By the end of the second week, mom and dad have learned to live with their offspring's literary peculiarities, but . . . last letter sends them winging up to Camp Zumi Nawitana.

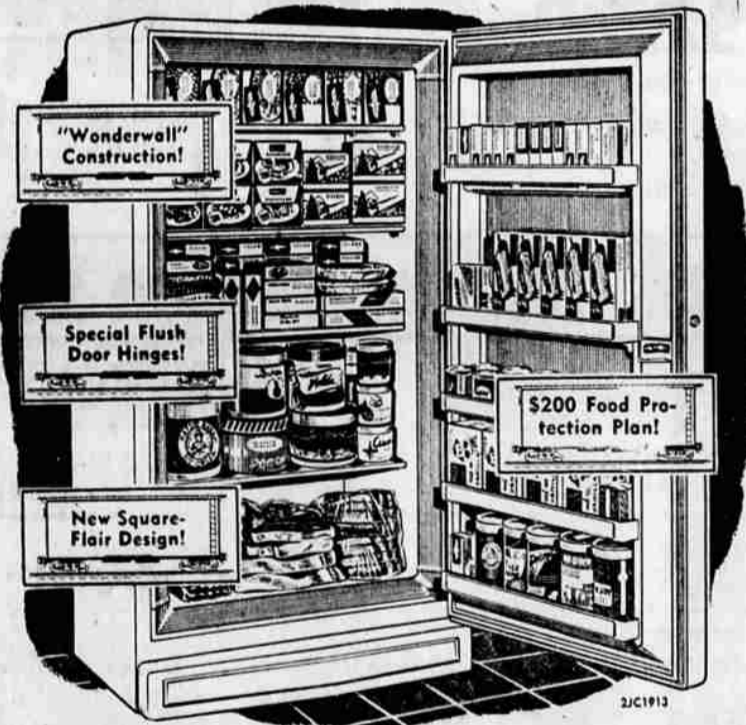
