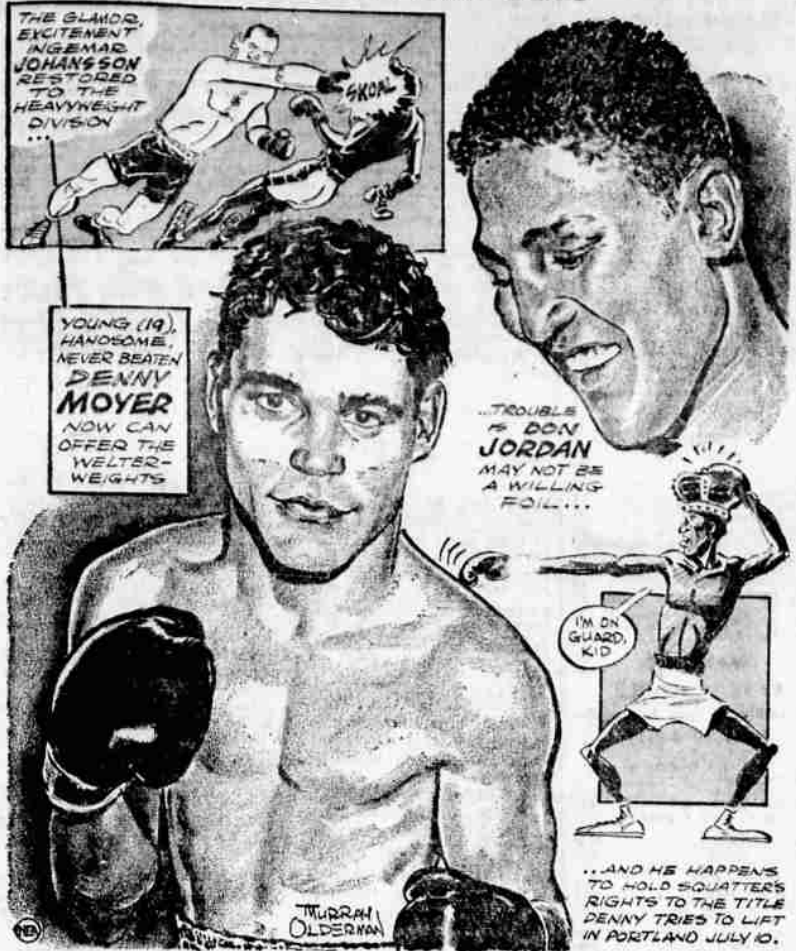

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Chicago Rumored Seeking Durocher

PITTSBURGH (UPI)—Leo Durocher is closer to returning to baseball today than he has been since he left the New York Giants four years ago.

The United Press International has learned that an American League club, quite possibly the Chicago White Sox, has dangled the type offer that could bring "Leo the Lip" back to the game—a high salary as manager and substantial stock in the club.

Durocher confirmed he is seriously considering the offer, which would make him a combination field and general manager.

Durocher was startled when UPI put the question of his return to baseball to him, but he did not evade.

"If the terms are right, there's a strong possibility I'll come back," he replied. "I've had several offers since I've left the Giants but I wouldn't consider any of them unless certain conditions were met. The offer I'm thinking over now comes the closest of any to satisfying me."

Durocher tried to sidestep further questions but finally conceded under the UPI's cross-examination:

"I'm very happy with what I'm doing now. But this proposition is almost too good to turn down. We'll see how it turns out. Could be I'll be back."

Durocher, who'll be 54 years old on July 27, left as manager of the New York Giants just before the end of the 1955 season. He
