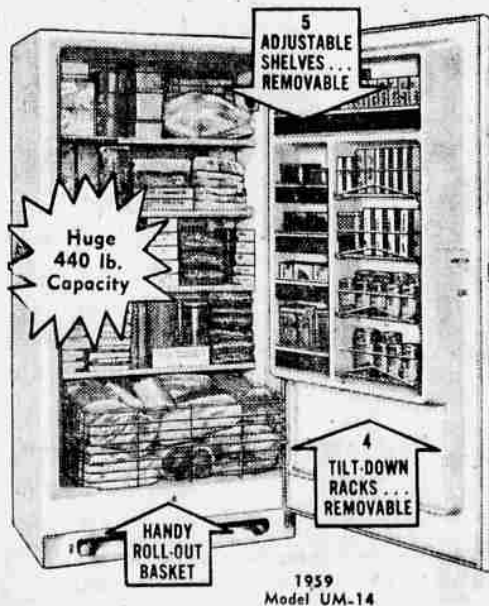
Refreshments were served by past matrons and friends from a white table centered with an arrangement of red roses and a decorated cake.

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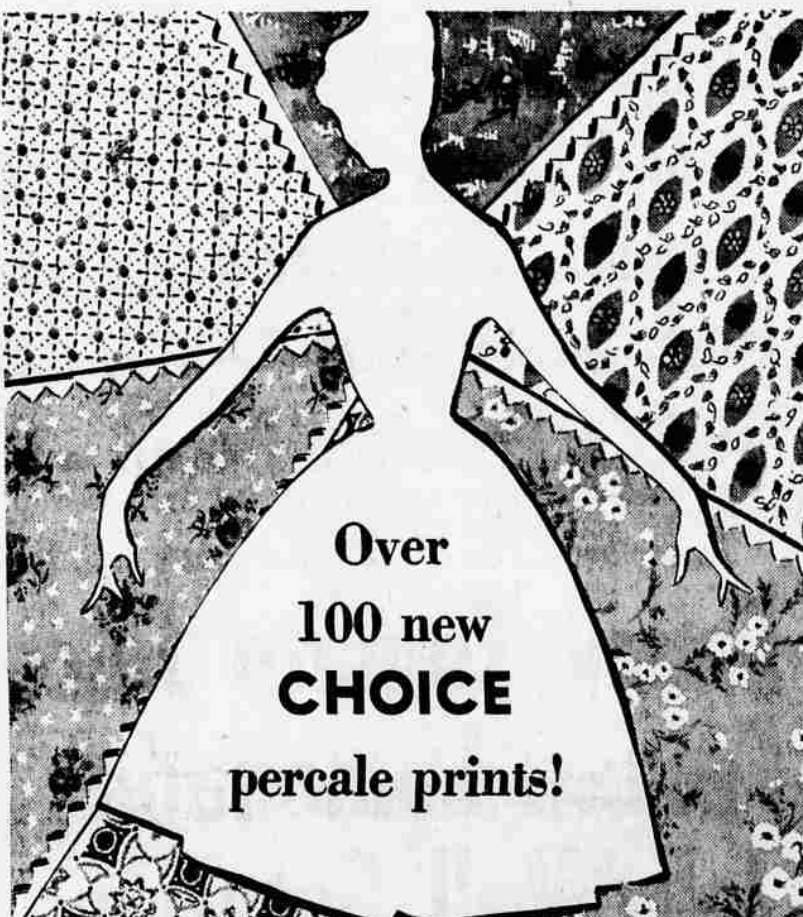
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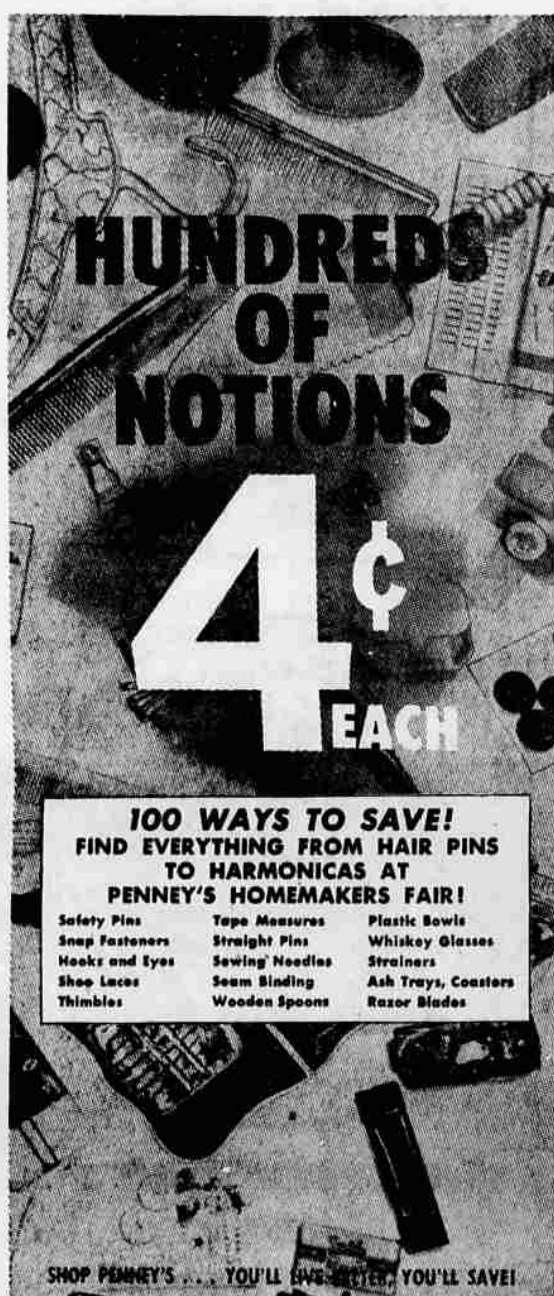
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
