Union, Firm Slate Meet

YREKA — An announcement was released Wednesday by representatives of union and management, stating that a meeting will be held Monday, July 6, in Yreka, by representatives of the Northern California District Council of Lumber and Sawmill Workers, AFL-CIO, and the J. F. Sharp Lumber Company, in an effort to reach a contract settlement for 1959.

According to N. H. Blankenship, Weed, business agent for Local 2907 of the union, an offer will be made by the union to Sharp's of a 20 1/2 cent wage increase package under a two-year contract which will include participation in a district-wide health and welfare program, or a 25-cent across the board increase to be in effect for one year.

The 475 union-represented employees of Collins Pine Co., struck last week on the welfare plan issue, and last year the Sharp operation closed down in a strike on the welfare fund issue.

According to a statement by Chet Irving, executive vice president of the employer representative of Pine Industrial Relations Council, the Sharp contract can only be reopened on wages under terms of last year's agreement, unless both sides agree to consider other issues.

According to both representatives the Collins Pine, Plumas County, is the only lumber operation on strike in the West, and it was also stated that Collins, Sharp and several smaller mills are as yet unsigned for 1959. An industry wide pattern calls for the 20 1/2 cent package, which includes the welfare trust.

led tramp of many moccasined feet in the snow reverberated. It was the war spirit of the Klamaths fluctuating, now rising, now falling, only to come to the surface again as some renegade Modoc harangued them into joining the Modocs against the Bostons.

At the fort, Captain Kelley had been left in command, while his superior officer braved the battlefields of the Modocs in the Lava Beds. He sensed the danger of an outbreak among the Klamaths, for he too heard the beat of drums and the weird wail of the war chant from only one mile away.

He knew that the Indian village held three times as many bucks as he had soldiers. He had the safety of the arms, ammunition and the families of the officers in his hands, and he himself was young, with a wife and babe at the mercy of these savage people.

His wife had found a very warm spot in the hearts of several of the tribe. She had at times gone to the rancherie and nursed babies back to life that were dying of measles. She taught the Indian women to sew, gave them needles, taught them to embroider and to dye their porcupine quills, tree roots and grasses for baskets.

Mrs. Kelley was deeply respected by one woman in particular, Molly LaLakes, who was an Indian princess in her tribe. She had prestige and the characteristics one might find in royal blood. She was ambitious and industrious and wanted to learn all the ways of the white man, so she went to work for the officers' wives.

asking themselves if the white man intended to drive them out, use all their grass, kill all their game and leave them nomads. Even with his understanding the captain felt he must keep a firm hand, for the simple minds of the natives were like gunpowder but waiting for the flash to ignite it, thus casting the Indians into a war they felt justified in waging to hold what was their own, even though they had agreed to accept the treaty terms.

And though the Klamaths had quarreled with it Modocs at times, they were apt to join them against the soldier—a common foe.

Again loud, discordant drums sounded most of one night. The braves painted themselves and danced the war dance, defiantly.

But then, into that fire circle stepped a great man, Allen David, the chief, who said, "You can kill the soldier man; you can join the Modocs and kill the Boston. You can kill him this time as easy as the water flows, but more soldier man will come. He is like the blades of grass, the leaves of the trees, more will come and kill us all. I say, no war! I have been to the white man's settlements, I know."

The drum beat ceased, the fire smoldered to dead ashes, the tribe was held in check — for a time.

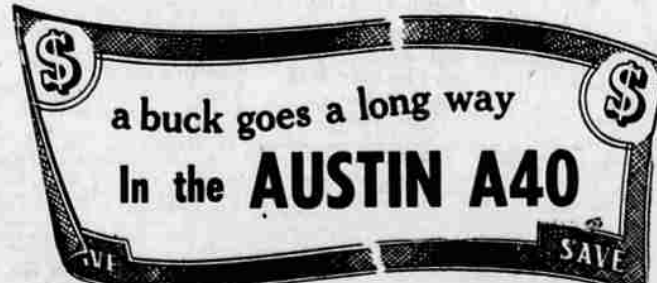
