Arkansas School Schedules Rites

LITTLE ROCK, Ark. (AP)—Twenty-eight seniors graduate from Baptist High School tonight in the last commencement of the year for Little Rock's private schools.
The graduates were among the 3,700 students displaced when Gov. Orval E. Faubus shut the city's four public high schools last September to avoid integration.
Three all-white private high schools were established in October. They took care of about 1,100 students. No private schools were set up for Negroes.
The remaining 2,600 displaced students sought schooling elsewhere.

Soviet Exhibit Glitters; But Gold Is Long Way Off

Editor's Note: UPI correspondent Anthony Austin recently was a member of the UPI bureau in Moscow. In the following dispatch, he compares reports on the Soviet exhibit in New York with the realities of conditions in the Soviet Union.

PARIS (UPI)—The Soviet Union opened a wonderful exhibition in New York last week of the country the Russians hope some day to have.

According to all accounts, Russia, as portrayed at the Soviet Fair, is a clickety-click land of modern efficiency, comfort and glitter, and this reporter would like to visit that Russia when it is there.

It was not there, except for its first glimmers, when he ended a seven-month stint in Moscow as UPI correspondent this spring.

The lives of the average Russian seem drab and hard by American standards. From the Russians own words, much of their industry and agriculture was still steeped in manpower-wasting methods.

This is not to say, however, that the organizers of the Soviet exhibition in the Coliseum on Columbus Circle were out to hoodwink the American public.

If that were so, Russia would not welcome thousands of American tourists every year and permit them to travel over wide areas of the country.

The disparity between some of the claims at the Coliseum and the reality on Gorky Street, Moscow, may be explained by a state of mind which furzes up the borderline between what is and what is to be.

"Russia is the country of the bright tomorrow," said a Russian to this reporter. "We've all been living in the future since we were children."

He was mocking a Russian trait, but with a touch of pride. The Russians acting as guides at their "Exhibition of Science, Technology and Culture" must get a sense of pride, too, rather than dissimulation—though they know that many of the 10,000 items on view are less than representative.

What if the women's dresses and coats that New York fashion writers found fairly good are the pride of Gum's shop windows in Moscow but are seldom seen being worn?

What if the men's suits would cost the average Russian worker two or three months' wages, and Russians on the street look to Americans as though they were outfitted at a charity sale?

The two-toned Volga automobile and the small Moskvitch shown at the exhibition still are luxuries only to be dreamed of by most Russians. The relatively few citizens who can afford cars have to wait a year or longer to buy them (strictly for cash).

The reasonably attractive model apartments at the exhibition still are not much more than models in the Soviet Union. Most Russian cities families have one room to live in, sharing the kitchen and bathroom with other families.

Other similar comparisons could be made. But what is more important to the vast majority of Russians is that a big housing construction program at last has begun and that a plan to spread consumer goods and services is in the works.

What is more important to them is that the Sputniks and the Soviet artificial planets are there, for all the world to marvel at, and that Soviet industry at last has produced some industrial machinery that is ahead of America's.

Living to the drumbeat of The Plan ("Outstrip America in 14 years," says Premier Nikita S. Khrushchev) the shabbiness and the queuing-up and the burdens of today become something transitory and almost irrelevant—somehow less real.

Seen in that spirit, the Soviet Fair in New York must be, as President Eisenhower said a "remarkable exhibit."

Ship Barred From Port Plods Route To Poland

GDYNIA, Poland (AP)—The Polish motorship Batory, barred from New York, today plodded the route from Montreal to this Polish seaport.

Most of the passengers are Polish-Americans en route to renew family ties in Poland. The atmosphere of the 11-day trip is that of a prolonged Polish picnic near Cleveland.

This correspondent and his wife were the only passengers with non-Polish backgrounds on her last trip. Although the language heard on all sides was Polish, there was a strong reminder of North America. Ships' employees refuse to accept any currency except Canadian or American dollars.

The 14,000-ton Batory was barred from New York harbor after Gerhart Eisler, wanted for contempt of Congress, sneaked out of the United States aboard her in May 1949. He has since gone on to a career as a propagandist in East Germany.

There was more drama when Capt. Jan Owikinski deserted the ship in England June 23, 1953, with his medical officer and obtained political asylum. Two years earlier there had been a mass flight of eight sailors. These incidents occurred during the worst period of Stalinist oppression in Poland.

There are no echoes of this tumultuous past now.

"It's 46 years since I've seen my mother and five sisters," said Mrs. Julia Kuzek of Philadelphia, one of the 307 passengers aboard. Family, not politics or ideology, was the main preoccupation.

Tears streamed down many faces as tugs pulled the Batory into Gdynia. Bands were playing on the pier. An American flag flew above a welcome sign written in English. Thousands of Poles waved greetings.

Then the realities of life here were brought home to the passengers.

Almost all of them were loaded down with gifts. There were tears again—this time of rage and frustration—as for hour after hour they struggled with customs' officers for the right to bring them in. Meanwhile the trains they hoped to catch to homesteads around the country pulled out, leaving many to wait wearily for the night expresses.
