Ingemar Welcomed Home By Huge Swedish Crowd

GOTEBORG, Sweden (AP)—Ingemar Johansson Saturday night received a roaring welcome as he returned home with the world's heavyweight boxing championship. The crowd of 26,000 just about half-filled Ullevi Stadium, Sweden's largest soccer arena. The Swedish idol was flown in by helicopter directly from the Torstrand Airport north of this shipping port on the Swedish west coast. The handsome, 26-year-old fighter, Sweden's first world boxing champion, had flown from New York Friday night with most members of his family and fiancée Birgit Lundgren. "Boy, I feel great being back home again," he said. "I have enjoyed my trip to the United States and had real fun in Florida. He denied reports that he would become an American citizen. "I like it best at home," he said. "That's why I am here now." The dimpled, brown-haired fighter said that he has received many fabulous offers but had turned most of them down. He said he expected to give Floyd Patterson a return bout, probably in September, and that he planned to fight three or four more years and maybe 10. That's what he said in the U.S. too after he knocked out Patterson in the third round at New York June 26.

Hal Wood's Weekend Short Shots

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI) — Saturday's shorts:

Just 49 years ago today, July 4, 1910, Reno, Nev., was the light capital of the world. On this day Jack Johnson, 32, whipped Jim Jeffries, 35, who had come out of retirement to gain the world's undisputed heavyweight crown. A young feller, name of Tex Rickard, was the referee. . . .

Another famous July 4 fight came in 1919—the day Jack Dempsey made mince-meat out of Jess Willard, to win the title. . . .

Lefty O'Doul, two-time National League batting champion of yesterday, doesn't like baseball scorers any better than unlucky Sam Jones. Sez O'Doul: "In the last game of the 1929 season, I hit a ball to deep short for what looked like a sure hit. We had a man on second who rounded third and started for home. The throw, instead of going to first, went to third and they trapped him en route home. The score keeper ruled it a fielder's choice. It kept me from hitting .400! Instead I wound up with only .398." . . .

Gene Fullmer and Carmen Basilio, who meet for the world middleweight title here Aug. 28, have been boxing the country's top welters and middleweights for a decade — but never have met each other before. On the other hand, they both have fought Sugar Ray Robinson twice, winning one and losing one. . . .

The San Francisco Giants will start printing tickets for their new Candlestick Park Stadium next week—for all home games during the month of September. Doesn't mean, of course, that they'll move into the stadium then. No certainty it will be finished—but they'll be ready, just in case. . . .

The fight game is changing faster than the changing world: Used to be that only fighters and their managers traveled. Today, the promoters travel. Bill Rosensohn, who handled the Patterson-Johansson battle, toured the country for weeks looking for a site. Norman Rothschild, who will promote the Carmen Basilio-Gene Fullmer fight here, did the same thing after giving up on his hometown of Syracuse. . . .

Guess the days of "Crans" and "commissioners" are a thing of the past in the West. Now the State Athletic Commission has an "executive officer" (Jack Uroh), and the Athletic Association of Western Universities has the same title for its boss, Tom Hamilton. . . .

Ernie Nevers, the football immortal from Stanford, doesn't want the younger generation to forget that he was quite some baseball player in his day, too. Ernie was with the old St. Louis Browns for a spell. "I just want to go on the record as being one of the men who helped Babe Ruth hit those 60 home runs that year," says Ernie. "I was pitching for the Browns and he clouted two homers off me." . . .

Regas, last year's Gold Cup winner, pushed Miss Bardahl up with the pack and was washed out on a turn as he duelled with Bill Stead of Reno, Nev., in Maverick, and Don Dunnington, of Washington, D. C., in Nitrogen. . . .

Miss Bardahl's huge Rolls Royce engine quit as it was buried under a wall of water from the other racers and she was through for the day. . . .

Miss Supertest III won the first elimination heat on the wind-whipped Detroit River at an average speed of 99.392 m.p.h. Bill Muncy of Seattle was second in Miss Thriftway and Chuck Thompson of Detroit was third in Miss Detroit. . . .

Miss Bardahl captured the second elimination heat with the help of a record setting 114.8 m.p.h. lap as Regas edged Bill Cantrell, in the Detroit based Gale V and Maverick. Miss Bardahl's winning time was 99.221 m.p.h. Regas also took the fourth elimination heat, beating Miss Supertest by a quarter of a mile with the fastest heat speed of the day at 101.161 m.p.h. This topped Miss Detroit's mark of 100.641 m.p.h. in the third heat. . . .

A 20-mile wind took a toll of the 12 starters. Miss U.S., owned by George Simons of Detroit, sank in the first heat when her supercharger broke loose and tore a hole in the bottom of the \$30,000 racer. . . .

Miss Ro, a syndicate owned boat making her debut, caught fire as the supercharger blew up in the rough qualifying run. . . .

Miss Detroit finished second in the final standings based on points earned in three of the five heats. Maverick was third and Miss Bardahl fourth. . . .

Other finishers in order were: Nitrogen and Fascination, owned by Bob Gilliam of Seattle, tied for fifth; Miss Thriftway, seventh; Gale V, eighth; Gale VI, ninth. Three other entries in the race failed to earn any points. . . .

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Wall, Finsty Share Lead In Tourney

FLINT, Mich. (AP)—Art Wall Jr. and Dow Finsterwald, two of golf's foremost champions, shared the lead Saturday after three rounds of the \$2,000 Flint Open tournament. They had 54-hole totals of 210, six-under-par. . . .

Wall, Masters champion and the game's leading money winner, and Finsterwald, defending PGA titlist, had four stroke leads over Ken Venturi, winner of last week's Chicago Open, and pudgy Lionel Hebert in the race for the \$9,000 first prize money. . . .

There was a difference of only one stroke in the third-round cards of the coleaders. Finsterwald's one-under-par 71 enabling him to deadlock Wall, who led him by one stroke at the halfway mark. . . .

Defending champion Bill Casper, had a 75 and tied with four others at 215, five strokes behind the leaders. Tied with Casper are Julius Boros, Jay Hebert, Pete Cooper and Arnold Palmer. . . .

Jack Nicklaus, 19-year-old Walker Cupper from Columbus, Ohio, was low amateur at 216. Tied with him were Jerry Barber and Ted Kroll. . . .

The field was trimmed to low 60 professionals and the 5 low amateurs for Sunday's final 72 holes. In event of a tie, an 18-hole playoff will be staged Monday. . . .

Jim Wood, 22, of Jackson Hole, Wyoming, scored with his first New York mount this spring, winning with Mighty So, a 3-year-old filly, at Jamaica. . . .

Round Table Sets Record

CHICAGO (AP)—Kerr Stable's Round Table took the lead at the one-sixteenth pole and without even the flick of jockey Willie Shoemaker's whip scooted to an American record in the \$85,000 Stars and Stripes Handicap at Washington Park Saturday. . . .

In scoring a 3 1/4 length victory over the 30-1 shot, Crabgrass Stable's Nouruddin, Round Table traveled the mile and one-eighth over the grass in a light rain in 1:47 1-5. . . .

The clocking was one-fifth of a second under the American grass record for the distance set by Poonia II on Dec. 29, 1954, at Santa Anita. . . .

Round Table, the 1956 Horse of the Year, carried top weight of 132 pounds. . . .

The all-time money winning champion returned \$3.40, \$3 and \$2.00. . . .

Mrs. Herbert Herff's Tudor Era finished third in the field of nine. Round Table added \$54,700 to his bank roll, boosting his all-time high winnings to \$1,452,639. . . .

Added to Friday's 68 and Thursday's 76, it gave her a 213 total. The final 18 holes will be played Sunday. . . .

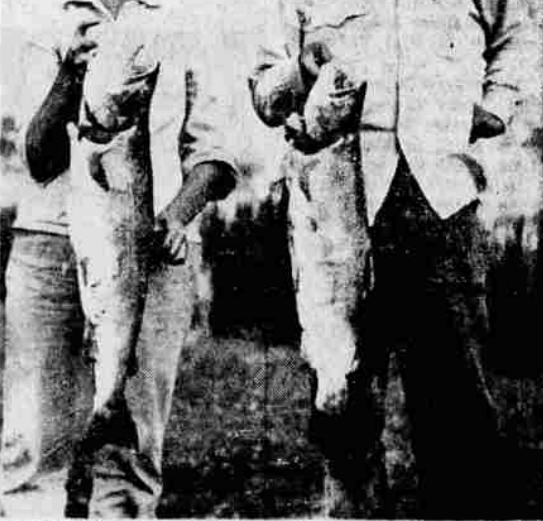
Miss Rawls broke the course record for women Friday and equaled the old mark Saturday. . . .
