starting pitchers in the majors with a 12-4 record. He walked one, struck out five while beating the Cubs a third time. Willie Kirkland hit his 14th home run in the first, off loser Dave Hillman (3-7), and Orlando Cepeda socked his 17th, against reliever Bill Henry.

Cards 3, Dodgers 2

Bridges (2-0), who walked two and struck out nine, needed Lindy McDaniel's perfect relief for the last two outs after the Dodgers scored in the ninth on doubles by Junior Gilliam and Gil Hodges, a single by Charlie Neal and Don Demeter's sacrifice fly. Sandy Koufax (5-2), another lefty, was the loser, although giving up just two hits and striking out seven in seven innings. A walk and Bill White's double gave the Cards a run in the first, and they put it away against reliever Clem Labine in the eighth on a two-run single by ex-Dodger Gino Cimoli.

Cincy 6, Phils 1

The Reds made it with three unearned runs in the seventh after being blanked on three hits by Jim Owens (4-7), who fanned eight. Ed Bailey added a two-run homer in the eighth and Brooks Lawrence came through with three innings of perfect relief. O'Toole (1-2), lifted for a pinch-hitter, gave up just five hits. The Phils scored in the first on an error and Wally Post's single.

Sol Hemus Benched For Time

ST. LOUIS (UPI)—Solly Hemus, St. Louis Cardinal manager, Saturday laid battle plans for a hearing into his suspension and \$250 fine.

Hemus and coach Harry Walker, who were ejected from Thursday night's game against the Los Angeles Dodgers, will appear at a hearing Monday in Pittsburgh. Walker was suspended two days and fined \$100.

The two will be backed at the hearing by Cardinal general manager Bing Devine and vice president Dick Meyer. Umpire Shag Crawford, center of the dispute and chief umpire Al Barlick also are scheduled to attend.

Hemus and Walker were benched in the seventh inning after they protested a call by Crawford.

Crawford, who was working first base, called Gene Oliver out after he tipped a ball which was caught by catcher John Roseboro. Hemus said the ball had "bounced eight or 10 inches in front of the plate" before Roseboro caught it and he stormed at both Crawford and plate umpire Bill Gump.

Hemus was ejected and when Walker started to protest he also was ejected.

Then an angered fan, 25-year-old John Watts, jumped from a box onto the playing field and slugged Jackowski. The two had to be pulled apart by players and police later took Watts to the station, booked him on charges of peace disturbance and later released him on \$500 bond.

The Cards lost the game 4-0.

National League President Warren Giles said in a telegram to Cardinal officials that Hemus was suspended for his conduct on the field, his language after his ejection and repeated bodily contact with Crawford.

"Crawford is an alibi umpire," Hemus said. "He throws guys out of ball games to cover up his mistakes. If he accuses me of bodily contact, I'll have to call him a liar."

In the meantime, the peppery Redbird manager will have to remain away from the dugout. Third base coach Johnny Keane will be acting manager during Hemus' suspension.

Baltimore Sitting Pretty

Billy O'Dell's back in business and the Baltimore Orioles are sitting pretty again in that game of musical chairs for third place in the American League race.

The young left-hander, who had a tough time getting started this season, pitched the Birds back to third with 6 1-3 innings of one-hit, shutout relief Friday night for a 6-1 victory over Boston.

The last place Red Sox, directed by Coach Rudy York while waiting for Billy Jurgens to officially take over Saturday for fired Manager Mike Higgins, managed only two hits while losing their sixth in a row. They got their first, a single by Marty Keough, off starter Jack Fisher, who forced in a third-inning run with his fourth walk.

The victory kept the Birds with 2½ games of first-place Cleveland and ended a one-day stay in third by the Detroit Tigers, who had succeeded New York Thursday.

The Indians beat Kansas City 8-4 behind Herb Score's 14 strikeouts and retained a one-game edge over the Chicago White Sox, who beat the Tigers 6-5 in 10 innings. The Yankees regained fourth place, a percentage point ahead of Detroit, by beating Washington 4-0, by Ryne Duren's perfect, six-strikeout relief job over the last three frames.

Birds 6, Red Sox 1

The Orioles chased late mate Jack Harshman (2-8) in a five-run first inning when Walt Dropo exploded a three-run double. They added another run in the second, then coasted in after O'Dell took charge following Fisher's walk to Ted Williams.

Chicago 6, Detroit 5

Score (9-5) gave up a grand slam home run by Bob Cerv in the first inning, but finished with a five-hit, while matching Chicago's Early Wynn for the nine-inning strikeout high in the AL this season. The Indians staked Score to five runs in the top of the first, two on Jim Baxes' homer. Howard Reed (0-2) lost it.

Indians 8, KC 4

Al Smith's home run finally broke it up for White Sox after Red Wilson's homer had tied it 3-all for the Tigers in the bottom of the ninth. Both clubs twice blew leads. Gus Zernial hit a three-run homer in the sixth that gave Detroit a 4-3 edge and chased Wynn. Then lumbering Sherm Lollar, who earlier had homered, scored all the way from first on Earl Torgeson's wild-bouncing double in the eighth for a 5-4 Chicago lead against Jim Bunning. Turk Lown (4-2) was the winner, with Tom Morgan (1-2) taking the loss.

Yanks 4, Nats 3

Tony Kubek's two-out single broke a 3-3 tie for the Yankees in the sixth against loser Russ Kemmerer (5-7) and Duren then went to work to save it for Whitey Ford (8-5). The fireballing reliever now has a string of 28 shutout innings—longest this season in the majors. He also has fanned 15 of the last 19 men he has faced and has whiffed 21 in his last 10 innings.

Crazy Race Scheduled In London

LONDON (AP)—Anything that moves on wheels, wings or water is eligible for the craziest race of the year. The course runs from Marble Arch, London to the Arc de Triomphe, Paris. Either direction will do. But you mustn't get picked up for speeding.

When the entries closed 163 men, women and children had signed up. Most of them are from Britain but there are 25 from France, 3 from Holland and 1 each from Belgium and America.

The idea is to commemorate the 50th anniversary of Frenchman Louis Bleriot's pioneer cross-channel flight. The London Daily Mail which sponsored the Frenchman's flight is offering a total of 10,000 pounds - \$28,000—in prizes with 5,000 - \$14,000 - to the winner.

Competitors plan to use all types of aircraft including the latest jet. There even is a replica of Bleriot's craft. In the cities they plan to use helicopters, cycles, scooters, racing cars, motorcycles and even roller skates. To say nothing of taxis, buses, subways and railroad trains.

Among the contestants are auto racers Stirling Moss of Britain and Maurice Trintignant of France.

The winner will be the one who does the fastest time between the two points without getting booked for breaking any traffic laws. The entries can run the course between 8 a.m. and 9 p.m. on any of 11 days, starting July 13.

Nobody is going to try to swim it.
