Mrs. Cheyne received her honor for her work in the culture of gladioli in particular, and for her support and interest in gardening and garden clubs in general. She is a member of the Mt. Laki Garden Club, an accredited amateur national flower show judge, and has taken the first course in Landscape Design School in Berkeley.
