WV Coach Rejects U Of W Job Offer

MORGANTOWN, W. VA. (AP)—Fred Schaus, West Virginia University basketball coach, Saturday rejected an offer to become head coach at the University of Washington. Schaus said he has decided to stay on at West Virginia "now and I hope for many years to come." The 34-year-old coach had been considering the Washington offer since visiting Seattle last week. The Seattle Times said it was told by Schaus he felt a moral obligation to remain at West Virginia to avoid breaking faith with the boys whom he recruited for the Mountaineers. Schaus was the second big-name coach to decline an offer to replace Tippy Dye as head coach at Washington. California's Pete Newell turned down the chance June 23. In Seattle, Washington Athletic Director George Briggs expressed disappointment at Schaus' decision but said he "was only one of several leading coaches being considered." "I feel the vacancy will be filled within a week." Newell and Schaus had the 1-2 collegiate teams in the nation last season. The California Bears won the NCAA championship with a 71-70 victory over Schaus' West Virginia Mountaineers. The Washington basketball coaching job has been vacant since Dye resigned June 8 to become athletic director at the University of Wichita.

Solons Boost League Lead With Victory

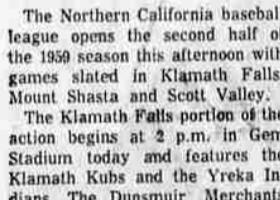

Grelle, Long Upset Champions In AAU Track Meet At Eugene

EUGENE, Ore. (AP)—Miler Jim Grelle of Oregon and shot-putter Dallas Long of Southern California upset the national AAU champions here Saturday in the Oregon AAU track meet. Long, a USC freshman, beat world record-holder Parry O'Brien, Los Angeles, for only the second time with a toss of 62 feet, 5 1/2 inches. Grelle, the NCAA champion and AAU runnerup in the metric mile, whipped Oregon freshman and AAU 1,500-meter champion Dyrrol Burleson by five yards in the Oregon mile. Grelle's time was 4:06.7, well off his best mark. O'Brien's best toss for second place was 62 feet, 2 1/2 inches. O'Brien's world record is 63 feet, 2 inches, although Long has done 63 feet, 7 inches. That record was not recognized because it was on his seventh try in a meet. That is one more than allowed. Brazilian Woman Wimbledon Winner

WIMBLEDON, England (AP)—Maria Bueno, a lissome lass from Brazil, broke the United States' 21-year domination of women's tennis Saturday by defeating Darlene Hard of Montebello, Calif., 6-4, 6-3 for the Wimbledon singles title. The 19-year-old Sao Paulo girl served and volleyed at a killing pace while covering the court with the grace of a ballet dancer. Until Saturday Uncle Sam's nieces had paraded in unbroken succession to the throne room since 1937 when the crown was won by Dorothy Round of England. Since World War I there has been an American titleholder 24 times. Miss Bueno's victory made it a Latin American Wimbledon. It came on the heels of Alex Olmedo's triumph Friday in men's singles. Olmedo, a Peruvian now living in Los Angeles, crushed Australia's Rod Laver in straight sets. Never before had a Latin American won a singles championship in this aged tournament. Darlene also paired with Australia's Rod Laver and won the mixed doubles. They defeated Neale Fraser of Australia and Miss Bueno, 6-4, 6-3. Fraser and Roy Emerson won the men's doubles championship in an all-Australian final, defeating Laver and Bob Mark 8-6, 6-3, 14-16, 9-7.
