

To Be Youngest Welter Champ: Portland Teenager's Dream Tonight

PORTLAND (AP)—Don Jordan, 19-year-old welterweight boxer, tonight against an exuberant teenager who hopes to become the youngest fighter ever to win the title.

The challenger is 19-year-old Denny Moyer, who will be fighting before home town supporters in the scheduled 15-round outdoor bout at the Portland Meadows race track. He is ranked the No. 3 contender by the National Boxing Assn., No. 2 by Ring Magazine.

His uncle, Tommy Moyer, matchmaker and promoter for the bout, said he expects a crowd of 10,000 and a gate of \$100,000. Jordan said he has a guarantee of \$70,000.

The fight will be on NBC television, starting at 8 p.m. (PST) except for a 200-mile area around Portland. Weather forecasters said skies will be clear and the thermometer at 72 degrees or warmer.

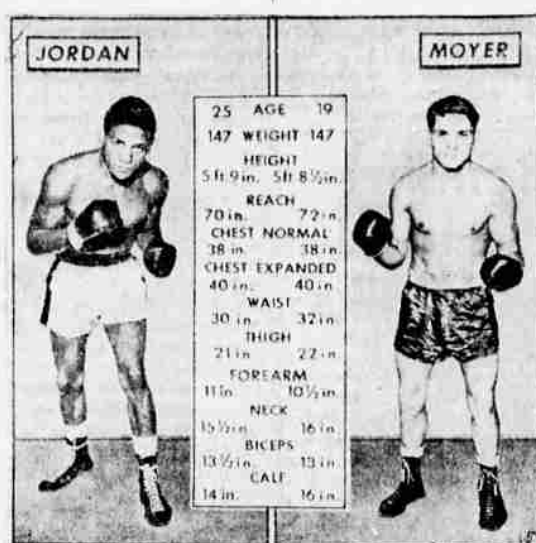
Usual local sources were not quoting odds, but the Oregon Journal said Eastern bookmakers

were quoting these figures: for a bet on Jordan, \$12 in order to make a \$3 profit; for a bet on Moyer, \$9 for a chance at a \$5 profit.

Both fighters made the usual victory predictions, but with this difference: Jordan said he thinks he can stop Moyer; Moyer said his plan is to outpoint the champion.

Scoring will be by the 10-point bet on Jordan, \$12 in order to make a \$3 profit; for a bet on Moyer, \$9 for a chance at a \$5 profit. The loser of a round usually gets 9 points unless knocked down or beaten badly. That calls for 8 points or less.

Jordan, who has 14 knockouts in his 43-11 record, is considered the harder hitter; Moyer the faster boxer.



Problem Facing Board

The problem of selecting a head football coach for Klamath Union High School resulted in the breaking out of an additional sore spot to be cured by the district No. 2 School Board.

At a meeting of board members Dr. Jim Noel, John Voth, Ed Hickman and Margaret Sheridan Thursday for the purpose of hearing the final recommendations of athletic director Jim Johnson as to the choice of Robert Williams, the question as to whether a KU coach should be allowed to hold two head coaching positions arose.

Basketball coach Dean White, also in attendance at the meeting, brought to the attention of the group that he had been relieved of his second job, that of head baseball coach.

Johnson's comment that Williams' acceptance of the football job hinged on the addition of the head baseball job as well, brought on White's comments.

In previous meetings the board had suggested that there be no more dual coaching posts created.

White's protest that it was unfair that he be deprived from the baseball job only to have another man fill it in the same fashion was considered by the board and another meeting was scheduled in which they expected to make a definite ruling on the situation.

Williams finally accepted the post of assistant baseball coach in addition to his football job. His acceptance was received over long distance telephone to Lewiston.

Coach Ken Carrier and his Klamath Basinettes swing back into action this weekend with a pair of games scheduled against Northern California women's softball teams.

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Swap Rule Receives 2nd Look

CHICAGO (AP)—The proposed inter-league trading rule again will be brought before Commissioner Ford Frick today at a joint meeting of the major leagues.

The measure, passed by both the American and National Leagues last December, was pushed aside when Frick asked the two organizations to reconsider.

Both leagues met Thursday and another vote was taken. Their votes will be announced today. If both approve the measure, it will become law.

The ruling provides for a period in which clubs from both leagues can trade with each other without getting waivers on a player from other clubs in the league.

In the past, if the New York Yankees, for instance, sought to make a trade with a team in the National League, all the players involved had to be waived on by every club in the league.

Both leagues announced Thursday their opening dates for the 1960 season. The National League will open April 12, the American April 17. Both will close Oct. 2. The American League adopted and put into effect the suspended game rule. A game halted before nine innings because of curfew, light failure or time limits will be played from the point of suspension. If a game goes over nine innings and is halted for any of these reasons, it will be completely replayed.

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Dick Stearns Becomes Obstacle In Way Of Champion's Repeat

PORTLAND (AP)—George Holland of Seattle today tries to overcome another obstacle on the road to a second straight Pacific Northwest Amateur Golf Tournament championship.

The obstacle, in this case, is Dick Stearns of Portland, with whom he is paired in one of the tournament's 36-hole semi-final matches today.

The other semi-final matches Bob Pratt of Salem, Ore., against Ron Willey of Vancouver, the British Columbia amateur champion.

It was against other Vancouver, B.C., golfers Thursday that Holland had great success.

The Seattle insurance salesman edged Bob Plommer 2 up in the morning round, and then defeated Joe Jerowski by an identical margin in the afternoon quarter-finals.

An eagle helped give Holland his margin of victory over Jerowski. That came on the 512-yard 10th hole, where he dropped a two-iron shot a scant 18 inches from the hole.

In Stearns, Holland will be meeting a player who is the Portland city champion, and who Thursday ousted one of the pre-tournament favorites, Bob Pratt of Renton, Wash.

Pratt was the captain of this year's NCAA champions from Houston, but he had trouble with the traps Thursday and bowed to Stearns 4 and 3 in the quarter-finals.

In the opening round Thursday, Stearns came from behind for a 1 up triumph over young Chuck Hunter of Tacoma.

Pratt got into the semi-finals with a 3 and 2 victory over Jerry Cundari of Salem and a narrow triumph on the 19th hole over Kent Myers of Aberdeen, Wash.

The biggest upset Thursday

came when Bob Bronson of Portland sank a 30-foot birdie putt on the sixth extra hole to nip Don Krieger of Portland, the Oregon amateur titlist.

However, Bronson fell in the quarter-finals to Willey, 5 and 4. Earlier in the day, Willey clipped Jim Mallory of Spokane 4 and 3. Mallory earlier had turned in the biggest upset by Wednesday ousting the tourney's medalist, Jim Bourne of Seattle.

Semi-finals also are scheduled today in the women's portion of the tournament. As expected, Shirley Englehorn of Caldwell, Idaho, the medalist, easily made it to today's round. She plays Mrs. Maude Borst of Portland.

The other semi-final match pairs another favorite, Mrs. Pat Lesser Harbottle of Tacoma, against Elaine Porritt of Eugene, Miss Englehorn, a teen-ager, Thursday edged Betty Martin of Longview 2 and 1. Miss Martin lost the match when her drive on the 17th went awry and it took four strokes to reach the green.

Mrs. Harbottle, a former national open champion who hasn't played in a tournament in two years, Thursday nipped Jean Hoetmer of Seattle on the 19th hole.

That match was evened on the 17th, when Miss Hoetmer veered into a trap. They halved the 18th. And on the 19th, Miss Hoetmer lost when her drive went out of bounds.

Next off are Jo Anne Gunderson, 20, Seattle, Wash., physical education major at Arizona State and 1957 National Amateur champion, against Andy Cohn, 19, Waterloo, Iowa, Northwestern University sophomore and a 1957 Western quarter-finalist.

Two extra-hole battles highlighted Thursday's quarter-finals. Miss Williams was forced to the 21st green before ousting Sherry Wheeler, 18, Glasgow, Ky. Miss Wheeler lost when her second shot splashed into a creek.

Miss Gunderson, outdriving Anne Quast of Everett, Wash., 20 to 70 yards, won by 5 and 4. She hit 12 of 14 greens in regulation and was 1-under-par for the distance, best golf of the day.

One shot further back for the start of today's second round were Arnold Palmer, of Ligonier, Pa., and Mike Souchak, Grossinger, N. Y., along with Huston (Paddy) Laclaire, Birmingham, Ala., and Bert Weaver, Beaumont, Tex.
