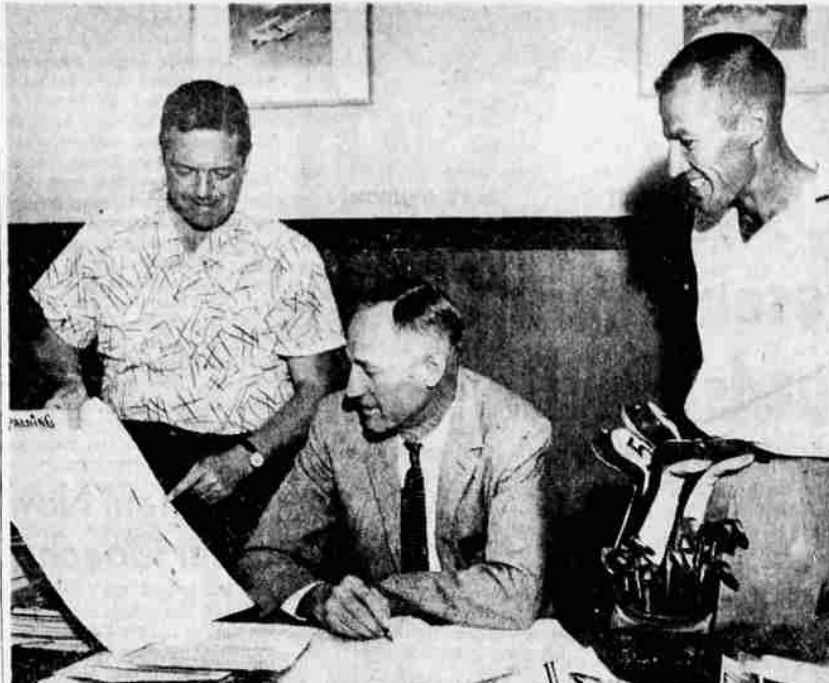

## Seattle Miss Grabs Amateur Golf Title

CHICAGO (AP)—In a match of spectacular shots, Jo Anne Gunderson of Seattle defeated Marge Lindsay, Decatur, Ill., 6 and 4 Saturday to win the 59th Women's Western Amateur Golf Championship.

Miss Gunderson, 20-year-old physical education major at Arizona State and 1957 national amateur titlist, never was down and only once did her 34-year-old opponent, the Western's 1951 champion and 1952 Curtis Cup team member, pull even that was on the 6th hole of the morning round.

Capping the sensational playing in the match was Miss Gunderson's 60-foot chip shot that plunked into the 32nd hole for birdie 3 ending the contest.

Bill even surpassing this was the action on the 170-yard 7th hole of the first round. Here, Miss Gunderson dropped a 60-foot shot from a trap for a deuce. Miss Lindsay, daughter of a newspaper publisher, then rolled in a 50-foot putt for a deuce halve.

Not to be outdone, the long-driving strawberry blonde from Seattle holed a 14-foot putt for a winning deuce on 142-yard 9th for a 4-up lead, and maintained that bulge through the first 18 by sinking a 54-foot chip for eagle 3 on the 420-yard 16th.

Aside from these explosive episodes, the golf of both players failed to approach the tough 37-38 — 75 par of the timbered, 6,567-yard Exmoor Country Club course.

Miss Gunderson, hitting many of the greens in regulation and forcing Miss Lindsay to one-putt for halves, was 5 over par for the distance. Miss Lindsay was 10 over.
