

Adlai's Name May Be Used

PORTLAND (AP) — A drive may begin soon to put the name of Adlai Stevenson on the Oregon presidential preference primary ballot next May, The Oregonian says.

In a Sunday story, the newspaper said it had learned that state Rep. Keith Skelton (D-Eugene) will either direct the campaign himself or help get it started.

"Unless I get a positive statement from Stevenson that he would not accept the nomination, I am determined to go ahead with the petition campaign," Skelton was quoted as saying.

Stevenson twice before has been his party's unsuccessful candidate. Several times earlier this year he has shrugged off suggestions that he seek the nomination again.

Lovesick Camel Dies In Miami

MIAMI, Fla. (AP) — Cecil, the "lonesome, lovesick" camel who figured in a fancy zoo "wedding" in 1956, is dead.

Robert Matlin, Crandon Park zoo director, said death resulted from an obstructed intestinal tract. Three years ago The Miami Herald conducted a drive to buy a mate for Cecil.

Cecil and the mate—Cecilia—were joined in widely publicized full-dress nuptials. They had a son, Cequel—since traded to the Havana zoo for a zebra and antelope—and a daughter, Manana.

Saar Returns To Germany

BONN, Germany, (AP) — The fabulously rich Saar land — twice taken away from the Germans after world wars—went back under their complete control at midnight Sunday.

The French and West German governments announced Saturday that the 1,000 miles square territory will be economically integrated with West Germany months ahead of schedule in a gesture of the friendly relations existing between the two countries.

The wealthy industrial valley became politically part of Germany Jan. 1, 1957 but the economic integration was delayed to allow financial adjustments. It was not due to take place until 1960.

Fulfillment of the French-German treaty on the Saarland brings to an end a long period of dispute between the two countries over one of Europe's richest industrial areas.

Twice after world wars the French occupied the region. Twice the million German-speaking Saarlanders voted to go back to Germany.

CHEYENNE, Wyo. (AP) — The highways across Wyoming were as safe as homes and picnic areas during the Fourth of July weekend.

Not a single road fatality was reported by midnight Sunday despite higher speed limits this year.

The state's 71 highway patrolmen, including 15 added by the recent state legislature, skipped vacations and leaves for the weekend. They were aided by clear, dry weather.
