First Federal Gives Report

Substantial and healthy progress is reflected in the 50th semiannual financial statement of the First Federal Savings and Loan Association. George McIntyre, president, in releasing the figures today of the growth for the past year commented that it had been one of

the best years in the association's history.

The assets of the association increased over \$2,072,058 from June 30, 1958 to June 30, 1959 and now total \$19,599,595.44. Savings increase for the same period totaled \$1,764,876. The demand for home loans continued strong during the year and first mortgage loans increased \$1,795,995. For the added protection of its savers, \$215,439 has been added to the reserve accounts.

During the past six months the offices of the First Federal have been completely remodeled, and modernized. Upon final completion an invitation will be extended for a visit to its enlarged quarters. McIntyre stated that the date would be announced shortly.

"With the continued economic growth of the Klamath Basin, the year ahead looks most promising," McIntyre said. "First Federal Savings will continue to encourage thrift and the development of home ownership."

Plan Tells Board Policy

PHILADELPHIA (AP)—An official policy barring racial discrimination has been adopted unanimously by the Philadelphia Board of Education.

The policy statement was drafted by E. Washington Rhodes, the only Negro member of the 15-man board, and presented for action Wednesday.

Negro groups long have sought a written statement on the board's racial policy. They have charged that 55 city schools are all white while 19 have entirely Negro student bodies. There are 245 public schools in the city.

The statement pledges that the board will not discriminate in the instruction and placement of students, or in the assignment and promotion of teachers.

Ex-Beauty Queen Serving Time

LITTLETON, Colo. (AP)—A former beauty queen who admitted she held up a drug store must serve an indefinite term in the Denver County jail.

She is Dixie Ann Gottfried, 19. Both the defense and prosecuting attorneys had asked that Mrs. Gottfried, Miss Colorado Jaycee last summer, be given probation.

But Dist. Judge H. H. Harrison denied probation, saying Mrs. Gottfried had "chosen to associate with police characters and partake in a serious crime."

GOP Cheers, Demos Mad At Ike Aversion To Veto

WASHINGTON (AP)—Republicans cheered and Democrats grumbled today at President Eisenhower's evident determination to keep using the veto to hold down government spending.

Sen. Barry Goldwater of Arizona, chairman of the Republican Senatorial Campaign Committee, said that if Eisenhower continues to veto such measures as the housing bill "his record will be our greatest asset in 1960."

Sen. Mike Mansfield of Montana, the Assistant Democratic Leader, said in a separate interview that "the President has the real vote to sustain his vetoes, while we have only the theoretical vote to override them."

It requires two-thirds of those voting in both houses to enact bills into law over the President's rejection. Despite their overwhelming Senate and House majorities—they have almost two-thirds of the total membership—Democrats have never been able to hold their lines enough to override.

Because of this, Mansfield conceded that the division of opinion among Democrats has made it necessary for his party to trim legislative programs to a point near Eisenhower's specifications in order to get any bills enacted into law.

Eisenhower told his news conference Wednesday he doesn't use his veto power lightly, and disclaimed any intention of gaining political advantage through its use.

"What I'm trying to do," he

said, "is to get legislation passed that will benefit the United States and keep us solvent at the same time."

Mansfield said he has no fear that National Chairman Paul M. Butler's criticisms of the party leaders' programs in Congress will affect the voting result materially in next year's elections.

Butler said the Democratic chieftains of both houses look "less and less like the majority leadership in Congress."

"If we weren't fighting among ourselves we wouldn't be Democrats," Mansfield said with a grin.

With an even wider smile, Goldwater said he hopes the opposition keeps it up.

"I would be glad to pay Paul Butler's salary," Goldwater said. "He is the best thing that has happened to the Republican party in 30 years."

Goldwater added that a recent national survey by his committee indicates that Eisenhower's stand on the spending issue, combined with the President's firm position in the Berlin crisis, "has helped the Republican party more than anything he has done in the last six years."

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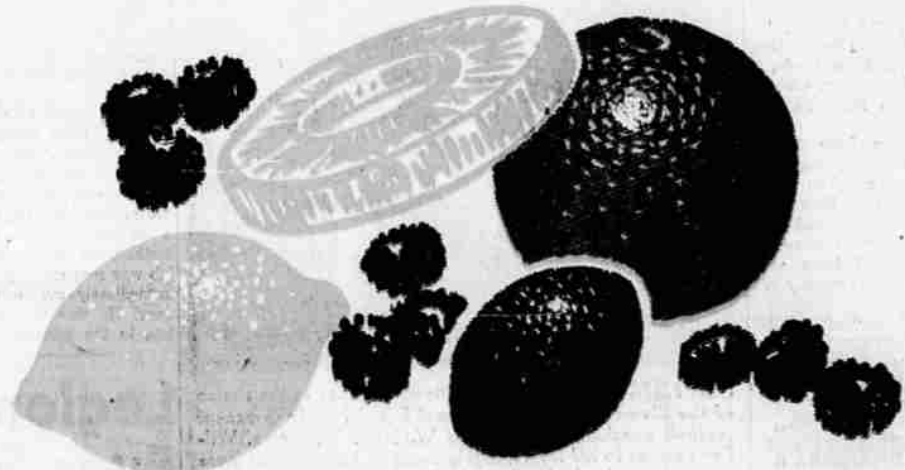
