

Klamath Union Announces Grid Boss

The announcement late Thursday by Klamath Union High Athletic Director Jim Johnson of the appointment of Robert H. Williams, 36, of Lewiston, Idaho, to the position of head football and assistant baseball coach filled one of the vacancies existing on the KU athletic staff. The only gap remaining is the head baseball job.

Williams, who will also serve as a head teacher in addition to his coaching chores, fills the spot vacated by Andy Knudsen who resigned to accept a similar post at St. Helens.

The new football mentor comes to Klamath Union fresh from a highly successful six-year stint (1952-58) as football and baseball coach at Lewiston High. During his stay Williams-coached football teams collected five league championships, three mythical state championships and a runner-up spot.

Williams, 6-1, 215 pounds, his wife, Helen, and five youngsters, Bob, 11, Patty, 9, Anne Marie, 5, Brenda, 4, and Janet, 2, plan to move to Klamath Falls as soon as is practical.

Recommendations from former teaching and coaching posts include such comments as "successful from the start both as a classroom teacher, coach and leader," "finest football coach and classroom teacher I have ever known" and others equally as praising.

A former member of the St.

Louis Cardinals, Boston Red Sox, Sacramento Solons and Lewiston Oroons. Williams has a nine year background in professional baseball.

He started his baseball career after being voted the "Most Outstanding Freshman Football player" at the University of Idaho in 1941. A recruiting restriction slapped on the U of I at that time precluded more football for Williams.

After serving in the Navy from 1942 to 1946 under "Spec" Keene in the Naval Physical Fitness program, Williams returned to school at Idaho State College and stayed one year. He attended Northern Idaho College of Education two terms yearly from 1947-50 and served as assistant football coach until ultimately earning his B.S. degree in secondary education.

Continuing his education while coaching and teaching, Williams received his masters of science in education from University of Idaho through summer school from 1951-58.

Questioned concerning his football teaching style Williams uses "variations on the T."

Johnson, upon hearing of Williams' acceptance of the job, said, "I feel that we are very fortunate in being able to secure the services of a man so well qualified both on the field and in the classroom at this late date. Bob will help very much our teaching problems and I am looking forward with great expectancy to our football season."

Williams' acceptance of the job was heard by long-distance telephone call to Lewiston, after the School Board held a special meeting at noon in the KU cafeteria.

His original request was for both the head football and head baseball jobs. The request created problems that delayed the board's immediate acceptance of his application. After deliberation a counter-proposal granting the football job and assistant baseball job was reached. Williams was not immediately available for his answer. He was ultimately reached late in the afternoon.

The Klamath Kubs take to the road this weekend for a Northern California League baseball test with the Weed Sons filled with misgivings.

Faced not only with the prospect of meeting a tough ball-club the squad also may be facing disbandment immediately following the game.

Problems in the way of the Kubs continue include lack of attendance at home games, lack of funds, a shortage of jobs for some collegiate players on the team and the interference of regular jobs with other players' chances to show up at games.

Said Manager Irv Whit, "in view of all these factors we may very well have to drop out of the action. In this league you need a full roster of good ballplayers if you hope to win games. We have the players, if we can just keep them."

He added, "I think we can continue if we can just find jobs for Bob Lavery and Mike Dolan. (Both are pitchers and Dolan is the club's top hitter). They're both eager kids and they will work hard—they need any kind of work for just a couple of months. Of course, they have to go back to school in the fall. If anyone can use them in any way, please have them call me at TU 4-7428."

"It would be a shame to have to quit now—there are lots of Little Leaguers, Babe Ruthers and American Legion boys coming along. They should have a place to continue. The Kubs provide that place," he concluded.

Whit declined to name his starting lineup for the Weed test, on the grounds that "we don't know yet who will be there."

Among the missing are outfielder Ruben Johnson, whose state police job precludes him from making the trip, Ron Owens, out with an injured hand, Butch Dollar, who left because of the lack of work and others.

Cal Bowmen Start Hunts

SACRAMENTO (UPI) — California's 25,000 bow and arrow hunters begin the first of two 10-day archery hunting seasons for deer Saturday.

Only a month ago the season was eliminated by the Fish and Game Commission. It later was restored by the Legislature.

The archers' kill won't be noticeable among the million or more in the state. Last year they bagged 251 bucks.

In May, the commission on motion of Henry G. Clineschmidt, Redding, wiped out the two archery seasons which preceded the inland and coastal seasons in the state.

Clineschmidt said he did not approve of special privilege seasons for the bowmen. He apparently was striking in particular at the fact that the bowmen get a total of 20 extra days to hunt with archery sets and then can join rifle hunters during the regular seasons.

The rifle season for the 21 county early season opens July 25, the earliest regular deer season in the nation. It ends Sept. 13. The inland season opens Sept. 26 and closes Nov. 1.

Bevos Edge Seattle Skins, Mounts Argue

The Portland Beavers of the Pacific Coast League are only 4½ games behind first-place Sacramento today after the Beavers' 3-1 victory over Seattle Thursday night.

The Beavers move to Vancouver, B. C., from Seattle tonight for a four-game series with the Mounties.

Portland got two runs in the first inning Thursday night. Milt Graff led off with a single. Bob DiPietro grounded to first and Russ Snyder doubled. George Freese grounded to third and Jim Greengrass also hit a grounder to third. Charlie Secest singled Snyder home with the second run of the inning.

Clarence Moore doubled home Portland's third run in the seventh.

Tom Gorman pitched the first seven innings for Portland. He suffered a strained back and was relieved by Glenn McMinn in the eighth.

Meanwhile, the first place Solons are making it look easy to stay atop the standings.

Apparently content to keep a two-game cushion between themselves and the rest of the pack, the Solons have been coasting along in a manner which suggests they play to win only when they have to, to keep that two-game margin intact.

Wednesday night the Vancouver Mounties lost their game with Spokane. The Solons dropped their contest with San Diego.

Thursday night the Mounties trimmed Spokane's Indians 7-5. The Solons got busy and turned back the Pads 4-3 in 11 innings.

In other action, the Portland Beavers edged the Seattle Rainiers 3-1 and the Phoenix Giants banged out 14 hits in smothering the Salt Lake City Bees 12-6.

Sacramento's winning run was scored by Mike Krsnich, who raced in from second on Bob Perry's single. Clay Dalrymple had sent the game into extra innings with his 10th homer of the year for Sacramento in the last of the ninth. Perry also had a homer

and another single to go with his game-winning hit.

Both Vancouver and Spokane entered protests in their donnybrook, a 22-hit affair. The Indians played under protest after a seventh-inning hassle which erupted when Ray Barker of the Mounties raced home while Spokane pitcher Phil Paine was arguing the call on a pitch with plate umpire Earl Lemmon.

Spokane manager Bobby Bragan and starting pitcher Chuck Churn had been ejected earlier in the inning for protesting another Lemmon call too vociferously.

Norm Sherry homered for the Indians and Joe Durham hit a four play for the Mounties.

Singles by Milt Graff and Charlie Secest and Russ Snyder's double gave the Beavers two runs in the first inning and they picked up their third in the seventh on doubles by Secest and Clam Moore. Tom Gorman and Glenn McMinn, who relieved Gorman in the eighth after a back muscle started to bother Gorman, held the Rainiers to eight hits.

Joe Pagan picked up two runs for the Giants in the fourth when he stroked his 16th homer of the year out of the park at Salt Lake City. Chuck Harmon got a two-run homer for the Bees. Marcellino Solis, who weakened and had to have help from Joe Shipley in the ninth when the Bees got three runs, took the victory, his sixth in nine decisions.

Legion 9 Eyes Slim Title Hope

The Klamath Falls American Legion baseball team, with only a thin chance remaining for a shot at the 1959 district title, heads for Grants Pass Sunday for a twin-bill with the GP nine. The first game counts in league standings.

It's an absolute must that the KF club win both this Sunday's test against the relatively weak Grants Passers and that must be followed by a victory the following Sunday over the strong Central Point Cheney Studs. The Central Point hassle will be played in Gem Stadium.

The local nine, currently in second place behind Medford and Central Point who are deadlocked for first place in the league, still have a mathematical chance to nab the title.

Coach Hi Hatfield's squad held first place until two weeks ago when a pair of losses were dealt Hatfield's crew by Medford and Central Point. The twin defeats shoved the KF nine into the second spot which they are now commanding.

In their last showing against the GP squad, Hatfield's squad scored an easy 24-4 victory, blasting four Grants Pass pitchers for a total of 19 base outs.

Stocky Blake Griggs, who is leading the local Legionnaires both on the mound and at the plate, will probably draw the starting nod against GP while the possible starter for the second contest will be John Webb. Griggs has compiled a five win three loss record this season while stroking the ball at a .412 clip.

Other Legion players who are hitting the ball at 300 or better are relief pitcher Gary Behrer (.400), catcher Dave Saks (.385) and utility man Don Willey (.340).

SF Giants Take Command; Shutouts Feature AL Play

Maybe you remember Roger Craig, the big right-hander who made his rookie debut with Don Bessent in mid-1955 and gave the Dodgers a double lift to the National League pennant and their only world championship.

He won 12 in 1956, then lost the touch. So did Bessent, and they wound up in the minors.

Now Craig's back and he's got the touch again. Unbeaten, he won his fourth in a row Thursday night, with 11 innings of three-hit shutout relief that paid off with a 4-3 Los Angeles victory in 13 innings over Milwaukee — tumbling the Braves from first to third and hoisting the Dodgers to second place.

The San Francisco Giants jumped into the National League lead, by a half-game over the Dodgers and a full-game over the Braves, with a 3-2, ninth inning victory at Cincinnati that ruined Fred Hutchinson's debut as manager of the Reds.

Reliever Elroy Face won his 18th in a row, 13th this season, as third place Pittsburgh defeated the Chicago Cubs 4-3 in 10 innings.

Philadelphia and St. Louis split a two-night doubleheader, the Cards winning 6-2 after the Phillies had taken the opener 11-0 behind Gene Conley's seven-hit pitching.

Two pitchers combining for a doubleheader shutout over one club is rare in itself. Occasionally it happens twice in one season.

But it happened twice in the American League Thursday night. While Chicago's second place White Sox moved within one game of Cleveland by beating the Indians 4-3, Baltimore's kid right-handers, Milt Pappas and Jerry Walker, blanked Washington 8-0 and 5-0 in a two-night doubleheader.

And Kansas City's Ray Herbert and Johnny Kucks each pitched five-innings while whitewashing Detroit's tumbling Tigers 5-0 and 4-0.

The Tigers, who have lost six in a row, hadn't been handed a double shutout since Chicago's Mary Grissom and Joe Dobson did it on May 5, 1952. It hadn't happened to the Senators since Cleveland's Herb Score and Mike Garcia pulled it off Sept. 19, 1956.

The sweep by Baltimore lifted the Orioles out of a third place tie with the New York Yankees, who were walloped 14-3 by Boston.

Bums 4, Braves 3

Craig's brilliant relief job, outdueling a two-man try by Braves' starter Joey Jay and Warren Spahn, the loser in relief. They had blanked the Dodgers after Norm Larkey's tying, three-run pinch homer in the third.

Craig, following starter Danny McDevitt, retired 26 of the first 27 men he faced. He walked none, struck out three.

Spahn (10-9) gave up five hits and struck out five (for a total of 13 Dodger whiffs) while losing his fifth in a row to the Dodgers, fourth this season. Always a jinx for the great southpaw, the Dodgers have a 29-14 edge over Spahn.

Giants 3, Cincy 2

Willie Mays singled, stole second, then rolled home on Daryl Spencer's single for the Giants' winning run. It came off reliever Tom Acker (1-2), who came on after Don Newcombe was lifted for pinch-hitter in the eighth. Sam Jones (11-8) was the winner in relief.

Pirates 4, Cubs 3

A pinch single by Harry Bright won it for the Pirates and Face, who had given up a tying single by Tony Taylor in a two-run Cub ninth after relieving Vern Law.

Bill Henry (5-4) lost it in relief.

Face, the most consistent winner ever among relievers, now has a string of 19 scoreless innings and an 0.80 earned run average while topping the majors in victories.

Phils, Cards Split

Gene Freese hammered his third grand-slam of the year and Harry Anderson hit a two-run homer for the Phillies in the opener in support of Conley (7-5). Ernie Broglio (3-6) was the loser. Larry Jackson (8-7) then won the nightcap for the Cards with Ken Boyer's third-inning home run clinching it against Robin Roberts (5-8).

Birds Blank Nats

The Senators managed only one extra-base hit among their 11 off Pappas (9-4) and Walker (7-3)—a first game triple by Bob Allison. Walker allowed only four singles while gaining a 4-0 record over Washington in his brief major league career. He has two shutouts in the majors—both four-hit jobs on the Nats.

Both youngsters walked but one man and struck out five. Pappas, also pitching his second shutout in the majors and like Walker, just 20, was backed by Billy Gardner's two-run homer and Gus Triandos' solo 21st. Bob Nieman hit a two-run homer in the nightcap after Brooks Robinson stole home in the fifth for the only run Walker needed. Russ Kemmerer (5-8) and Pete Ramos (9-8) were the losers.

Athletics Win Two

Herbert, pitching his first shutout since breaking into the majors in 1950 with the Tigers, walked two and struck out 10 while beating his ex-mates for a 6-7 record. Kucks, late of the Yankees, walked two and fanned three for a 3-4 record and his first complete game in 13 starts since June of last year.

Chicago 4, Indians 3

Jim Landis drove in three runs for the White Sox and Bubba Phillips clinched it with a sixth-inning home run off loser Herb Score (9-6). Pierce (9-10) went all the way for the victory after losing three in a row. Jim Baxes extended the Indians' home run streak to 18 games.

Red Sox 14, Yanks 3

Vic Wertz and Ted Williams each hit solo sixth home runs for the Red Sox, and Bobby Avila, batting .174, drove in four runs with a pair of homers. Bob Turley (8-8) gave up only three hits in his 2 1-3 innings—but all were

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
